CALDERA



MISSION:

Caldera's mission is to inspire and support youth from underserved rural and urban communities by awakening the potential of their creative voice.

OUR VISION:

To give every young person unfettered access to the explosive power of creativity so they can create a better world.

CALDERA NAMES:

At Caldera, we all go by another name. Many longtime friends in our community will only refer to each other by these special names we use when we are together. This is the name that everyone calls you at Caldera.

All of our learners, every Artist in Residence, and each member of our board and staff have the opportunity to choose a name for themselves. This means that as a member of this Caldera community, we are all encouraged to be the person or idea that we may not always feel able to be in our day-to-day lives.

When we encourage learners to think aspirationally about how they want the world to see them, their Caldera name emerges. At Caldera we have the opportunity to be our best selves, and our Caldera name should reflect that.



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Dear Reader,

As I sit down to write this letter, fall has arrived, and the crisp in the air reminds me that winter is coming. It feels a bit like the Friday before a long weekend. It is the transition season from summer light to winter slow.

Like many community-based organizations, Caldera uses this season to reflect on the fiscal year that just closed: July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. This timing is especially important for an organization like ours, where the summer is the heart and the soul of the work we do. What began as a week-long summer program in August 1997 has evolved into a very special 8 to 10 days and nights youth spend on the land, as well as a year-round intercultural community through school partnerships.

Summer at Caldera is both the launch of the year and the culmination of the school-year prior. It's a little bit like the snake mural the Apprentices painted in the Hearth Building, which prepared them for the RootedHomes project you'll read more about in these pages. The snake is one continuous form, eating its own tail. Where is the beginning and where is the end? What comes first, the connection or the confidence? The creativity, community, or contribution?

Fiscal year 2025 was a year of community building. We focused all our efforts on expanding the ecosystem that inspires and supports our youth. The impact speaks for itself:

- The summer program saw more than 190 learners—the largest cohort ever!
- The Impact Team launched our new High School Apprentice program, developed a comprehensive evaluation plan, and welcomed guests new and old to Caldera, in our little corner of Jefferson County.
- We served nearly 500 people year-round from Warm Springs, Madras, Redmond, Sisters, Bend, and the Portland metro area, with mentors spending one day a week in class with Caldera learners at 11 middle schools and three high schools.
- We began a longitudinal study following sixth graders through their seven-year Caldera journey from middle school to graduation.

While building community at Caldera this fiscal year, we achieved our goal to enlarge the circle of inspiration and support for the youth we serve. School is for learning, yes. Home is for nurturing—sometimes. As you read through these pages, look at these images, and review the data, consider the impact of third spaces—like Caldera—where young people can awaken their creative voice in an intercultural community and be open to the infinite ideas that may one day change the course of history.

IMPACT

Who & How We Serve

Caldera continues to positively impact youth development, from strengths in creative expression, confidence, and connection, to cultivating an understanding among young people of the difference they can make in the world. In FY25, we served nearly 500 learners across Central Oregon and the Portland metro area, growing participation in Caldera's programs. We welcomed 192 summer camp learners, worked with 295 learners in school-based classes, and cultivated 176 unique learners through fall and spring weekend intensives. Over the past year, Caldera employed eight youth through the reintroduction of the High School Apprentice program.

Caldera was born at the Sisters campus 28 years ago in the Cascade Mountains. Three decades later, Caldera's work is still deeply connected to the land and buildings at the state-of-the-art facility on Blue Lake. However, Caldera is just as much an experience as it is a place.

The young middle and high school learners described in the preceding pages embarked on a journey with Caldera that can span more than seven years. We typically meet youth in middle school by partnering with schools throughout the Portland metro area and Central Oregon, where Caldera middle school mentors lead a weekly class. Learners work on projects such as collage, photography, and drawing. Regardless of the medium, mentors use creativity as a tool to explore identity, community, and the larger world.

We continue the relationship with learners into high school, with a mix of weekly in- and out-of-school programming. Last year, we were thrilled to deepen high school engagement through our High School Apprentice program, which you'll read about later in this report.

Twice during the school year, all Caldera learners are invited to participate in Weekend Intensives in addition to the overnight summer program.

All of Caldera's youth work incorporates these core ingredients: Awe and Wonder, Intercultural Connection, Safety, Self-reflection, Failure and Resilience, Dependability, and Applied Creativity. Every year, youth from rural Central Oregon and the Portland metro area come together and learn from each other with guidance from reliable adult mentors, who give learners the safety to experiment and expand their creative selves.

We know we can't serve young people without an expansive network of dedicated adults. That's why we also offer robust adult programming, or Caldera Experiences, which you can read about on page 14.

