The measures of IQ claimed by Scientology recruiters involve two tests that produce a personality profile graph, where an individual's score is plotted on a scale ranging from +100 to -100. The test assesses various traits such as "Stable," "Happy," and "Aggressive." A Scientology staff member reviews the results with the testee. The South African campaign began with a newspaper advertisement for the Johannesburg Test Centre, offering free intelligence and personality tests for a limited time. The ad claimed that knowing one's IQ, personality, and aptitude could determine their future. Respondents were tested in the Scientology office and told that the tests were modernized and coordinated with an electro-psycho-galvanometer, making them more accurate than psychological tests. L. Ron Hubbard proclaimed the test program a success, and it was rolled out across Scientology. Today, the Oxford Capacity Analysis is used within the Church to test for improvement in a preclear's personality and the effectiveness of Scientology processes. It is also used as a recruitment tool to attract new members. The test results are often negative, with respondents being told they have issues such as depression. Hubbard instructed that the test should be given before and after processing or training, and that it should be used to promote Scientology services. The test has been used for decades as a means of attracting new members to the Church of Scientology. The results of the OCA test were overwhelmingly negative for me, with the computer print-out labeling me as overly-critical, argumentative and withdrawn. The report stated that I required 'urgent attention', which only added to my stress levels. I recall visiting the HASI centre where a university student had also gone to take the test. He was told by the staff that despite his high IQ and potential, he had a defective character, was mentally unstable, and would likely experience a mental breakdown in eighteen months if he didn't seek Scientology's help. Furthermore, he was hinted at having homosexual tendencies. Ex-Scientologists have spoken out about how the OCA test results are manipulated to emphasize everything that is ostensibly wrong with a person. Those who have taken the test described receiving similarly negative evaluations, with one young woman recalling being told that her graph showed she had an abysmal personality, but it could be fixed through Scientology courses. Hubbard's instructions for conducting the OCA tests included emphasizing the hopelessness of the individual's situation and repeatedly stating that Scientology services were necessary to salvage their predicament. The test evaluation was essentially a form of modern, scientific fortune telling that dealt with past, present, and future circumstances. A low profile, low IQ future was described as dreary and profitless unless changed through Scientology. The evaluator would typically follow a scripted approach, originally developed by Peter Greene in the 1960s, which Hubbard insisted must be memorized by heart. Although the analysis was presented as factual and scientific, it relied heavily on pre-written answers based on the test taker's score. The evaluation script for the OCA test instructs evaluators to push Scientology as the only viable solution to problems, despite mentioning alternative options like psychology and Confidence Courses solely to dismiss them. Evaluator's goal is to make the person feel impinged upon; if they resist or argue, it's seen as a sign that their reality level needs adjustment. As soon as an impingement occurs, evaluators are told to say something positive about Scientology's potential in helping with the issue at hand. In some cases, an IQ test is added to the OCA examination, and regardless of the results - from low to high IQs - Scientology is promoted as essential for improvement. The script provides scripted responses based on four levels of grading, where evaluators are instructed to highlight the benefits of Scientology training in improving one's intelligence quotient. The Oxford Capacity Analysis (OCA) has been widely used by companies through the World Institute of Scientology Enterprises for various purposes, including employee screening. Some Scientologist doctors utilize the test to evaluate patients, while others, like celebrity plastic surgeon Dr. Edward Terino, use it as a tool to rate patients on their "Trouble Scale." The test's validity and reliability have been repeatedly questioned by psychologists and experts, who point out its lack of scientific basis and intentional manipulative nature. Investigations by the British Psychological Society and Professor Emeritus Gudmund Smith have highlighted numerous methodological and empirical flaws in the OCA, describing it as a "terrible mess" that is completely unreliable. The test has been used to justify job terminations in Australia, with personnel management companies using its results to fire employees based on brutal and misleading evaluations. The Church of Scientology's claims that people are acceptable or unacceptable based on their test results don't hold up, as there's no concrete evidence to back it up. It's the interpretations and conclusions drawn from these tests that are shaky at best. The validity of the Oxford Capacity Analysis (OCA) has been questioned by experts, including the Buros Institute of Mental Measurements, which noted that any reputable test should be able to provide information to substantiate its use. Instead, the OCA evaluators have been criticized for making arbitrary and unsubstantiated claims about individuals' personalities. One person who took the OCA test reported feeling uneasy and insecure after being told their personality was trash based on no evidence at all - a sentiment echoed by psychologists who have condemned the methodological flaws of the OCA. The legitimacy of the Oxford Capacity Analysis test has been questioned by critics. The Times newspaper comments that the test is unrelated to Oxford University and suggests that Scientologists use the term to lend credibility. Various sources, including academic reports and media outlets, have raised concerns about the test's validity and purpose.
