If any images are missing, ensure your printer is set to display background images. Cut out individual cards from each page, then laminate or use cardstock for durability. Store the cards and an answer key in a secure location like a ziplock bag or bind them together with loose leaf binder rings. To assess student progress and achievement levels, consider using task cards as homework. Print black-and-white versions of task card pages and an answer recording sheet for each student. This allows students to practice their skills at home and assess their understanding. Task cards can also be incorporated into board games to add a skill practice dimension. Before taking a turn, players must draw a task card and answer correctly or risk losing the turn. Whole-class games like "Scoot!" involve distributing task cards and recording sheets among students. When instructed to "scoot," students move to the next number task card and complete an answer. The game concludes when every student has filled out their recording sheet, allowing for self-assessment against a provided answer key or collective assessment by the teacher. Looking at the classroom, establish a time frame and give each student or pair of students an answer recording sheet and pencil. They need to find all the cards on the sheet. When they locate one card, they write down its number, then look for the matching number on their recording sheet and fill in the answer there. Once they've discovered all the cards and completed their recording sheets (or when the time limit runs out), students bring back their sheets with the time written on them, which are checked against the Answer Key. If a student's answer is incorrect, it doesn't count as being found. The student or pair who finds the most cards wins. In case of a tie, they're declared winners based on their completion time.