PROGRAMS

2024-25 School Year

FY25 was a big year for Caldera's year-round programming. Middle school mentors focused on introducing our learners to different art mediums that were focused on helping our youth find and express their creative voice. At the high school level, our mentors worked to foster and deepen that creativity through in-depth art projects. Some of these projects included zine making, creating movie trailers, painting sunset silhouettes using watercolors, and designing and painting custom Nike Air Force 1 shoes. Our team worked in partnership with schools and teaching artists on both sides of the mountain to bring a regular creative practice through art-making to our young learners.

Summer Program

During the summer season, our learners attended one of our four sessions of 8- to 10-day overnights along the shores of Blue Lake, divided by grade level. Last summer, we welcomed more than 190 youth who explored three core art areas: photography, filmmaking, and African drumming. Caldera offers additional art mediums that rotate each year. In 2024, these included ceramics, drawing and comics, and music production or beat making. Caldera's teaching artists and youth advocates help students nurture their creativity and strengthen their artistic skills while collaborating on a larger project presented at the culminating showcase.

In addition to Caldera's diverse art rotations, students experienced environmental education in the incomparable setting of Blue Lake, participated in our low ropes course with the signature giant swing, and jumped from the top of the Dream Tree with Caldera's challenge course team. Students also enjoyed traditional camp experiences like campfires, open mics, and challenging the staff to a Caldera-wide game of capture the flag. As always, it ended with the chance to jump into Blue Lake one last time on the final day at the Polar Bear Plunge.





Alum Spotlight: Dauntless

Caldera alumni are doing incredible things. As a learner, Dauntless started attending Caldera mentor classes at Jason Lee K-8 in 2014 and continued programming through high school, graduating to earn a BS in public policy from Oregon State University. Today, he serves as the constituent relations coordinator for the Portland office of Mayor Keith Wilson, using his creativity and passion for environmental justice to drive impact on a regional scale.

"I was given the tools to express myself creatively. As a young Black kid, I never had many opportunities to explore my artistic realm. However, entering the world of Caldera changed my mindset about what art is, and what it should be. Caldera was also my first experience in a space where I could interact with the environment around me, and for days at a time. I was able to learn how the environment is not just a place for wildlife, but where we live, work, play, and love.

Caldera accelerated my passion for environmental justice. In fact, Caldera's emphasis on environmentalism has allowed me to tap into my passions for the natural world, and to pursue a career where I could work to create healthier environments and communities for all people, especially Black, Indigenous, people of color communities who share the disproportionate burden of environmental injustices and climate change.

Caldera was the first community where I was given the tools to express myself creatively.

I am extremely thankful for Caldera for allowing me to be my authentic self and giving me the opportunities and mentorship I needed to recognize my potential and utilize it in a position in my future career where I can idealize and implement a better world for all."

Launch Pad: Igniting Creative Futures

Launch Pad is Caldera's incubator program for recent alumni ages 18–24, offering paid opportunities that help them turn their creative passions into purposeful careers. Through mentorship, business planning support, and real-world experience, participants gain the confidence, skills, and networks to launch their next chapter.

Now in its second year, Launch Pad empowers youth to explore entrepreneurship and creative careers while staying rooted in community. At Hearth Festival, three outstanding alumni shared their journeys:

VOID, a University of Oregon graduate, showcased images and designs from his Bodega project and has since joined Oregon Screen Impressions full time.

JEWEL invited festival goers to join her in the art of tile decorating, inspired by traditional Mexican folk art mirrors.

JEDI took the stage time with Caldera's Executive Director to discuss channeling her creativity into her coffee shop, Above Grnd, and how it's shaped her approach to serving the community.




Apprentices

This past year, Caldera's Apprentice Program came back in a big way. The 2024-25 cohort consisted of 10 high school students: five in Portland and five in Central Oregon. These 10 emerging artists took the spark of creativity that they found as Caldera youth and explored developing it further. What does it mean to create art for others? How much power does a creative voice have, and what can it accomplish? These were questions they sought to answer through their work and the experiences they had as Apprentices.

On the Portland side of the mountain, Apprentices photographed Caldera merchandise meant to be sold, aptly named the "Apprentice Collection," with profits supporting Caldera's programming. Apprentices were given a creative briefing and style guide and worked closely with Caldera Community Members Sister JRae and Oso to capture the joy of creativity that Caldera represents. The Apprentices also had the opportunity to attend TEDx Portland, where they were inspired by the speakers at the event and represented Caldera as ambassadors at our information tent.

The Portland Apprentices worked on a Media Literacy Project developed by Caldera and Sister JRae. This six-month intensive blended research, writing, ethics, sourcing material, and citation skills with opportunities for Apprentices to express their own creative voices. Throughout the project, they completed a series of art-based lessons that ultimately led to the creation of a 46-page multidisciplinary magazine featuring digital design, poetry, collage, and illustration—showcasing the breadth of skills they built. The project was also featured in a short-form documentary—broadcast locally—that included interviews with Caldera Apprentices.

