QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & DISCUSSION

4. Do you think it is possible to be too devoted to God? Why or why not? Does devotion to Him leave room for other pursuits? If so, how can you do those things and still be "all in" with God?
5. Read Psalm 16:10-11, Psalm 36:7-8 and Philippians 1:21-23. What do you believe will happen to you immediately after you die? Do you look forward to life after death? Why or why not?
