Group 1 Kwinana Energy Recovery Centre

Australia's first large-scale facility of its kind, the Kwinana Energy Recovery Centre transforms non-recyclable waste into renewable baseload power. Using world-class technology, it processes up to 460,000 tonnes of waste each year—diverting it from landfill, cutting emissions equivalent to removing 85,000 cars from Perth's roads, and generating enough electricity to power 55,000 homes.

Tour will include:

- A presentation from facility operators on how the plant works
- A guided tour of the education centre and viewing platform
- Q&A with local government representatives

This visit offers valuable insights into how innovative infrastructure can address waste challenges and contribute to a more sustainable future.

Group 2 Australian Marine Complex (AMC)

The Australian Marine Complex is Western Australia's premier hub for shipbuilding, sustainment, and advanced manufacturing. As one of only two naval shipbuilding precincts in Australia, the AMC plays a critical role in supporting the marine, defence, energy, and resource industries. Located just 23 kilometres south of Perth in the state's leading industrial corridor, the complex drives significant economic development and employment.

Tour will include:

- Presentation and Q&A with an AMC representative
- Optional site viewing of key facilities
- Insights into defence industry growth, strategic planning, and local economic impact

Session 1: Future Economy: Made in Australia, Built in the Growth Areas

This forward-looking session will begin with a contextual overview from Nick Byrne, Director and Principal Consultant at REMPLAN. Drawing on the latest data, Nick will outline the opportunities and challenges emerging from residential development targets and population forecasts across Australia's growth areas.

Cassandra Winzar, Chief Economist at the Committee for Economic Development of Australia (CEDA), will then deliver a dual macro- and microeconomic analysis. Her presentation will explore the intersection between global economic volatility and Australia's domestic agenda, including productivity pressures, the manufacturing resurgence under the Future Made in Australia Act, and the implications of the Housing Accord.

The session will conclude with a high-level panel discussion featuring Col Dutton, UDIA National President and General Manager of Greenfield Development at Stockland, alongside other leading national experts. Together, they will examine how growth areas can position themselves as engines of economic productivity, innovation, and sustainable development into the future.

Session 3: Future Communities: Designing for Belonging, Health and Opportunity

With one in four Australian children growing up in a growth area, the experience of suburban childhood is both defining and under-researched. In this session, NGAA's valued research partnership with the Australian Research Council's Lifecourse Centre will take centre stage, revealing new findings on how children and families experience life in outer suburban Perth.

The built environment influences child and family health. The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child states that "Children have the right to say what they think should happen when adults are making decisions that affect them, and to have their opinions taken into account". But are we listening to their needs?

In this session, Professor Haley Christian AM will present research that incorporate the voices of parents and children, which provides new insights and policy direction. Neighbourhood features such as public transport, traffic exposure, street connectivity, yard size, the presence of quality green play spaces, playgroups, health services, early childhood education and care, and kindergartens all affect children's health and development. How might surprise you.

Cassandra Winzar, Chief Economist, CEDA

Cassandra Winzar has been CEDA's Chief Economist since 2023, after joining CEDA as a Senior Economist in 2020. Cassandra leads CEDA's research and policy work across areas including productivity, the energy transition, migration and disadvantage. Previously as Senior Economist Cassandra authored reports in Aged Care, Disadvantage and Mental Health. Prior to joining CEDA, Cassandra was Principal Economist at the WA Department of Communities (Housing Authority). Cassandra has also held roles as the WA based Economist for the Reserve Bank of Australia, and in Transfer Pricing at EY. Cassandra is on the committee of the WA Women in Economics Network and was the past Chair. She has a Bachelor of Economics (Honours) and Bachelor of Asian Studies from the University of Western Australia.
