New York's flagship university, UB, offers a diverse range of over 500 degree programs, making it the No. 1 university in the Northeast for its academic variety. Whether you're interested in cognitive science or dance, there's a path for everyone to pursue their passion. With a strong focus on research and innovation, UB is ranked #36 among public universities in the U.S. and is a member of the prestigious AAU. The university also boasts a 12:1 student-to-faculty ratio, ensuring a personalized learning experience. Students can view their enrollment appointment information starting from October 8th in their HUB Student Center. Appointments are assigned based on completed credit hours, with priority given to those who have accumulated more credits. Various groups of students will have different appointment dates and times, including undergraduate students, graduate students, and PharmD students. The spring 2025 academic calendar is set by the Faculty Senate and University President. Key dates include the first day of classes on January 22nd, last day to drop/add on January 29th, and final examinations from May 16-18. The university also offers a 7-week session 1 and 2 calendar, with specific dates for each. UB is not only a hub for academic excellence but also a leader in research and climate action, ranking #1 in NYS for research activity and #2 in the U.S. for climate action. The Registrar will handle all preclinical registrations. It's essential to provide your accurate email address, home address, and phone number to the Offices of Student and Academic Affairs. After completing formal courses, you'll need to successfully finish a dedicated study period, known as IMC631. More information about the USMLE Step 1 exam is provided below. Your course schedule includes IMC602 Human Cardiovascular System, IMC604, IMC606/IMC610 Neuroscience and Behavior, IDM620 Clinical Practice of Medicine III, and others. Exam dates are as follows: IMC602 on 7/30, 8/16, and the final on 8/26; IMC604 on 9/16, 9/30, and the NBME on 10/2. You'll also have exams for IMC606 Neuroscience, IMC620 Clinical Practice of Medicine II, and others, with dates to be determined. Important dates to note include Labor Day on September 2, MS2 Interprofessional Forum on November 7, Thanksgiving Break from November 27 to December 1, and Winter Break from December 21 to January 5. You must take the STEP 1 exam by Sunday, May 11, 2025, and can register online at nbme.org or usmle.org. The office will provide additional directions for completing the registration process. Prior to starting your third year, you're required to pass Step 1 of the USMLE. Failure to pass will result in being held out of the next clerkship until successful re-examination, and a second failure will require a leave of absence. A passing grade is recorded, with three chances to pass Step 1 USMLE before dismissal from the school. All students participate in the same six required clerkships during third year, with schedules determined by random placement in spring of second year. Third year also allows for two electives and elective selection takes place in April and November. Students will have six 6-week clerkships in family medicine, obstetrics, pediatrics, psychiatry, medicine, surgery, as well as one 4-week elective. Dilemmas in Clinical Medicine is an ongoing course addressing medical ethics topics. More information is available on MedHub and UB email. On King Day, students are expected to use the time for reflection and writing a journal entry as previously outlined. Some students may opt to work on Martin Luther King Day, which is acceptable, but they must notify both the clerkship office and their attending or resident team if they plan to report on Monday. The written work should be submitted to the clerkship directors for review. It's essential to keep team members informed of your schedule to ensure a positive experience for everyone. Mandatory attendance is required for the MS3 - Interprofessional Education Forum and Third Year Meetings, with dates and times listed on UBLeads. During the intersession period, there will be a two-week vacation for all students, although the exact dates may vary from year to year. Students are not allowed to take vacation time outside of this two-week winter break, and out-of-town electives are not permitted during the third year. Any academic deficiencies from the third-year clerkships and courses must be resolved before promotion to the fourth year. If a student fails a clerkship clinically, they must repeat the entire clerkship over a 6-to-8 week period during the first block of the fourth year. A student who passes clinically but fails the examination requires remediation, which can be either repeating the entire clerkship or participating in a concentrated remedial experience. Failure to pass the remedial experience or repeating the clerkship and failing again will result in a second clerkship failure, making the student subject to dismissal from the school. All third-year students must pass the Third Year Clinical Competency Exam in the spring of their third year to be promoted to the fourth year. This exam serves as a practice for the USMLE Step 2 Clinical Skills (CS) exam. Required fourth-year courses are scheduled through the lottery system in MedHub, which takes place in the spring of the third year. Students will receive instructions on how to complete the lottery and structure their fourth-year schedule before it opens. Fourth-year electives are registered on a first-come, first-served basis in Hub after the lottery results are announced. Instructions on registration will be sent to your UB email. To graduate, you must pass Step 2 CK. To participate in the Match, you must meet specific deadlines: take Step 2 CK by December 31 of your fourth year. All students applying for residency need an MSPE (dean's letter). The Office of Student and Academic Affairs will send more information about MSPE to your UB email. A meeting with a dean will be scheduled during your spring third year, allowing time to review your MSPE before submission in the fourth year. Important dates include: Modules Begin on July 1, 2024; ERAS Applications Opens September 4, 2024; and Main Residency Match NRMP Registration Deadline is September 16, 2024. You are required to complete Step 2 Exam by December 31, 2024. The curriculum allows you to plan your educational program with faculty advisement. Elective courses give students the opportunity to try out career choices, gain clinical experience, or re-examine basic medical sciences. The fourth year is divided