OnlyFans is a popular internet content subscription service that allows creators to upload videos and earn money through monthly subscriptions, tips, and pay-per-view. Founded in London in 2016, the platform has gained a significant following among sex workers who produce pornography, as well as other content creators such as athletes, musicians, and comedians. The company's revenue has grown significantly, with over \$1.30 billion generated in 2023, and it has more than three million registered creators and 220 million registered users. However, OnlyFans has faced criticism for not doing enough to prevent child sexual abuse material from circulating on the platform. In response to pressure from banks and the US Congress, OnlyFans initially decided to remove sexually explicit content but later reversed this decision due to backlash from users and creators. The company takes 20% of the fees earned by creators, who receive an average of \$1,300 per year. OnlyFans is part of the creator economy and allows subscribers to pay creators in various ways. While it was initially associated with pornography, the platform also hosts other types of content, including chefs, fitness trainers, and musicians. OnlyFans, a platform founded by Tim Stokely in 2016, has seen significant growth and influence since its inception. Initially aimed at musicians and influencers, the site later shifted focus to include adult content, which drove its early success. By 2020, OnlyFans had grown exponentially, with 85 million users and over 1 million creators generating more than \$2 billion in sales that year. In 2021, OnlyFans was named one of Time's 100 Most Influential Companies, while Fast Company recognized it as one of the 10 most innovative social media companies. The Financial Times also listed OnlyFans as one of the fastest-growing companies in Europe for 2022 and 2023. The platform's success can be attributed to its ability to allow creators to directly monetize their content and interactions. Amateur and professional sex workers played a significant role in driving growth, with the COVID-19 pandemic further accelerating expansion. The site saw a surge in popularity after being mentioned by Beyoncé in her remix of Megan Thee Stallion's song "Savage" in 2020. As of December 2021, Tim Stokely stepped down as CEO, with Amrapali Gan taking over. In July 2023, lawyer Keily Blair was appointed the new CEO. In August 2021, concerns about child sexual abuse material led OnlyFans to announce a ban on sexually explicit content starting October 1st of the same year. This decision was made public through their new Terms of Service Policy. Although nudity would still be allowed in some cases, the reason for this shift was initially attributed to pressure from credit card companies like Mastercard. However, CEO Tim Stokely later stated that the real reason was due to financial institutions such as BNY Mellon and JPMorgan Chase withdrawing their support, with Mastercard having no impact on the decision. The backlash from creators and consumers was significant, but six days after the initial announcement, OnlyFans reversed its decision, citing that they had secured necessary assurances. This move coincided with an increase in popularity for alternative platforms like Fansly, which had a website design and functionality almost identical to OnlyFans. Lawsuits filed against OnlyFans in 2022 alleged that employees of Meta were bribed to add Instagram accounts of OnlyFans creators to a terrorist blacklist, effectively shadow banning them. OnlyFans denied any knowledge of such activities. The bribery claim was later withdrawn, and the case was dismissed due to lack of jurisdiction over OnlyFans, which is based in the UK. In 2024, Judge William A. Alsop ruled that performers failed to show that Meta interfered with their contracts or violated unfair competition law. Additionally, content creators from Russia and Belarus faced difficulties withdrawing funds or being excluded from the platform as a result of economic sanctions following the Russian invasion of Ukraine. OnlyFans stated that this was due to worldwide financial restrictions limiting their methods for paying Creator accounts linked to these countries. Later, they restored full functionality to these accounts. In 2022, OnlyFans temporarily paused Russian creators' accounts. Investigative articles in 2024 revealed that many creators relied on chatters or chatbots to impersonate themselves in messages with subscribers, despite promising direct connections on their profiles. Onlyfans faced heat over its handling of underage users. Lawsuits were filed against the company, alleging it was defrauding consumers. To combat this issue, Onlyfans made prospective creators submit multiple forms of identification and documents. However, in 2021, BBC News found that it could bypass these security measures. UK police criticized Onlyfans for not doing enough to protect children, but Ofcom praised its use of verification tools. A BBC documentary highlighted the problem of underage users sharing explicit content on Twitter, many using Onlyfans. The platform was accused of failing to stop minors from selling and appearing in explicit videos. A report by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children found fewer than 100 instances of child sexual abuse material per year on Onlyfans. The issue sparked a bipartisan coalition pressuring the US Department of Justice to investigate Onlyfans for child exploitation, citing reports of sex trafficking and image-based abuse. Over 100 members of Congress signed the petition. Later, Onlyfans released its first transparency report detailing its safety compliance program, stating it uses machine learning classifiers and hashes to locate CSAM content. However, the report was criticized for being unclear and limited in scope. The company's efforts were seen as inadequate by some, with Gizmodo and The Verge questioning the accuracy of the figures provided. In 2022, Onlyfans donated \$500,000 to the Child Rescue Coalition for a project aimed at investigating child exploitation. OnlyFans partnered with StopNCII.org to combat revenge porn and non-consensual image sharing, using a hash function system. Despite this, Reuters reported 30 complaints over five years involving explicit child content, including some with adults having sex with toddlers. The Internet Watch Foundation praised OnlyFans for its online safety efforts, while the NCMEC commended its participation in initiatives to detect and remove abusive content. In February 2020, up to four terabytes of hacked OnlyFans content went viral on social media, sparking concerns about security posture. Forensic News reported that some creators' accounts were deleted without warning, leaving them unable to access their balances. The company launched its