**Paul and sue rosenau story.**

The Legacy of Angels Foundation: A Family's Quest for a Cure Sue and Paul Rosenau's life was forever changed after winning \$180.1 million in the Powerball lottery on May 4, 2008. The Minnesota couple, who had lost their two-year-old granddaughter to Krabbe disease, were determined to use their winnings to fund research into finding a treatment for this rare condition. The Rosenau Family Research Foundation was established shortly after their win, with the aim of providing financial support to researchers and families affected by Krabbe. Over the years, the foundation has granted over \$10 million in grants to help fund research that has led to advances in treatments for the disease. Although a cure for Krabbe remains elusive, the foundation's efforts have helped improve the lives of countless children diagnosed with the condition. The organization provides funding for medical treatment options such as medicine to manage muscle spasms and seizures, physical therapy to enhance movement, and palliative care to ensure patients remain comfortable towards the end. Thanks to advances in research, an umbilical cord blood transplant has proven to be a life-extending measure for many children with Krabbe. The Rosenau Family Research Foundation continues to play a vital role in supporting families affected by this devastating disease and working tirelessly towards finding a cure. Sue and Paul Rosenau, a devoted couple, lost their granddaughter Makayla to Krabbe disease in 2014. The loss motivated them to find a cure for the rare condition. In 2016, they became lead investigators on a promising gene therapy project with Dr. Maria Escolar. The Rosenau Family Research Foundation, co-founded by Sue and Paul, has since dedicated over \$18 million towards researching Krabbe disease and other disorders. Despite facing personal struggles, including cancer diagnoses for Sue, the couple continued to work tirelessly in support of the foundation's mission. Paul Rosenau won \$180.1 million in Powerball jackpot in Spring 2008 and invested it in scientific research. However, after a financial advisor mismanaged funds, he lost millions. The foundation sued the financial firm and recovered \$7.3 million in arbitration judgment against Principal Financial Group. Priebe charged for selling variable annuities with foundation money Priebe sold \$47 million in variable annuities generating commissions. The Rosenaus had sought financial help after winning the lottery and lacked investment experience. Principal has denied allegations of making unsuitable investments but must file a motion to vacate the award by July 15. Rosenau regrets not questioning Priebe's advisers despite trusting them. Priebe was discharged from Principal in 2019 for business practice concerns. A recent investigation found that some lotteries took money away from those who couldn't afford it. A \$1 million Powerball jackpot was won on January 1, 2024, by someone in the state of Michigan.
