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Since its US introduction in the late '90s, the Toyota RAV4 has remained a top choice due to its reliability. The SUV's history of longevity is well-documented, making it an excellent option for those seeking a dependable ride. To learn more about engine sizes across generations, check out our full review here. The 5th gen (2019-present) Toyota RAV4 features two engine options: a 2.5L 4-cylinder and a hybrid variant. Both engines utilize a CVT transmission with eight speeds, making it suitable for navigating hills and snow-covered terrain. The hybrid version boasts impressive horsepower of 219HP. The newer RAV4 generations offer more customization options than their predecessors but come at a higher price point. The 5th gen also features an 8-speed automatic transmission. Prior to the 2020 model, the RAV4 was not known for its towing capabilities. However, from 2020-2022, it can tow up to 3,500lbs, with an upgrade to 5,000lbs possible when equipped with towing equipment. The 5th gen Hybrid Toyota RAV4 boasts excellent fuel economy, averaging 41MPG combined (38MPG city and 40MPG highway). Non-hybrid models average around 26MPG. The hybrids utilize electric engines and gasoline for enhanced fuel efficiency. Note that the "Distance-To-Empty" indicator may not always accurately reflect your mileage left, as there are often many miles remaining. The 4th gen (2013-2018) Toyota RAV4 features a 2.5-liter four-cylinder engine with an added hybrid option in 2016. This generation discontinued the V6 engine. The 2.5L 4-cylinder engine produces 176HP and 172lb-ft. of torque, utilizing a six-speed automatic transmission. As for towing capacity, crossovers are not typically known for their capabilities, with the RAV4 being no exception, rated at just 1,500lbs. However, when properly equipped, certain models (2017-2018) can tow up to 3,500lbs or even upgrade to 5,000lbs with OEM towing equipment. In terms of mileage, the 4th gen front-wheel drive RAV4 averages around 24MPG city and 31MPG highway. All-wheel drive models average about 22MPG in the city and 29MPG on the highway due to their increased weight. The Toyota RAV4's engine options have varied across its generations. The third generation, spanning from 2007 to 2012, introduced a V6 engine and an all-electric model as firsts in the line. This era offered three trims, each starting with a basic 2.4L 4-cylinder engine that could be upgraded to a 3.5L V6. The base engine produced 166HP and used a 4-speed automatic transmission, while the V6 utilized a 5-speed transmission. The third generation RAV4 had a maximum towing capacity of 2,000lbs but suffered from decreased mileage when switching to all-wheel-drive. In contrast, the second generation (2002-2006) offered traditional engines ranging from 1.4L to 2.0L and a diesel option at 2.4L. The second-gen RAV4s boasted an HP average of 123-156 and were available with both 4-speed and 5-speed transmissions. The first generation (1996-2001) RAV4, on the other hand, featured a 2L I4 engine with a horsepower range of 119-177. The first-gen RAV4 had a maximum towing capacity of about 1,500lbs, which could be increased with OEM and aftermarket parts. More recently, the 2022 Toyota RAV4 Prime boasts the strongest engine in this lineup, producing 300HP and featuring a gas/electric powertrain that can accelerate from 0 to 60MPH in just 5.7 seconds. The towing capacity of a Toyota RAV4 depends on its engine size, additional equipment, and whether it's been upgraded. Typically, an average RAV4 can haul about 1,500lbs, but this can be increased to up to 3,000lbs with extra hauling gear. Some models may even reach capacities of 3,500lbs or more, with some owners upgrading theirs to tow up to 5,000lbs. This versatility makes the RAV4 suitable for towing a variety of boats, from small aluminum vessels to larger powered ones. However, before attempting to tow any load, it's crucial to ensure your RAV4 can handle the weight safely. Similarly, when determining how large a camper you can tow with your RAV4, consider the type and power of the engine, as well as any upgrades or towing equipment installed. Even base models can accommodate pop-up and teardrop campers, while larger-capacity models can haul small trailers and bigger campers. The Toyota RAV4's capabilities extend beyond towing, thanks to its powerful engines and smooth transmission. It also features hybrid and plug-in options that offer improved fuel efficiency, making it an ideal choice for long trips and daily commutes. Whether you prioritize performance or eco-friendliness, the RAV4 is a reliable option. Regarding engine options, the standard 2.5-liter four-cylinder engine produces 203 horsepower and 184 pound-feet of torque. However, Toyota does offer hybrid and plug-in drivetrains that combine electric engines with gasoline for enhanced fuel efficiency. As for the V6 engine, some models feature a 3.5-liter V6 under their hoods. When weighing the pros and cons of the RAV4, consider its competitive pricing, excellent mileage, and appealing design. However, keep in mind potential drawbacks such as outdated technology, stiff ride, and limited base model features.
