John Andrew Bryant's memoir-style book, "A Quiet Mind to Suffer With," sheds light on mental illness and trauma, offering a hopeful perspective through Jesus' life and death. Alan Noble's "On Getting Out of Bed" is a refreshingly honest exploration of suffering and the importance of trusting Jesus' voice in times of darkness. This book reminds readers that even when they don't feel right, God's grace allows them to act right. Faith, Identity, and Race by Michelle Lee-Barnewall. Made for People: Why We Drift into Loneliness and How to Fight for a Life of Friendship by Justin Whitmel Earley, and Bully Pulpit: Confronting the Problem of Spiritual Abuse in the Church by Michael J. Kruger are three books that explore issues within Christianity. The first book discusses faith, identity, and race, while the second one looks at why people become lonely and how to combat it. The third book delves into spiritual abuse in churches and offers solutions. In Bully Pulpit, author Michael J. Kruger defines and diagnoses spiritual abuse in a clear and biblical manner. He calls out abusive pastors and leadership cultures that allow them to thrive. He urges churches to identify, repent of, and root out these tactics to create a safer environment for all members. Another notable book is In Church as It Is in Heaven: Cultivating a Multiethnic Kingdom Culture by Jamaal E. Williams and Timothy Paul Jones. This book provides practical steps for restoring multiethnic ministry and features personal stories of triumph and failure. The authors have successfully implemented their approach in their own church, making it a valuable resource for other churches. Finally, Pastor, Jesus Is Enough: Hope for the Weary, the Burned Out, and the Broken by Jeremy Writebol and The Great Dechurching: Who's Leaving, Why Are They Going, and What Will It Take to Bring Them Back? by Jim Davis and Michael Graham are two more books that offer guidance on faith-related issues.