Our Central Oregon Apprentices explored a different type of creative expression this year. Read more about this community engagement on page 18.



"This [Apprentice Mural] echoes the history of alumni Komodo Dragon, the summer learner who found the snake swallowing the fish bigger than its body and captured the moment for the photo rotation. The photo lives in one of the rooms within Tamarack Hall and I'm sure it's a moment Sister JRae, photography teaching artist and Caldera Elder, cherishes as well, since it's part of the yearly trek to the dry creek beds across the meadows of the Rim Trail. A place of a bit of discomfort for most students, but it sparks curiosity, resilience, and that in community anything is possible."

CALDERA EXPERIENCES



Caldera AiR 2025

Caldera's Artists in Residence (AiR) is an interdisciplinary program that offers artists, creatives, and cultural workers the time and space to advance their creative practice. Every year, artists are invited from across the country to experiment, disrupt, and delve deeper—into themselves, their work, and the natural world that surrounds Caldera's campus in the foothills of the Cascade Mountain Range.

25 artists were invited to Caldera in 2025 and awarded more than \$19,000 in stipends. These artists also served 50 learners through Caldera's educational programming.

One artist of note, River Dandelion, is a practitioner of ancestral medicine through writing, teaching, energy healing, and creating ceremony. While at Caldera, River focused on completing their poetry manuscript, *Take Me to That Place of Ancestral Memory*, a collection that honors matriarchs and ancestors across generations in Taishan and New York City. It was a privilege to host River among a cohort of so many other interesting artists, and our community looks forward to River's return in an upcoming Community Residency.

Caldera's AiR program strengthens our ecosystem in many ways: bringing accomplished artists to work with mentors and youth, showcasing diverse adult learners with regular creative practices, and championing women, BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, parent, and teaching artists. Through all these connections, Caldera's AiR program helps youth learners see that their art, voice, actions, and creations have value—and that creativity can shape both their lives and the world around them.

Building Community Through Creativity

Five young creatives, one united vision, and a lasting gift for the RootedHomes community.


When RootedHomes partnered with the Caldera Apprentice Program, the invitation was simple: transform a blank wall into something meaningful. What followed was a months-long creative journey that brought together five young creatives, professional mentors, and an entire community.

The 2024–2025 Central Oregon Apprentice Cohort embraced the challenge, turning their collective talent into a mural that celebrates the region's landscapes, history, and people. The project stands as a testament to the belief that youth-led creativity can shape stronger, more connected communities. The team—BBABs from Warm Springs, Mayay from Madras, Fynix and Moss from Redmond, and sKeTcH from Prineville—represented diverse voices and experiences from across Central Oregon. Together, they embraced the challenge of creating a work that celebrated local identity and natural beauty while uniting their individual styles.

Each scene in the mural reflects both the Apprentices' personal artistic voice and a shared vision of place, memory, and belonging. Together, the mural creates a layered narrative that honors community roots while looking toward a sustainable future. The Apprentices followed a five-phase process: Research, Ideation, Technique, Color, and Design.

This project demonstrates the value of youth-led creativity in shaping public spaces. For the Apprentices, it was a chance to grow as artists, collaborators, and leaders. For RootedHomes and the Redmond community, the mural offers more than a beautified wall—it is a symbol of identity, resilience, and hope. By grounding creative solutions in local research and lived experience, the mural ensures that residents see themselves and their environment reflected in the built landscape.

The RootedHomes Community Mural stands as a lasting testament to the power of young voices, collective imagination, and creativity's ability to strengthen community.



Appreciation Dinner

On November 7, 2024, our guest experiences team hosted a Community Appreciation Dinner in Sisters, Oregon—a heartfelt evening honoring those who have supported Caldera’s mission over the years. Gathered around the table were staff, board members, partners, local businesses, supporters, and friends both new and familiar.

The evening was more than a celebration; it was an opportunity to deepen connections and share the impact of our programs. Conversations sparked fresh interest in future group experiences and cultivated a growing awareness of Caldera’s work within the community.

This gathering also opened the door for Experience Caldera—a pathway for more fee-for-service opportunities that invites others to engage with the land and bring their own mission-aligned work to life here. All of this supports Caldera’s mission to inspire and support youth from underserved rural and urban communities by awakening the potential of their creative voice. The warmth and enthusiasm shared that night reaffirmed our commitment to fostering creativity, connection, and growth through meaningful partnerships.



Experience Caldera: FY2025

Site Rentals

In FY25, Caldera welcomed 10 community experiences to the land, including four new partners who came seeking space for reflection, creativity, and growth. Each group brought its own story and purpose, adding depth and heart to our mountain landscape.

