Google has launched its audiobooks service, Google Play Audiobooks, a move that was expected given the platform's existing services like eBooks, music, and movies. The number of audiobooks available for listening through Google isn't publicly disclosed. Instead, Google might be avoiding comparisons with competitors like Audible. Audible is an established leader in the audiobook segment, offering over 400,000 titles and a wide range of best sellers. Its long history has made it the go-to destination for audiobook enthusiasts.
