By June 1972, Chuck Berry was already in legacy mode, having made a significant impact on the sound of rock and roll as possibly its sole architect. However, his career had been marked by numerous highs and lows, including run-ins with the law and personal struggles that tarnished his image. Amidst this turmoil, Berry's live performances were underwhelming due to his preference for using local musicians rather than a dedicated band. This often resulted in subpar backing groups. Berry's professional output was also waning, with no chart-topping singles in the UK since 1965's 'Promised Land'. It wasn't until he took the stage at the Lanchester Arts Festival in Coventry, England on February 3rd, 1972, backed by future members of The Average White Band, that Berry's music seemed to come alive. He performed a few classic tracks and then introduced his new single, 'My Ding-a-Ling', which would become his only number one hit. 'My Ding-a-Ling' was a novelty track written by Dave Bartholomew about a young man playing with silver bells that descends into risqué double-entendres. Berry's live rendition was spirited but also crass, far removed from his usual high-energy rock and roll. Despite being first performed in 1967, the version from Lanchester Arts Festival propelled 'My Ding-a-Ling' to number one in both the US and UK. The song's success was partly fueled by a campaign led by notorious prude Mary Whitehouse to ban it from the BBC. Once it became a hit, Berry continued to play 'My Ding-a-Ling' at live shows until 2014. However, many consider it an unfortunate anomaly rather than a testament to his musical greatness. While many consider "My Ding-a-Ling" a senseless novelty song, its writer Dave Bartholomew was quite proud of it. He had actually released a similar-sounding song called "Little Girl Sing Ding-a-Ling" in 1952, which some claim as the original version. Chuck Berry covered the song in 1972 and turned it into his only number-one hit on the Billboard Hot 100 chart. Despite its popularity, Berry's music career was marked by a lack of top-charting hits after "My Ding-a-Ling", with the exception of a live recording of "Johnny B. Goode" that featured Pink Floyd. The song has an interesting backstory, as it was originally intended to be about a ring sliding onto a finger as a metaphor for sex, but Berry toned down the lyrics and recorded it in 1968 under the title "Little Girl Sing Ting-A-Ling". He later reworked the song into "Ding-a-Ling" in 1972, which became a huge hit. The single was released with "Let's Boogie" as its B-side in some countries and "Johnny B. Goode (Live)" in others. The song "My Ding-a-Ling" has its roots in 1952 when Dave Bartholomew recorded it for King Records. However, the version that gained popularity was recorded by Chuck Berry live at the Lanchester Arts Festival in Coventry, England, on February 3, 1972. This performance topped the charts and became the first song to knock Michael Jackson's "Ben" off the number one spot. The song is based on a traditional folk melody and tells the story of a boy who receives a toy consisting of silver bells from his grandmother. The lyrics contain a double entendre that has led to controversy, with some radio stations refusing to play it due to its innuendo and perceived indecency. My Ding-a-Ling peaked at number one on the Australian singles chart in 1972, according to RPM Top 100 Singles chart for October 21, 1972. It also reached number one in West Germany and number seven in Norway. In the UK, it peaked at number one on both OCC and UK Chart. The song was certified gold by RIAA with over 1 million units sold in the United States. Chuck Berry's "My Ding-A-Ling" was a unique song in his discography, being his only number one single in both the US and UK. The song, recorded in 1972 during the Lanchester Arts Festival, was an upbeat ditty replete with double entendres. During its performance at the Locarno Ballroom, Berry coaxed the audience to sing along, resulting in a humorous interaction between men and women. Despite its playful nature, "My Ding-A-Ling" has received criticism from some fans. However, Berry himself considered it one of his better songs, as it catered to the desires of his audience. Berry's approach to performing was centered around giving people what they wanted, as evident in an interview with Rolling Stone in 2010. He believed that a performer should be able to adapt to their audience, which led him to switch between songs like "My Ding-A-Ling" and more serious pieces like the Lord's Prayer.
