Some researchers believe that writing can be a means to access mental states of atypical individuals, such as geniuses or criminals. The obsessive urge to write, known as graphomania, is a morbid symptom that can manifest in various forms. Some individuals may have a natural inclination to write excessively, but for others, it becomes an all-consuming mental activity that annoys those around them. In a psychiatric context, graphomania refers to a mental condition characterized by meaningless written ramblings and confused statements. Beyond the psychiatric realm, graphomania can be seen as an overwhelming need to write excessively, often without any professional obligation. This phenomenon is relatable to many. Czech novelist Milan Kundera noted that graphomania tends to spread rapidly in societies with high general wellbeing, social atomization, and a lack of significant social change. He observed that even individuals from diverse backgrounds, such as politicians, taxi drivers, and doctors, have an inherent desire to write. Despite the existence of early 20th-century papers on graphomania, there is a scarcity of academic and clinical research on the topic. One such paper, written by Dr. F.T. Hunter in 1921, described graphomania as a "psychopathic tendency to write." He differentiated between normal and abnormal writing by identifying writings that lacked factual content, ideas, or personal artistic expression. More recently, a 1988 French neurology journal reported on a case of compulsive graphic activity resulting from a fronto-callosal glioma. The researchers noted that spontaneous and graphomaniac writing were abundant and uncontrollable, comparable to the compulsive behavior seen in other brain lesions.
