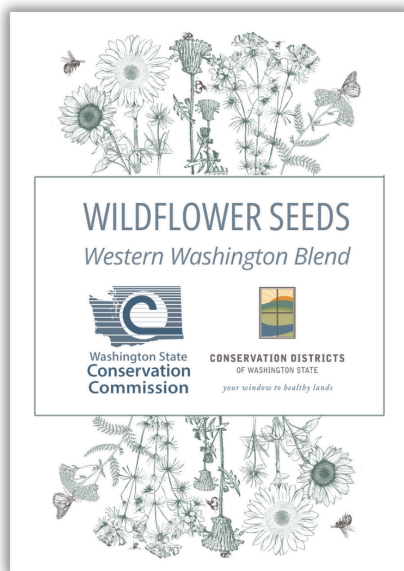


COLORFUL, EASY-TO-GROW BLENDS INSPIRED BY LOCAL WILDFLOWERS.

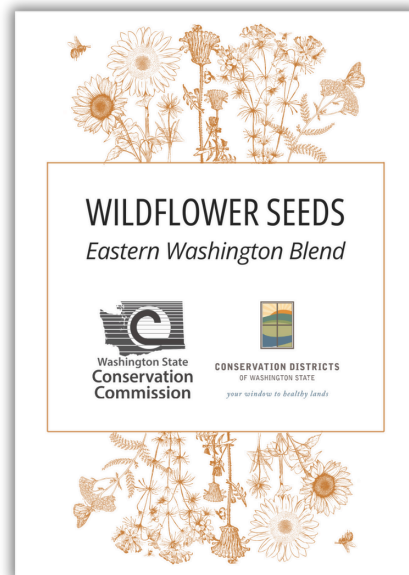
These mixes features wildflowers chosen to reflect the natural beauty of Eastern and Western Washington. Planting regionally adapted flowers supports local ecosystems by providing food and shelter for bees, butterflies, birds, and other wildlife. These plants can also help build healthy soils, reduce erosion, and add vibrant color to your space.

For best results, plant in the fall or early spring when seasonal moisture can help seeds establish naturally.

Oregon sunshine (*Eriophyllum lanatum*)
Western yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*)
Gumweed (*Grindelia integrifolia*)
Self heal (*Prunella lanceolata*)
Coreopsis (*Coreopsis tinctoria*)
Fragrant popcorn flower (*Plagiobothrys figuratus*)
Oregon iris (*Iris tenax*)
Dense spike primrose (*Epilobium densiflorum*)

Western yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*)
Arrowleaf balsamroot (*Balsamorhiza sagittata*)
Lance-leaf coreopsis (*Coreopsis tinctoria*)
Oregon sunshine (*Eriophyllum lanatum*)
Blanket flower (*Gaillardia aristata*)
Annual native sunflower (*Helianthus annuus*)
Lewis blue flax (*Linum lewisii*)
Rocky Mountain bee plant (*Cleome serrulata*)
Showy milkweed (*Asclepias speciosa*)
Munro globemallow (*Sphaeralcea munroana*)
