For the past 15 months Girija Balasubramani has served as our muchappreciated Administrative Assistant for the Redwoods Life Enrichment Programs;

coordinating its activities and programs, keeping the calendar current, and helping to make our Friday afternoon socials on the patio such joyful events. It's not a surprise that after working here for just seven months, she received the much-deserved employee of the month award.

Girija spent much of her life in Chennai, the largest city in South India with 11.5 million. She grew up in an extended family that included her parents, their siblings' families, and at one point there were five generations together in the family. She played basketball and was the state champion team captain of her secondary school's Kho-Kho team – an ancient Indian team tag game in which teammates chase and catch each other as they dodge among both teams. She graduated from the 109 years old "Queen Mary's College, Chennai" majoring in Geography-Earth Science.

She started her career in human resources, but her passion for teaching eventually drew her (Continued on next page) to teaching. Later she became the principal of a renowned Central Board school (primary to higher secondary) of about 750 students.

In a love match, she married Sukumar, a childhood neighbor eight years her senior, but choose to keep her father's last name. They have two children, a son and a daughter. Their son lives in Abu Dhabi where he works as an electrical engineer for their Electricity Board. He and his wife have been blessed with two daughters. Girija's daughter married in 2006 and they now live in Mill Valley with their two daughters. She completed her Doctorate in Molecular Cell Biology and works for Bio-Technee, an R&D company in the Bay Area; her husband is the Director of SoFi Financial Services.

Girija loves to read and has traveled widely in India and the US. She was a competitive runner for many years and participated in numerous full and half marathons, and 10K and 5K's. She is a practicing Hindu and during her recent vacation to Chennai, in celebration of her 60 years of having had a happy and successful life, chose to donate her hair to the temple, one of the spiritual practices of Hinduism.

She visited the US often through the years, but in 2020 she chose to move to Mill Valley to live with her daughter. Here, Girija has become an active vegetarian cook for the family and she loves playing "grandmother". After getting her immigrant green card in 2021, she decided to seek employment in a nearby community organization. Lucky for us, she applied to and was hired by The Redwoods!

There are anthologies, too: poetry by Canadian women, love poems, California poets; poems about science and mathematics, spiritual poetry; poems of birds and trees.

April *is National Poetry Month*, a time to celebrate your favorites, or to recall the poems you memorized throughout your school years—Frost? Dickinson? Shakespeare? It may be time to recite them again. Try these: "Two roads diverged in a yellow wood..." (by ?). "Now is the winter of our discontent.." (by ?). "I dwell in possibility..." (by ?) Answers below.

Or look for poems translated from Arabic, Spanish, Swedish, Chinese...All these treasures await you at the Poetry Corner, 3rd floor of Bldg.11 (take the elevator across from the Finance Office door). Borrow books to take home and join Wednesday noon Poetry Lovers

to hear the imagery of nature, love, loss, birth and old age – i.e., *News of the Universe* (a collection by Robert Bly), or *The Language of Life* (what Bill Moyers found in poetry).
