Family ties are no match for wealth and power's grip. The series' author, Margaret Peterson Haddix, weaves a compelling narrative. Although this installment didn't resonate with me, I found the Grants frustratingly incompetent. They devise a plan that makes little sense, leaving Luke confused. Several plot points feel unrealistic, such as Oscar's knowledge of Lee's death or the Grants' lack of concern for police involvement. The book's tone can be off-putting, especially when compared to the first installment. The Grants' cold demeanor towards Smits and their attempts to deceive Luke about his true identity create a sense of unease, foreshadowing the danger that lies ahead for both characters. The Grants' plan to fake Luke's death and use him as a pawn in their game against the government adds complexity to the plot, highlighting the themes of deception and manipulation. The Grant family was influential, yet Luke had compassion for Smits' sorrow. A complex plot unfolded as Luke sought answers about Lee's murder, with various factions pursuing their agendas. The series was intriguing, but its pace felt slow. Margaret Peterson Haddix was a masterful storyteller who tackled difficult subjects like population control and trust in an engaging way. In "Among the Barons," Luke lived under an assumed identity, attending school as Lee Grant. Smits, his fake brother, joined him, raising concerns about Smits' loyalty and the danger of discovery by the Population Police. The brotherhood and page-turning plot are classic Haddix, and the themes of honor and justice make it compelling. Lee's brother arrives at Hendricks School, raising questions about ulterior motives and the value of life. As Luke grapples with these issues, he begins to doubt his own worth and that of others. This addition to the saga leaves readers eager for more. Meanwhile, "Among the Barons," by Margaret Peterson Haddix, is a solid installment in the Shadow Children series, though it's Lee's least favorite so far due to underdeveloped plotlines and inconsistencies that can be confusing. Despite this, the book remains good and not bad, but could benefit from improvement, earning four out of five stars. Later reads reveal a more cohesive narrative with Luke as the main character, offering an enjoyable exploration of family dynamics and political unrest. The mystery surrounding who to trust keeps readers engaged until the end, especially with how well the younger characters are written, making them relatable. A particularly notable moment is when Smits' character is introduced and develops throughout the story, particularly in the way Luke's perspective evolves as an older brother. Further along, the series impresses with each new book adding depth without disrupting the initial narrative of Luke Garner.
