A Closer Look at: Joyce Crews



A lot of people at The Redwoods know Joyce Crews and she, likewise, knows many of its residents. And so she should, having lived here for 11 years — since 2011. As a long-

time resident of Mill Valley, Joyce Carlson Crews watched The Redwoods being built and knew that when she retired, "that's where I would live." Now, nearly 88, she's as happy as she was the day she moved in.

Born and raised in a small town near New Haven, Connecticut, she recalls hot summer days when she and her three siblings headed for the nearby beach to swim in the warm, calm waters of Long Island Sound.

Joyce wasn't sure what she wanted to study when she went off to Mt. Ida Junior College in Brookline, Massachusetts, until she saw there was a course of study that prepared young women to become stewardesses, and she thought "that sounded like fun." So, after graduating, she qualified with TWA and flew around the country, then transferred to fly out of the West Coast to be near a boyfriend. Then in 1961, she decided to pursue her BA in English at UC Berkeley—just as the Peace Corps, a concept that really excited her, was being rolled out. Soon after graduation, Joyce

signed up and was placed in Ibadan, Nigeria, as a teacher. She loved her assignment and the culture. While there, she met and married a fellow Peace Corp volunteer and gave birth to her daughter, Bess, while continuing to teach.

After finishing their service, they toured North Africa and Europe with their 6-month-old baby before returning to her husband's home state of West Virginia. But they decided to separate, and Joyce moved with Bess to California where much of her birth family had settled. When she returned to UC Berkeley for an MA degree in library science, she met and married her second husband and had her son, Andy.

Settling in Mill Valley, Joyce worked parttime as a reference librarian in many of the local town libraries while raising her children. Later, she worked full-time at the Mill Valley Library where she particularly enjoyed helping to develop their Mill Valley History Room. After retiring in 2000, Joyce continued to volunteer at the library for several years.

In retirement Joyce indulges in her love of travel, only now she signs up with Road Scholars to explore our national parks — particularly those in the Western states, among other destinations. At The Redwoods, you'll find her working in the Scott Garden, taking long walks, singing with the Rock the Ages Choir or supporting the many outreach activities sponsored by the Mill Valley Seniors for Peace. It was her strong interest in recycling that led her to introduce this critical issue to the Redwoods Seniors for Peace group.

In her apartment, Joyce surrounds herself with stacks of books and magazines, so is never at a loss for something to read when she finally puts up her feet. She first looks out of her picture window to take in the sweeping view of Mt. Tamalpias, then reaches for a book.



He has a PhD in Government/International Relations and taught at San Diego State and Western Washington State University.

He has written three books of poetry, including Songs of Non-Enlightenment, The Bellingham Poems, and Pit/Stops. He is an award-winning playwright and former theater critic for the San Francisco Chronicle, and a photographer. (He won Best in Show at the Marin County Fair.) He is also the author of two books, Boy into Man—A Father's Guide to Initiation of Teenage Sons and Little Man Clapping—A Critic's Search for Authenticity in Art, Love, and Life.