This year, we were especially honored to host the Women’s Foundation of Oregon for their AWE retreat: three days designed to replace panels, pressure, and performance with nature, nourishment, and rest. 31 nonprofit leaders gathered in the A-frame cabins, Tamarack Hall, and new canvas bell tents to breathe, dream, and remember what wholeness feels like. Their time at Caldera became part of a larger movement—a reimagining of how rest, reflection, and community care can fuel justice for Oregon’s women and girls.



Strengthening Oregon’s Creative Ecosystem

The SFF Presents’ Song Camp also returned, filling our forest with sound and creativity. Our growing three-year partnership will continue to nurture Oregon’s vibrant music community, amplifying the role of art in collective healing and expression.

We welcomed Realms Middle School of Bend, whose students spent time on our grounds engaging in both school and Caldera-led programming, and discovering new ways to learn, explore, and connect with one another through creativity and nature.

These gatherings reflect the same spirit we nurture in Caldera learners: space to slow down, reconnect with nature, and imagine new possibilities. Every stay strengthens our creative ecosystem while supporting Caldera’s Youth Programs, all through this fee-for-service experience program that ensures young people across Oregon can continue to imagine, create, and thrive.







Supporting Research, Learning, and Youth Voice at Caldera


Thanks to the generous support of the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust, Caldera hired a new Research and Learning Specialist this year to strengthen how we understand and measure the impact of our programs.

This investment allows us to build more intentional learning systems—looking beyond attendance and uncovering outcomes to the deeper ways our young people grow and showing how creativity builds confidence, how connection sparks courage, and how time in nature inspires purpose.

Already, we're seeing powerful results: 92% of youth felt supported by at least one adult at Caldera, and 100% of our oldest learners said they could make a positive impact in their community. Through this work, we're learning how uniting creative expression and mentorship builds lasting confidence and community care.

These insights help us tell Caldera's story with greater depth and truth, capturing the "magic" that partners and families have long felt, but can now clearly see.

We're deeply grateful to the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust for making this possible and for investing in the knowledge and learning that will sustain this work for years to come.



Infrastructure & Sustainability

FY25 was a year of meaningful progress and long-term investment in Caldera's campus—work that strengthens both our environmental stewardship and the experience of all who visit the property.

Last year, we completed several major projects, including a new hydro turbine system that now generates renewable energy and feeds power back into the grid. We also celebrated the completion of a new pedestrian bridge over Link Creek, creating a safe and scenic connection between the east and west sides of campus. The bridge ties directly into the newly developed Link Creek Trail, expanding access to the land and water for artists, students, and guests alike.

Phase I of the Alpine Meeting Hall was also completed, with the full framing and exterior construction now in place—an exciting milestone toward a future gathering space designed to foster creativity, collaboration, and community. Additional enhancements included a full teardown and rebuild of the A-frame boardwalk, improving accessibility and safety across the cabins, and a new state-of-the-art AV system in the Hearth Building to support programs, performances, and presentations year-round.

Looking ahead, Caldera will continue investing in infrastructure and sustainability projects that preserve the natural beauty of the property while supporting the growing needs of our creative community.






Nearly three decades later, our facilities require critical upgrades to remain accessible, functional, and inspiring for the next generation.

Into the Future: Alpine Project Completion

Caldera is a cultural resource in Jefferson County that not only draws artists from all over the country, who spend money in the local community of Sisters when they are in residency, but also serves as a hub for creative iteration and planning for organizations like PICA (Portland Institute of Contemporary Art) and PNCA (Pacific Northwest College of Art), along with Bend Film and SFF Presents. These organizations annually hold offsites, conferences, and song camps, inspiring Caldera learners about all the aspects of creative practice. Additionally, Caldera middle school and high school learners spend 8 to 10 days every summer in this space for exploration as well as 2 to 3 weekends per year, during the school year. This demonstrates the integral role Caldera plays in supporting the local arts and cultural community.

As Caldera continues to serve more middle school and high school learners, the need for additional space for creative practice has grown. To meet this demand and expand programming with new impact partners, Caldera is also enhancing its existing facilities to provide the full Caldera experience to more people while building an ecosystem that inspires and supports artists, creatives, and cultural workers.

This year we dried-in the Alpine Project, meaning that by November 2024 it was wrapped and protected to sit quietly through the winter upon completing phase one. Just in time for last winter's epic snowfalls, the big green building, still affectionately called the Alpine, cast its new silhouette on the Caldera landscape.



The work of community partners Construction Management Services and Beebe Skidmore Architecture led to this moment so that by the time you read this report, the Alpine Project will be nearly complete, awaiting finishes by Hacker Architects from a large gift of interior design services.

The completion of the Alpine Project represents more than a construction plan—it is a community-driven initiative to strengthen Caldera's role as a regional hub for creativity, equity, and connection.


