# A Closer Look at:

Denise Acain: On the Move

An international traveler from the get-go, Denise Acain was born in Tripoli, Libya, during Kaddafi's dictatorship. Her Filipino parents, both registered nurses, were employed in hospitals there as overseas foreign workers. In 1999,

the family moved to the United Kingdom when Denise was an infant, living first in Newcastle then London. They came to the US when her parents accepted nursing positions in Sacramento, California, then two years later settled in Mill Valley.

This is where Denise finally planted deep roots. She completed her primary education here, graduated from Tamalpais High School, and still lives in Mill Valley—just a half hour's walk from The Redwoods.

Intending to follow in her parent's vocational footsteps, Denise was drawn instead to kinesiology (the study of the use of body mechanics and anatomy in relation to human movement) at San Francisco State University (SFSU), influenced by her job at a local YMCA as a physical therapy aide and wellness coach. There she learned a range of exercise, movement, and wellness skills she could apply in her profession. She made friends there and could work out for free! It was here that she also connected with the large San Francisco Filipino community, awakening in her a desire to learn more about her heritage and family that remained in the Philippines.


As a non-profit with a spiritual foundation, the YMCA predisposed Denise to find work with a similar community. Soon after she graduated

from SFSU in 2018, a position opened at The Redwoods which seemed an ideal fit for her first professional job. Residents got to know Denise first as a fitness assistant in the gym, and in exercise classes that she led. But she also provided a much-needed skill-tech support, which endeared her to many residents, particularly during the Covid pandemic.

After she was promoted to Health Care and Creekside Program Coordinator, her role was to focus on building programs for the Health Care Center and Creekside buildings. Soon after, another opportunity came up when she was offered the Director of Community Programs position. "While it's a tough job with numerous priorities," Denise noted, "I'm happy with the opportunities it provides and am delighted that I have such a diverse and talented staff to support me."

And in her spare time, Denise passionately pursues her video editing hobby which she picked up on her own. This hobby has come in handy on the job, but she particularly applies it to explore her heritage. She has made several visits to her parents' birthplaces in the Philippines to take videos to share with Americans that captured Filipino life and culture. While there she also taught English and wellness classes to residents.

If you see Denise-video camera in hand, you can be sure there's a smile on her face, whether she's on her way to a work assignment or heading off to an exotic spot to hone her video skills.

### **Library Notes**

Welcome to 2023! Here is a brief account of activities in the Redwoods library during the past three years. In 2020–2021, thanks to generous benefactors, the library bought several hundred books for the regular, Large Print, and DVD collections, and established the BLM, LBGTQIA, and Classics collections. Our last purchase was the book cart. During this time, we expanded the library to 5/7L and the Studio and established The Redwoods Authors and the California/Bay Area book sections. Besides our purchasing books, *thousands* more were donated.

In 2022 we processed approximately ten new books a week—that's 500 for the year, both resident and staff donated! That does not include the eleven Large Print books given by the Residents Council. My guess is that in total, residents read at least several thousand books a year!

Additional funds will soon be available, so watch for new books. We work with Luisa Smith of Book Passage on book selections where we receive a twenty percent discount. Finally, let's remember our dear friend **Joyce Raiche** who guided the library through the revitalization. Enjoy the library—it's a Redwoods' treasure!

### Happy 20th Anniversary Seniors for Peace!

Twenty years ago, the world was absorbed with growing tensions in Iraq. Our president was telling us we were threatened by Iraq's weapons of mass destruction. As time went by, we all learned that was a lie. But in January 2003, war was imminent.

A stalwart group of seniors at the Redwoods, many who had already lived through the agony of prior wars and came away with the conviction that the proposed involvement in Iraq was wrong. Believing they had to take some action, on January 30, 2003, this group held their first demonstration at the corner of Camino Alto and Miller, protesting the U.S.'s pre-emptive war. While the Iraq conflict officially ended in 2011, the dedicated seniors have continued the Friday demonstrations, not only calling attention to the danger and immorality of pre-emptive wars but focusing our Mill Valley neighbors' attention on the wide variety of challenges we face. Beyond demonstrations, we now run a robust speakers program, show weekly films, and sponsor numerous activists projects, including extensive voter registration efforts with Reclaim Our Vote.