into eleven modules (A-K). You are required to take seven four-week courses, including Neurology and Advanced Clerkship in Medicine. You may fill the rest of your schedule with electives at UB or away, using VSAS for away applications. Up to three modules of unscheduled time are also allowed. The Gold Humanism Honor Society has created a Fourth Year Survival Guide available on UBLeads in your Office 365. Medical Education class under Course Documents provides valuable insights and detailed information on various topics relevant to fourth-year medical students. Fourth-Year Course Descriptions Note: If Basic Neurology (NEU801) was taken as a third-year elective, additional electives must be completed during fourth year. A total of 7 courses must be completed during fourth year. Other Important Course Information: Required courses in Medicine and Neurology will be determined by lottery. Students must register for a course at least 4 weeks prior to the start date of the module. No course or elective may be taken twice, except for research and away electives which are exceptions. Up to two modules of research may be taken in fourth year; this option is not available to MD/PhD students. No more than two away electives may be taken at different clinical experiences. A maximum of one international elective is allowed with that elective counting toward the two away electives. No more than three electives may be taken locally in any single departmental division. All drop/add forms must be approved and signed by the course director (not the department chair); it must then be sent to the registrar in the Office of Student and Academic Affairs no later than 6 weeks before the module begins. Double registration is not allowed; the only exception is when an away elective is pending. Once the away elective is confirmed, the other course/elective must be dropped using the drop/add form. Any course or elective failure must be made up within 2 modules. No retroactive registration is permitted for any course (local or away). Away Electives You may take out-of-town electives at any of the more than 200 clinical institutions and hospitals with which we have affiliation agreements. Learn more about Away Electives Clinical Affiliation Agreements and Student Liability Insurance Overview The purpose of an affiliation agreement between UB and an affiliated institution is to advance UB students' educational programs in a particular educational discipline. Student Affiliation Agreements: Understanding Coverage and Liability SUNY purchases commercial insurance for student liability claims against students, covering defense costs and indemnification in case of a lawsuit. Without a written agreement, coverage is limited or non-existent. Clinical experiences with healthcare providers who are friends, relatives, or neighbors of the student may not be covered. Policy Limits The policy provides \$3 million aggregate coverage for bodily injury and property damage. Experiences outside the continental US are subject to SUNY's liability policy and require separate insurance coverage. Clinical Experiences and Liability Exposure SUNY's student liability policy covers affiliation agreements within the continental US. However, clinical experiences in Canada may require separate insurance coverage due to limited coverage. Establishing an Affiliation Agreement To participate in a clinical experience or work in a physician's office, research laboratory, or hospital/clinic: 1. Check with the Office of Student and Academic Affairs (OSAA) for current affiliation agreements. 2. Complete a "Student Affiliation form" and submit it to OSAA at least 12 weeks before the experience begins. 3. Register for an appropriate course through designated channels if an affiliation agreement is in place or has been established. Applying to Residency Most students apply to residency via ERAS, with their MSPE letter being a crucial component of the application. Letters of Recommendation and personal statements are also essential. Students applying to Ophthalmology, Urology, or military programs should contact the Office of Student and Academic Affairs for specific guidance. For additional details on the process specific to these fields, the Gold Humanism Honor Society has created a Fourth Year Survival Guide, accessible through UBLeads in the Office of Medical Education class under Course Documents. This guide offers valuable tips and more detailed information on various topics relevant to fourth-year medical students. Program Planning Advisers, faculty members, and the dean's staff in the Office of Medical Education are available to assist third- and fourth-year students with program planning. Special scheduling requests must be approved by the Office of Student and Academic Affairs. Individual programs may be modified if deemed educationally beneficial. Graduation honors, including Latin, research, or thesis honors, can be attained by meeting specific requirements, such as writing a thesis for review or providing evidence of continuous research leading to publications or presentations. Visiting students from other U.S. medical schools must complete an application process through VSAS to take fourth-year clinical electives at affiliated hospitals or institutions. The Office of Student and Academic Affairs administers this program, which prioritizes domestic medical students due to high demand. The 2025-2026 academic calendar begins with mandatory orientation on July 14, 2025, and includes various courses such as Medicine and Society, Foundations of Patient Centered Care, and Learning Communities, with specific start and stop dates for each. All third-year med students have to write a journal entry about a time they prejudged or disrespected someone in a clinical setting or daily life. This reflection is due one week after Martin Luther King Day. It's meant to help students identify their own biases and find ways to overcome them, leading to better self-awareness and more compassionate care for others. Students assigned to closed clinics on January 19, 2026, are expected to use this time for reflection and writing. Some may choose to work on January 19th, but they need to notify the clerkship office and their attending/resident team in advance. The written work should be submitted to the clerkship directors for review. It's also a good idea to keep team-members informed of your schedule. Graduation ceremonies are scheduled for April 30, 2027, and June 1, 2026 (tentative), with degree awards following. Academic modules have specific start and stop dates throughout the year.
