The MPAA assigned this rating due to scenes featuring bloody images, disturbing violence, pervasive language, and some crude sexual material. Violence escalates in various scenes: one man is stabbed in the head from behind, another assaults his partner with brutal force, and two teens engage in a game of life-and-death with guns. A boy attacks his friend, but ends up being overpowered and left for dead. As terror spreads, people try to escape, only to be confronted by more terrifying entities: a zombie-like creature emerges from a mental health institution, while a giant female creature stalks a woman through the streets. Even inanimate objects come to life, as a Paul Bunyan statue chases down a teen boy with deadly intent. In one disturbing scene, a teen girl's head bursts into flames, transforming her into a monstrous creature that pursues her companion. The terror culminates in a basement where a teen boy discovers his mother strapped to a table, surrounded by medical equipment and grotesque bodily fluids, as an emaciated creature with a slimy tongue closes in on them. The creature starts by attacking a man who later strangles one of its victims and dismembers another, covering him in black slime. A giant female creature emerges from the rain drain and drags a woman underwater, prompting several men to rescue her. Meanwhile, a menacing clown appears, chasing people through caves and terrorizing others. The group encounters various obstacles, including doors with gruesome contents and deadly traps. As they navigate these challenges, some members of the group are injured or killed, while others find creative ways to survive. The story also explores themes of violence, trauma, and the supernatural. A group of individuals is depicted with various physical injuries, including cuts, bruises, and casts. Some are shown in a mental health institution, while others are rushed out of a collapsing cavern or dilapidated house. A passage appears to be throbbing with glowing orbs, and some characters hallucinate seeing skeletal creatures. Several scenes portray aggressive behavior, such as slapping, yelling, and physical altercations. The film contains approximately 106 instances of the F-word and its derivatives, 34 scatological terms, 20 anatomical terms, 9 mild obscenities, 6 derogatory terms for homosexuals, name-calling, exclamations, one instance of religious profanity, and 16 religious exclamations. A character takes an unidentified pill from a prescription vial, uses an inhaler in several scenes, drinks water laced with a root that causes hallucinations, and a newspaper headline reads "2 Crackheads Dead." People are shown smoking unidentified substances in a hallucination. Characters drink bourbon, wine, beer, and shots of liquor, while teenagers smoke cigarettes. The movie addresses themes of violence, torture, spousal abuse, child abuse, insecurity, fear, suicide, nut allergies, trust, promises, memories, homophobia, hate crimes, happy endings, success, incest, Bar Mitzvahs, bullies, and going home. Please note that some details may reveal crucial plot elements, despite efforts to avoid spoilers.
