

What is Bream Head/ Te Whara Conservation Trust?

Bream Head Scenic Reserve is one of Aotearoa New Zealand's foremost coastal broadleaf forest reserves and one of the best in Northland.

It is an outstanding ecosystem supporting a diversity of flora and fauna. It is home to species that are nationally significant - and in some cases nationally threatened. It also contains significant archaeological, historical and landscape features.

The Trust was established in 2002 by a group of locals keen to protect and restore Bream Head/Te Whara. It works in collaboration with the community and local iwi/hapū, the Department of Conservation, Whangārei District Council and Northland Regional Council.

For over twenty years Bream Head/Te Whara Conservation Trust (BHCT) has been working on the ecological restoration of the Bream Head Scenic Reserve.

It has had a transformational impact and once degraded native forest is now flourishing. This has been possible through the generosity of our volunteers, friends and visitors.

The Trust is committed to maintaining and improving outcomes in the reserve over the longterm. You can also support the Trust to continue this important work.

Students visiting our nursery. This is part of our education programme that shows students the process of collecting and sowing seeds, pricking out seedlings into root trainers and planting seedlings. They also have the opportunity to experience an authentic trap line.

What happens at BHCT?

- Our fully monitored predator programme, run by our rangers and dedicated volunteers, uses a wide suite of devices and toxins. Detection devices such as thermal cameras and trail cameras are helping us to better understand how to attract and deal with predators.
- We have a weed control programme that manages incursion of pest plants in the reserve.
- We have planted over 40.000 revegetation species. Most of these plants are now provided by our native plant nursery situated at Ocean Beach.
- We manage assisted and natural introductions of lost and endangered species, like the kiwi, toutouwai/North Island robin, popokotea/ whitehead and lizard species.
- Our education programme aims to motivate individuals and groups to learn more about, and engage in, conservation for our future.
