A Cut Above: Amy Vo & Bob Brock

Most of us get annoyed standing in line at the bank. But sometimes you can be in just the right place at just the right time. That's how Bob Brock met his wife, Ga Vo (better known to us as Amy). They got acquainted at a Wells Fargo branch in 2008. At the time, Bob Brock was employed by the State of California, and Amy was a refugee from Viet Nam with two children, who had been in San



Francisco for eight years. They are well known to us today as the team that keeps The Redwood Beauty Salon humming. And I do mean humming! I live just a few doors from that very busy place. There is rarely a quiet moment and often someone sitting outside waiting his/her turn.

Amy, the popular beautician at The Redwoods was among the "boat people" from Viet Nam in 1999, who were granted asylum in the United States. She was 33 years old, married and the mother of two children, ages nine and two. She was already a successful beautician when she met Bob, and they became friends. She turned to him for advice and counsel when the opportunity arose to buy her own salon in Mill Valley and they joined forces as domestic partners.

Good News for The Redwoods

Not us! But for the ones in the forest and all who cherish our incomparable inheritance. The news comes from **Save the Redwoods League** in their current edition of *Redwoods*, the League magazine. A member of the Sequoia Lands Coalition, called Redwoods Rising, serves as a model for collaboration, restoration and stewardship based in science and ecocultural knowledge. The coalition includes the State and National Parks, The Redwood League and members of many native California tribes who contribute their ancestral knowledge of TEK—several slow burns and fires that clear the underbrush and promote healthy growth.

The goal of the project is to return a healthy woodland to the original owners by 2026.

The Coalition accomplishments between 2022-2024 include:

- 44 of 80 Sequoia groves have been treated
- 617,000 trees planted
- 27,000 acres treated for forest health and resilience
- 300 miles of logging roads removed
- many buried and eroded streams uncovered

If you enjoy reading about courageous women, this book is for you. One of the authors, Marie Benedict, specializes in historical fiction about accomplished women. You are taken on a remarkable life journey of Belle de Costa Greene (1879-1950), who was J.P. Morgan's personal librarian, who, in the gilded age of 1920s New York City, collected rare books, illuminated manuscripts and art for his private library.

She spent each day passing for white in her amazing 30-year career. Her father was the first black man to graduate Harvard, who loved rare books and was active in the civil rights movement. Her mother passed for white and encouraged her children to also pass for greater opportunities. Bell listened to her mother and successfully passed in the face of racism. Daily she pretended she was white to pursue her career as librarian in the high society world of the gilded age with men of wealth and accomplishment, to amass one of the finest research collections of rare books, manuscripts and art in the country.

Applying her intelligence with boldness, ambition, collecting skills and love of art and literature, she excelled in her job. You follow her to auction houses, studios and galleries as she builds the collection. Mingling with artists, writers and collectors, is it any wonder that she has an affair with a famous art historian?

Personal Librarian also addresses the personal effects of race, gender and identity Her resilience and courage to face the world pretending she was white is a remarkable story.

Her accomplishments in having built an extraordinary collection was honored this year with a special exhibition at the Morgan Library about her contributions.

Looking for Poetry Books?

With the many references to poetry in this issue, you may be inspired to learn more about poets and poetry. The place to go is the "well hidden" poetry collection up on the 3rd floor of Building 11. Turn left when you exit the elevator and you'll find an entire wall of poetry books. This collection is not part of The Redwoods library, but one collected by poetry lovers years ago and kept in order by those who regularly go there to select books.

Birding at The Redwoods

As a follow up to the bird talk last month, Mia Rosati has created a list of resources for you to continue getting to know the birds that are seen here. She suggests free birding apps that are easy to use and help sharpen your birding skills, such as *Merlin Bird ID*. You can snap a photo or record a bird song, and the app will identify it. *eBird* keeps track of what birds you see each time you go birding and explores birdhouse spots in Marin. *iNaturalist* posts photos and helps identify birds, plants, insects and more, and shares your findings with other birders and scientists.

Attracting birds to your space requires feeders. Mia suggests seed feeders and nectar feeders, but they do need to be cleaned every two weeks. It is best to purchase or make seed mixes that include black oil sunflower seeds and white proso millet. Nectar feeders for hummingbirds shouldn't be filled with store bought nectar as they contain additives. Instead, to make your own using 1/4 cup sugar and 1 cup water that has been heated on the stove.

Having native plants creates a bird friendly garden. They provide natural food, shelter, and necessary habitats and usually need little water once established. Some suggestions are California Coffeeberry, Coyote Brush, Ceanothus, Toyon, Lupine, California Buckwheat, Snowberry, California Poppy, Western Redbud and Hummingbird Sage.

Finally, stay connected with Richardson Bay Audubon by signing up for their newsletter, visiting the grounds and joining community events where they host guided bird walks.

***** Why We Need an Applewatch

Once we reach age 70, fear of falling becomes more of a concern. If you own an iPhone, the reassurance is easy. Purchasing an **Applewatch** and wearing it 24/7 is the only device that can detect **unconsciousness**, once you have had a serious fall. If you don't respond to a voice that asks if you are OK, within one minute, your location will be immediately pinpointed by GPS. Paramedics will arrive within 10 to 15 minutes and assess the scene. If necessary, you will be transported to an ER that accepts your health insurance. Your **emergency contacts** will also be alerted.

Saltmarsh Gumplant

If you disregard the tidal saltmarsh that borders The Redwoods as a crucial ecosystem that offers flood protection, improves water quality, and provides habitat for a variety of marine species, it is easy



to consider it a drab, visually uninteresting expanse. But looking closer this time of the year, large plants with yellow "flowers" are visible from our path. "Flowers" is in quotation marks because what we are seeing are "flowerheads," a flower structure in the Sunflower family (Asteraceae) composed of hundreds of individual flowers—ray-flowers (petal like) and disc-flowers (mass in the center). You may be familiar with horticultural plants with this flower structure, such as sunflower, daisy, aster, cosmos, zinnia, rudbeckia and maybe even some wild plants, including tarplant, goldfields, and purple Pacific aster, the latter growing in profusion along the path toward Scott's garden.

The saltmarsh gumplant (*Grindelia stricta*) is a subshrub, meaning it is a perennial plant that is woody only at the base; the rest of the plant is herbaceous with flexible, green stems that usually die back in the winter. The yellow flower heads are covered by a white resin in the bud stage, hence its common name, but although there is no scientific explanation for this phenomenon, it is easy to imagine that the gummy stuff protects the flowers from insect or other damage at this stage. Saltmarsh gumplant has a variety of adaptations to allow it to grow in a saltwater habitat, but it is very noticeable that it grows in elevated areas, especially along channels, to at least avoid flooding on a daily basis.

There are some scraggly gumplants growing near the wall of the path and just outside the garden fence. However, there are no healthy, fuller plants like those along the channel some distance away!
