What to Do When a Child Has a Toothache

Common Dental Emergencies

Toothaches can range from mild discomfort to excruciating pain, and they're one of the most common dental issues kids face. It's important to know that a toothache is a sign that something isn't right and should never be ignored.

If your child complains of tooth pain:

1. **Rinse with Warm Water:** Have your child rinse their mouth with warm water. This can help to dislodge any food particles that might be stuck between the teeth.
2. **Check for Swelling:** Look inside your child's mouth for any signs of redness or swelling.
3. **Apply a Cold Compress:** If the cheek or jaw is swollen, use a cold compress to help reduce inflammation.
4. **Contact Our Office:** Give us a call immediately so we can determine the best course of action. Our team at **Just 4 kiDDS** is skilled in handling pediatric toothaches and will work to provide relief as quickly as possible.

We don't recommend giving over-the-counter painkillers directly onto the gums, as they can irritate the tissue. Instead, rely on our professional evaluation and care.

Handling Chipped or Broken Teeth

Accidents happen—whether it's a fall on the playground or a bump during sports. Chipped or broken teeth are a common dental emergency that can be stressful for both the child and parent.

Here's what you can do in the meantime:

- **Rinse the Mouth:** Have your child rinse their mouth gently with warm water.
- **Save Any Tooth Fragments:** If you can find the broken piece, place it in a clean container with milk or saline solution. We might be able to reattach it.
- **Apply a Cold Compress:** This will help reduce swelling and numb the area slightly until you can get to our office.
- **Call Us Right Away:** Our pediatric dentists are well-equipped to assess the damage and provide immediate treatment. We offer **restorative treatments**, such as **dental crowns** and **fillings**, to repair chipped or broken teeth and restore your child's smile.

What to Do If a Tooth Is Knocked Out

A knocked-out tooth is one of the more serious dental emergencies, but staying calm and acting quickly can make a huge difference. The good news is that if you act fast, there's a good chance the permanent tooth can be saved. If it's a baby tooth, do not attempt to reinsert it—we generally do not reinsert knocked-out baby teeth as they can interfere with the developing adult tooth underneath.

- **Find the Tooth:** If you can locate the tooth, pick it up by the crown (the part you chew with). Avoid touching the root.
- **Rinse the Tooth Gently:** Use water to rinse off any dirt, but don't scrub it or remove any tissue fragments.
- **Try to Reinsert the Tooth (Permanent Teeth Only):** If possible, place the permanent tooth back into its socket. If this isn't an option, keep the tooth in a container with milk or a special tooth-preserving solution.
- **Contact Us Immediately:** Time is critical in these cases. Our team at Just 4 kiDDS is trained to handle knocked-out permanent teeth and will work quickly to reinsert the tooth and prevent further damage.

Dealing with Swollen or Bleeding Gums

Swollen or bleeding gums can be alarming, especially when it happens suddenly. This could be a sign of an infection, injury, or gum disease. At Just 4 kiDDS, we take these symptoms seriously and recommend contacting us if you notice any of the following:

- **Persistent Bleeding:** If the gums continue to bleed even after applying gentle pressure.
- **Visible Swelling or Redness:** This could indicate an infection that requires prompt attention.
- **Fever or General Discomfort:** These are signs that your child might be dealing with a more serious dental issue.
