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Week 1: Introduction to Genesis

Key Scripture: "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." — Genesis 1:1

Overview:

Genesis opens not with human activity, but with divine intention. God speaks the universe into being, setting the tone for Scripture's portrayal of a God who initiates, orders, and sustains all life. This beginning tells us not just *how* the world began, but *why*—because God desires to create, relate, and bless. Genesis invites us into His story.

Week 2: Genesis 1-2

Key Scripture: "So God created man in his own image... male and female he created them." — Genesis 1:27

Overview:

Genesis 1–2 reveals a God of beauty, order, and intention. Humanity is created with dignity and responsibility, bearing God's image to steward creation and enjoy relationships with Him and each other. These chapters celebrate our original design—flourishing in harmony with God, creation, and community.

Week 3: Genesis 3–4

Key Scripture: "Then the eyes of both were opened... and they hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God." — Genesis 3:7-8

Overview:

Sin enters the story not just as disobedience but as relational rupture—between God and humans, and between people themselves. Yet even in the fallout, God seeks and speaks. These chapters show both the depth of human brokenness and the unwavering pursuit of God's redemptive presence.

Week 6: Genesis 7–8

Noah's obedience to God's detailed instructions highlights trust amid uncertainty. The flood cleanses and resets creation, symbolizing new beginnings and God's sovereignty over life and death.

After the flood, God establishes a covenant with Noah and all creation, promising stability and blessing. This covenant is a reminder of God's faithfulness and grace despite humanity's brokenness. It highlights the ongoing relationship God desires with His people, marked by responsibility and hope.

The Tower of Babel story warns against self-centered ambition that rejects God's authority. Yet it also shows God's providence in diversifying humanity and setting the stage for His redemptive plan.
