TERM ONE OVERVIEW




Introductory Workshops were completed with both Parents and Teachers (separately) at each of our 4 schools. For the parents and guardians, this workshop gave an overview of the CGP, created a call to action and a taster of what to expect. Whereas for the teachers the introduction workshop went into a little more depth, and also worked through the research and theory of change.




A brand new curriculum has been designed and developed for students in Years 7-9, addressing the attitudes and behaviours that drive gender-based violence, including an understanding of gender norms and healthy masculinities.



The curriculum is designed to include lesson plans/outlines and activities for students as well as teaching aids and videos to support the teachers delivering the content.



The curriculum sequence (5 lessons for each year level) has commenced in one of our schools this term, and will be rolled out in the remaining three schools in term 2.



Baseline survey data has been collected at all 4 CGP schools.









What is a good NPS score?





Our approach to the Common Ground pilot is informed by leading research on masculinity, identity development, and violence prevention. These insights help ensure that what we're delivering is not only engaging but also meaningful and impactful.

Here's just some of the research that's been shaping our content and delivery so far:

"Positive Masculinity in Practice: A Theoretical and Educational Framework for Boys' Development"

This paper, co-written by Ray Swann and Kate Casey from the Common Ground team, introduces a positive masculinity framework to help boys grow into more connected, motivated, and authentic versions of themselves. It encourages schools to move beyond fixing "problem behaviour" and instead support boys in shaping healthy identities, grounded in understanding, purpose, and real connection. Read more

"Educating for Change: Effective Strategies to Prevent Violence Among Boys and Young Men"

Michael Flood's report takes a deep dive into what makes violence prevention programs with boys and young men actually work—especially in school and community settings. He outlines six key ingredients for doing it well: programs should challenge harmful gender norms, be grounded in solid research, involve the whole school community, keep students engaged, reflect the local context, and be evaluated regularly so they keep improving. ANECDOTAL STORIES

"We saw students bringing their parents along to the parent workshops, showing how much these conversations resonated for them - still wearing nail polish as well."

"Staff were immediately asking how to implement the curriculum after our sessions, eager to embed the lessons."

"Over 20 staff members put their hands up to become school mentors/champions to help drive the program forward."

"Students were forming new connections with each other, breaking down barriers and strengthening their peer relationships whilst unpacking gender-based stereotypes."

"After a TM session, we saw boys actively asking the girls about their sessions, showing a genuine interest in their perspectives."





ANECDOTAL STORIES

"Many students asked when we'd be coming back, showing just how much the sessions meant to them."

"A young First Nations participant spoke about the impact of growing up with an absent male positive role models, his responsibility to support his family, and how the session reinforced the importance of breaking stereotypes."

"One student had a powerful realisation that he needed to ask for support more often rather than carrying everything on his own."

"Some students actively sought out wellbeing appointments with staff after our sessions."

"We saw students acknowledging each other's strengths and lifting each other up in ways they hadn't before."

"Students hanging around after the workshop to say thankyou and say how great it was to be part of. David (head of year level) couldn't believe how much the boys were giving of themselves in the safe space we create."





ANECDOTAL STORIES

"Boys stepped up and took ownership of their attitudes towards respect and women, showing a real shift in mindset."

"Parents messaging me on LinkedIn saying how excited they are for the Common Ground Project to start with their boys."

"Upon our return to one of the schools, a teacher approached our team and talked to how she'd already noticed a shift in how the boys were talking to one another and raving about the sessions."

"A Parent's Night at one school had over a couple of hundred partipants."







Today, the Tomorrow Man and Tomorrow Woman sessions - WoW! I would like to thank yourself and the team. The staff and students who experienced the workshops today are buzzing. It has already had an impact and I look forward to the ripple effect it could have on our community. Tomorrow Man and Tomorrow Woman clearly do amazing work that can be life changing for our young people. Your facilitation to create such a psychologically safe space for our young people is extraordinary. I am so excited for the opportunity our young people have this year – experiencing 4 sessions of these workshops could be phenomenal on our community's culture.
