Q&A WITH KYLE RUTH-ISLAS, OUR NEW CEO

ow that you've assumed the role of Chief Executive Officer, we thought you might tell us more about yourself and some of your thoughts on the future direction of The Redwoods.

Thanks for speaking with me today. First, I'm excited to step into the CEO role and want to express my gratitude to the Board of Directors, the residents, and the team, who have given me such thoughtful encouragement.

How did you become interested in senior issues?

My interest and passion for the work that we do in senior living is directly attributable to being a thirdgeneration long-term care professional. Both my father and my grandfather dedicated their careers to

the service of older adults and their support systems. It's a family legacy that I'm proud to continue.

I have many memories from childhood of going to see my father at work, and getting to spend time with the residents as well as the staff. I also recall times when my father and grandfather would be conversing about many things pertaining to the field, and it's wonderful that I now get to have that

experience with my father. This family history is certainly what sparked my interest to explore working in senior living.

What are the primary goals that you would like to achieve?

Perhaps the number one challenge that we will continue to face for the foreseeable future is the recruitment and retention of caring, dedicated, and talented professionals. In these unprecedented

A Remarkable Recovery: Resident Beth Weil ~



N DECEMBER 2018, the Redwoods community welcomed Beth Weil, a new resident who had recently endured a life-changing stroke. The stroke left Beth permanently slouched, posing significant physical and emotional challenges. Determined to support her, our team committed to helping Beth achieve the best quality of life.

Over the next five years, including during the COVID pandemic, Beth made remarkable progress. Through dedicated care and her own steadfast determination, she became increasingly active and involved in community life, taking joy in group activities such as the Rock the Ages Chorus, art classes, and bridge games.

Then one morning she had a serious accident that resulted in a broken neck which required surgery, followed by an extensive period of rehabilitation and skilled nursing care in our Health Care Center.

"The first year after my stroke, I thought about ending my life. But things gradually got better and better,

and now I feel fine. Fortunately, I've maintained my mental clarity as well," says Beth.

During these challenging times, Beth demonstrated extraordinary resilience. Following her surgery, our dedicated team created a plan of care focused on strengthening her neck and improving her posture through a combination of physical, occupational, and speech therapy.

"Beth's transformation is incredibly inspiring," explains Clinical Director of Creekside Cheril Adlam, PhD, MTh, LVN. "For the first time in many years, she's able to hold her head up high and turn to the right and left. This remarkable improvement has made a profound difference. Now, she can look forward and meet us eye-to-eye."

Beth's story is a testament to her unwavering spirit and the power of teamwork, perseverance, and compassionate care from the entire Redwoods team. She is now happily in the process of transferring back to her Assisted Living apartment, a goal that once seemed out of reach.

and psychosocial needs than in prior years. People are generally living longer than they have in the past. While that's a wonderful thing, it also creates a risk of developing certain conditions. For example, research shows that the risk of developing Alzheimer's Disease doubles every five years after the age of 65.

By expanding our clinical capabilities, we will be able to serve more people


and better address their needs. A notable step we are taking is the forthcoming opening of our Memory Care Center.

In addition, there continues to be little to no government subsidy for older adults who need assisted living, including memory care.

We will continue to find ways to maximize the affordability of our services at The Redwoods. As part of that effort, we recently launched an ambitious fundraising campaign to double the size of our Endowment Fund, which will further allow us to keep costs

down for our residents. This includes providing meaningful financial support to people who cannot afford memory care, and who would otherwise unnecessarily go to a skilled nursing facility.
