


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Ma'at and the Ten Commandments: A Historical Misconception The notion that the Ten Commandments were derived from the forty-two precepts of Ma'at in ancient Egyptian religion has gained traction among some skeptics, but it is a claim that lacks credibility when examined historically, theologically, and logically. Historians have incorrectly dated the origins of the Ten Commandments in relation to Egypt's Ma'at principles: A significant timeline gap exists between the written forms of Ma'at (1550-1070 BC) and the dating of the exodus (1446 BC). Unlike Ma'at, the ancient Egyptian principle of truth and balance, the Decalogue is rooted in a covenant relationship between Yahweh and His people. Rather than undermining the Ten Commandments, comparisons with Ma'at highlight their unparalleled depth, coherence, and authority. The Decalogue is not merely an ancient relic but a living testament to the holiness of God and His call for humanity to reflect His character.