creative fund in March 2021, providing £20,000 grants to emerging musicians. OnlyFans also released the OFTV app and streaming site with safe content, featuring professional boxers and DJs. A reality fashion show, Creative Fund: Fashion Edition, was launched in 2022, judged by Rebecca Minkoff, Law Roach, and others. The show featured a £25,000 prize fund. A trend on OnlyFans saw creators offering free access to sexual content in exchange for charity donations. In January 2020, Kaylen Ward raised US\$1 million for charity during the Australian bushfires. OnlyFans has experienced significant growth and controversy since its launch in 2017. In 2020, new user Thorne generated \$2 million in just one week, including \$1 million in a single 24-hour period. However, her promise of nude photos was met with disappointment when only lingerie shots were shared, leading to numerous chargebacks. Following this incident, OnlyFans made changes to its payment terms and limitations on creator earnings, which some sex work advocates criticized as being driven by Thorne's actions. In response to the backlash, Bhad Bhabie broke Thorne's record in 2021 by earning \$1 million in just six hours, although her early launch at age 18 sparked criticism from social media users. The platform has since gained numerous high-profile creators, including Carmen Electra and Alexandra Hunt, who have all used their platforms to raise money for various causes. In 2022, Amouranth reportedly earned \$1.5 million per month on the site, with total earnings of over \$33 million since her 2020 launch. Despite its growth, OnlyFans has faced criticism and controversy over its policies and practices. In 2023, the company announced a change in its approach to pornography, stating that it would no longer ban explicit content. This decision was met with mixed reactions from users and advocates alike. OnlyFans, a subscription-based platform for creators, has seen significant growth since its inception. According to recent reports, the site now boasts over 3 million content creators and has become a global business. The platform's success can be attributed in part to the growing demand for intimate and explicit content during the pandemic. The site's owner made headlines when they received \$500 million in dividends in two years, highlighting the financial rewards available to successful creators on the platform. However, not all creators have been as fortunate. Some have shared their struggles with making ends meet while working on OnlyFans, citing the risk of homelessness and financial insecurity. Despite these challenges, OnlyFans has been credited with helping to boost the creator economy. The platform has been recognized for its innovative approach to social media, earning a spot in Fast Company's 2021 list of most innovative companies. Its success has also led to increased recognition and legitimacy for sex workers, who are now seen as entrepreneurs rather than marginalized individuals. However, the rise of OnlyFans has not been without controversy. The platform has faced criticism over its handling of sexually explicit content, with some accusing it of prioritizing profits over creator well-being. In response, the site has implemented new policies aimed at reducing the visibility of explicit content and improving user safety. As the platform continues to grow, so too do concerns about its impact on creators' mental health and financial stability. Research has shown that OnlyFans users tend to hold more permissive attitudes towards sex and relationships, but also experience higher levels of anxiety and stress related to their online presence. The future of OnlyFans remains uncertain, with some predicting a slowdown in user growth due to rising inflation and increased competition from other platforms. However, the site's CEO has expressed optimism about its continued success, citing the platform's unique business model and loyal user base. Overall, OnlyFans represents both the opportunities and challenges of the creator economy, where individuals can earn significant profits through online content creation but also face risks to their financial stability and mental health. OnlyFans to Redefine Porn Industry. In 2021, OnlyFans announced it would not ban porn on October 1st, as initially planned. This decision was reported by various news outlets, including The Verge, KMGH, and Financial Times. The platform had previously stated it would suspend "sexually explicit" content, but later reversed this decision. Meanwhile, other sites, such as Fansly, emerged as potential competitors to OnlyFans. However, OnlyFans faced allegations of bribing Meta to thwart its rivals, with lawsuits claiming the platform had creators put on a "terrorist blacklist." The company won dismissal in an Instagram traffic conspiracy case and later beat a lawsuit claiming it blacklisted competitors. Russian OnlyFans models were affected by sanctions amid the invasion of Ukraine, with some accounts temporarily paused. An investigation by Reuters revealed that OnlyFans' success was fueled by deception, with some creators using AI bots to engage with users. The platform has also faced criticism for its handling of explicit content and protection of minors, with a documentary highlighting the dark side of OnlyFans. Despite this, some defenders argue that the platform provides a necessary service, with one creator earning over £20k a month selling nudes online. OnlyFans has faced numerous controversies and criticisms since its launch in 2016. The platform has been accused of exploiting its creators, failing to adequately prevent child exploitation, and having lax content moderation policies. Many experts have raised concerns about the platform's lack of effective safety measures, which has led to instances of child sex abuse and revenge porn. Some politicians, including a congresswoman named Ann Wagner, have called for an investigation into OnlyFans by the Department of Justice (DOJ) to address concerns about child exploitation on the platform. Other experts have pointed out that Visa and Mastercard are being blamed for their role in OnlyFans' decision to ban certain types of content. In recent months, OnlyFans has attempted to rebrand itself as a more family-friendly platform. The company has launched initiatives such as a \$100,000 comedy competition and a fund for emerging musicians. However, some experts remain skeptical about the platform's commitment to safety and moderation. In 2022, it was reported that terabytes of stolen adult content from OnlyFans had leaked online, highlighting ongoing issues with data security and intellectual property protection on the platform. Despite efforts to improve its reputation, OnlyFans continues to face criticism for its handling of sensitive content and its impact on its creators.