In coming months, we will recall and celebrate our history and our ongoing commitment to the search for world peace, social and racial justice, and the preservation of our environment. We invite you to join us. Watch the bulletin boards throughout the campus for notices.

# Fire Department's Comprehensive Response Reassures Residents

At the November Redwoods Residents
Association meeting, guest speaker Tom
Welsh, Deputy Fire Chief of Southern Marin
Fire District, reassured residents that The
Redwoods staff and Mill Valley Fire
Department work closely together to assure
their safety. The Redwoods is a high
priority location for the fire department,
and they have in place specific plans that
include several levels of response in case of
an emergency. He supported The Redwoods
Shelter in Place policy which follows "best
practices advice".

Deputy Chief Welsh gave an overview of major disasters such as wildfires, floods, and earthquakes where The Redwoods is one of the locations designated to support evacuated survivors. While these disasters are not anticipated to require evacuation of The Redwoods, buses and ambulances are available if needed.

Concern about fires was addressed by noting that The Redwoods buildings are compartmentalized for fire safety, smoke alarms are responded to quickly in coordination with The Redwoods staff, our fire suppression sprinkler system and steel fire doors that segment every corridor on every floor meet the highest level of protection available.

[Items that readers have sent my way]

- ✓ If your nose isn't covered, you may as well not be wearing a mask. To keep your mask in the right position, twist the straps once before you put it on.
- ✓ Have you noticed that the two Creekside social workers are now in the spacious office just across from the dining room? There's a welcoming sign on the door—an open invitation for residents to seek them out. Good news all around!
- ✓ Some short take-aways from the last Food Forum:
  - While some might like to see a continuation of buffet-style meals as an option, it is not "health safe," would require a big staff increase, and would occupy too much space.
  - Our dining service is not set up as a fast-food restaurant. Eating there helps you meet new residents, keep in touch with friends—share what's going on at The Redwoods, plan to meet again. It's so much more than just a place to pick up food.
- ✓ If you are among the approximately 50% of residents who rely on a landline phone, it may be time to switch to a cell phone. Unfortunately, the type of service problems you have been experiencing can only be fixed by your provider (AT&T or Comcast). While it's a frustrating situation for you, The Redwoods staff frequently must spend time re-directing landline users to their providers. Cell phone users don't have this type of problem.

### A Scam Roundtable at The Redwoods

Scams are a real, worldwide danger that come in various forms...all designed to separate your money from you. Be aware of any unsolicited phone calls asking for personal information or threatening you with legal action, emails from friends asking for gift cards, or letters congratulating you on winning a lottery—this was the primary message delivered by Sgt. Shaun McKracken, Mill Valley Police Dept., at a December Roundtable presentation.

**Just hang up** on most unsolicited phone calls that sound suspicious. If the phone call is just questionable, hang up and verify with a reliable source. If you receive an unusual email from someone you know, verify with the sender even if the message says their phone is not working. Letters informing you of money waiting for your reply are most often a scam to be ignored. Notices of unpaid bills with threats of arrest will never be delivered by phone from the IRS or other government agency nor from private companies such as PG&E. The full outline of Sgt. McKracken's informative talk, "Safety for Seniors," is available in the Scam Binder on the table outside of the auditorium.

A recently created FBI unit, Digital Asset Technology Alliance —DATA for short, investigates cryptocurrency scams. This slide show presentation was covered by Special Agent Austin S. Miller. An information sheet outlining how to prevent being a victim, how to respond, and where to report crypto currency and digital investment scams is in the **Scam Binder**. Note that these scams often target victims who use social media or online dating platforms.
