Named to the Global Cycling Network's Top Five Gravel Events[2] and Nine Coolest Races of 2018,[3] the event is known as the World's Largest Gravel Road Race.[2] The course is located in Barry County, Michigan near the Gun Lake Unit of Yankee Springs Recreation Area. Most years, Barry-Roubaix consists of rolling gravel roads (80%), pavement, one mile of rough two-track, rocks, sand, mud, and possibly snow and ice, along with 2200 feet of climbing.[4] The race features three distinct levels of competition corresponding to different race course distances. The Beginner/Intermediate riders complete a 22-mile course, the Expert riders complete a 36-mile course, and the Elite/Pro riders complete a 62-mile course. The name "Barry-Roubaix" was selected in a naming competition; it is a reference to the famous spring classic Paris-Roubaix one day professional cycling race held in France.[5] Barry-Roubaix is held annually on the third Saturday in April unless Easter happens to fall on that weekend. Participants use a variety of bicycle types (cyclocross, mountain, road, fat), depending on course conditions and individual preferences. The first Barry-Roubaix event took place in 2009 at the Long Lake Outdoor Center in Middleville, Michigan. In 2010, it moved to the Gun Lake beach area due to anticipated growth. The 2011 edition was marked by very cold conditions and a large number of participants, but only about half completed the courses. The Barry-Roubaix event, a 62-mile gravel road race, saw Rudyard Peterson taking the top spot with a time of 2:54:56, narrowly beating the rest. The male winner was part of Team Credit Velo-Trek from Michigan, USA. On the other hand, Rachel Langdon from Kentucky, USA dominated the women's side by finishing almost seven minutes ahead of Christine Thornburg from Illinois, USA. Barry County, Michigan has seen significant economic growth thanks to the event, with its annual impact now exceeding US\$500,000. To avoid conflicts with Easter in 2016, the event was pushed back until April 16, which presented riders with a unique challenge - heat. The race saw dry and dusty conditions making it a fast-paced event. The 2018 edition of Barry-Roubaix marked its tenth anniversary, commemorated by adding a longer course for participants. The event featured four cycling races simultaneously: Panaracer Psycho-Killer (100 miles), SRAM Corporation Killer (62 miles), Smith Optics Thriller (36 miles), and Lauf Chiller (22 miles). Jacobi, a cyclist from Grand Rapids, Michigan, completed the 36-mile Thriller gravel race on a vintage Penny-farthing high wheeler bike, raising over \$10,000 for Gilda's Club. Barry-Roubaix is a popular cyclocross event held in Barry County, Michigan. The race has gained popularity over the years, with its challenging courses featuring rolling gravel roads, pavement, rough two-track, rocks, sand, and mud. In 2015, Ferrand Prevot won the Women's Elite World Championship, while Mackenzie Woodring took the top spot in the men's category at the Barry-Roubaix Gravel Race. The event has seen significant growth, with the addition of new signs permanently designating the race routes. The routes range from 18 to 100 miles and include a "surprise" section on private property for the longer courses. Cyclocross Magazine has covered the event extensively, including its 2016 and 2017 editions. The magazine's coverage includes reports on the winners, interviews with riders, and analysis of the challenging course conditions. In addition to its cyclocross aspects, Barry-Roubaix is also gaining attention for its gravel road racing series, which attracts riders from around the country. The event has been recognized by local authorities, including the Hastings Banner, which celebrated its success in 2017. The Barry-Roubaix Killer Gravel Road Race has become a premier event on the American UltraCX Championship Series calendar, with riders competing for prizes and bragging rights in one of the toughest gravel road races in the country.
