PROJECT OUTLINE

PROJECT TITLE

Write the title of your project. Use one short sentence.

ABSTRACT

Write a short summary of your project. Use no more than 10 sentences.

PROBLEM STATEMENT

Write the question you want to investigate. Use 1–2 sentences.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Describe your project in 5 - 6 pages. You must write about what you want to investigate, how you plan to do it, and why your project is important. Write so that readers from other fields can understand your project.

WHAT (one page)

Describe one or more aspects of Universal Design that you want to learn more about during your exchange visit. Explain how this knowledge will strengthen your teaching and curriculum development. Explain how your project helps create a more inclusive society for everyone in Denmark

HOW (one page)

Describe where you will carry out your studies. Write about how you plan to organize your exchange visit. Write about the academic places, facilities and people you want to involve.

WHY (one page)

Describe what professionally motivates you to carry out this investigation. Your answer must also include:

- *How your exchange visit will improve teaching practices, policies or subjects in a Danish context*
- *How your investigation uses inclusive approaches to people and explores Universal Design as a value-based design principle*
- *How your exchange visit will strengthen your teaching and curriculum development in Universal Design*
- *The expected impact at your home institution*

UNIVERSAL DESIGN APPROACH (5–10 sentences)

Describe how you will include universal design in your project.

NEW KNOWLEDGE ON UNIVERSAL DESIGN (5–10 sentences)

Describe what new knowledge you expect to find on Universal Design.

FREE TEXT (5-10 sentences)

Describe what personally motivates you to carry out this investigation.

REFERENCES (½ - 1 text page)

List your references. References can be literature, cases or other sources.

ILLUSTRATIVE MATERIAL (OPTIONAL) (1 - 4 pieces)

You can include illustrative material in your project proposal. This is not mandatory. Illustrative material can be drawings, figures, models, tables or photos. You can use your own or existing material. This material must support your descriptions of what you want to investigate, how you plan to do it, and why your project is important.

Format Requirements:

Use the form above to write your project proposal. The form is A4, 1.5-line spacing, 10-point font, and 2.54 cm margins, and has page numbers.

- Use headings and/or bullet points to organize and convey key elements
- Save your file as a PDF
- Do not include links to external websites.

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
