Lottery Draw Schedules and Games The Illinois Lottery operates under the Illinois State Lottery. The drawings are supervised by an independent auditor who certifies the winning results. Illinois offers several games, including Mega Millions, Powerball, Lotto, Pick 3, and Pick 4.Illinois Lottery operations underwent significant changes in recent years. The program was initially approved for a trial period lasting between 36 to 48 months before being implemented permanently. However, the June 4, 2024 Mega Millions jackpot of \$552 million was won by an Illinois resident who purchased their ticket online through the Illinois State Lottery's platform. A shift towards electronic drawing occurred on October 1, 2015, with the selection of winning numbers now generated by a computer rather than using machines with numbered balls. Before this change, the live draws were broadcast on WGN-TV for over 25 years. Winners of Mega Millions or Lotto jackpots must choose the cash option within 60 days if they desire it. Purchasers must be at least 18 years old to buy an Illinois Lottery ticket. A Chicago Tribune investigation in December 2016 found that the Illinois Lottery suspended its most expensive games before awarding top prizes, with a lower rate of awarding largest prizes compared to other US lotteries. In January 2018, the Camelot Group became the new operator of the Illinois Lottery after being chosen by the state. The Illinois Lottery proceeds are allocated towards three main areas: financing K-12 public schools through the Common School Fund (CSF), infrastructure improvements and job creation via the Capital Projects Fund, and supporting special causes like veterans, breast cancer charities, HIV/AIDS assistance, and multiple sclerosis research. The Lottery's initial contributions were directed towards the state's General Revenue Fund when it began in 1974. However, a law enacted in 1985 earmarked all proceeds for the CSF. The first drawing of the new game took place on February 19, 1980, with single-drawing games held every Monday through Saturday evening. Later, Sunday drawings were introduced on March 20, 1983.
