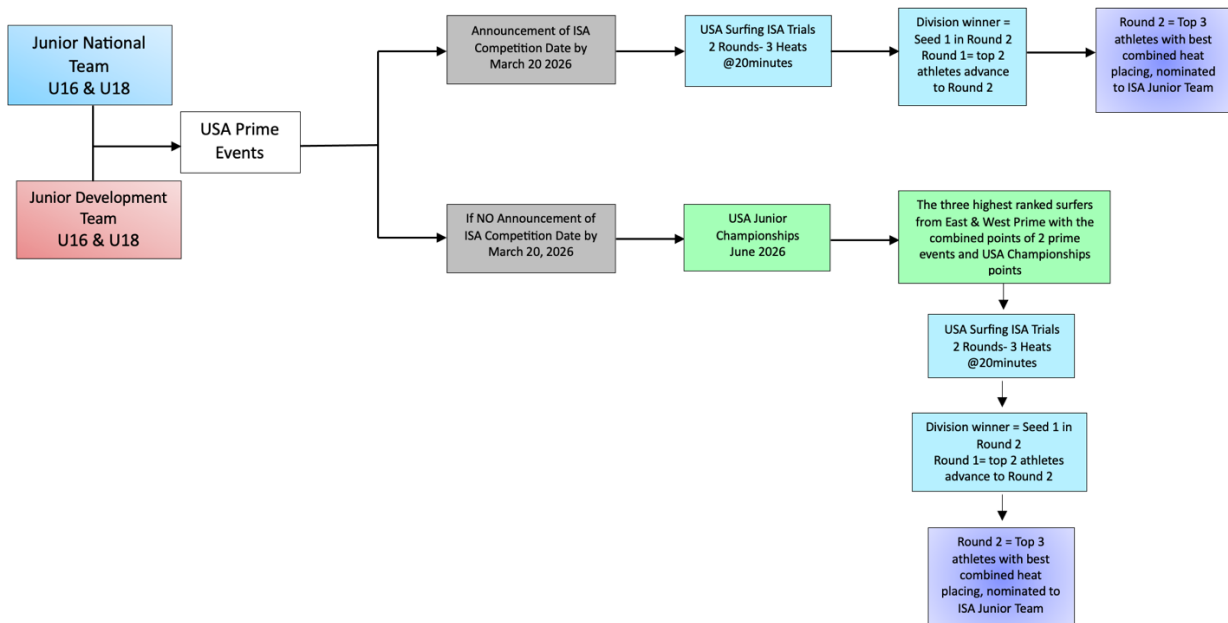
2026 ISA Junior World Team Athlete Selection Procedures

- Publication Date: September 26, 2025
- Amendment Date: January 12, 2026

SECTION 1: OVERVIEW

These procedures outline the pathway for selection to the ISA World Junior Surfing Championship for USA Surfing.

The maximum Team size can be 12 athletes, 6 per gender per ISA Rule Book.



SECTION 2: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS

1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:
 - Have a valid United States passport at the time of nomination that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the Event.
2. Minimum ISA Requirements:
 - Abide by the rules in the ISA, including nationality/citizenship requirements.
 - Comply with all rules and policies implemented by the Local Organizing Committee.
 - Comply with all ISA eligibility requirements found here: <https://isasurf.org/about-isa/isa-rulebook/>
3. USA Surfing Requirements:
 - Athlete must have an active USA Surfing membership.
 - Comply with USA Surfing Athlete Agreement.

- Comply with USA Surfing SafeSport Policy [link](#) and the [U.S. Center for SafeSport Code](#) including education and training requirements.
- Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Event.
- Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Event.
- Meet all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by the government, local laws, USOPC, ISA and/or the Local Organizing Committee.

4. Anti-Doping Requirements:

- Agree to be bound by and adhere to all WADA, ISA , USADA and USOPC anti-doping protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of the WADA, ISA, USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.

The ISA has not followed a consistent schedule in recent years and has not yet announced 2026 WJSC dates. Therefore, two tentative Trials dates are on the calendar and only one nomination route will be utilized.

4.2 EVALUATION EVENT QUALIFICATION PATHWAY:

4.2.1. Nomination Route 1 Spring- ISA event announcement before March 20, 2026 for anticipated late Spring ISA World Junior Surfing Championships “WJSC”

- i. Athletes from the USA Surfing U16 and U18 Junior National Team and Development Team are eligible for quotas per gender and division by competing in the 2025-2026 USA Surfing Junior Prime Series, East and West coast regions.
- ii. The three (3) highest ranked athletes from U16 and U18 Prime East region and Prime West region utilizing their top two (2) results will qualify to compete in the USA Surfing ISA Trials, April 14 – 20, 2026, Oceanside CA, 2026
- iii. Tie Breaks- If there is a tie in total points, the athlete’s third Prime result, will break the tie in points.
 - o If there is still a tie in points, breaking the tie will be done in the following order:
 - the athlete’s finishing heat score from their top event finish, will break the tie.
 - If there is still a tie in final heat score, the single highest wave score from that heat will break the tie, followed by the third best, fourth best, fifth best, etc until the tie is broken.

4.2.2. Nomination Route 2 Summer/Fall- ISA event announcement after March 20, 2026 for anticipated late summer or fall ISA WJSC.

- i. Athletes from the USA Surfing Junior U16 and U18 National Team and Development Team are eligible for quotas per gender and division by competing in the 2025-2026 USA Surfing Junior Prime Series, East and West coast regions.

- ii. The three (3) highest ranked athletes from U16 and U18 Prime East region and Prime West region utilizing their top two (2) results and their USA Surfing Junior Championships, June 16-20, 2026, Lower Trestles, CA will qualify to compete in the USA Surfing ISA Trials, June 23-29, 2026, Oceanside, CA.
- iii. Tie Breaks- If there is a tie in total points, the athlete's third Prime result, will break the tie in points.
 - If there is still a tie in points, breaking the tie will be done in the following order:
 - the athlete's finishing heat score from their top event finish, will break the tie.
 - If there is still a tie in final heat score, the single highest wave score from that heat will break the tie, followed by the third best, fourth best, fifth best, etc until the tie is broken.

4.2.3. Timeline Contingency-

- If ISA announces the WJSC after **March 20, 2026** and the WJSC is scheduled to take place before **June 16, 2026** (the start of the USA Surfing Junior Championships), **Nomination Route 1** in Section 4.2.1 will be used.
- If ISA announces the WJSC after the originally scheduled USA Surfing ISA Trials 1 dates **April 14–20, 2026**, and the WJSC is still scheduled to occur before **June 16, 2026**, the USA Surfing ISA Trials will be rescheduled following Section 4.2.1 as needed to meet team quota nomination requirements.

4.3 NOMINATION TO THE TEAM:

4.3.1. Nomination Route 1- ISA event announcement before March 20, 2026 for anticipated late Spring ISA WJSC

- i. The top three (3) placing athletes per gender, per division will be nominated in hierarchical order from the USA Surfing ISA Trials, April 14-20 2026 performance finishes.

4.3.2. Nomination Route 2- ISA event announcement after March 20, 2026 for anticipated late summer or fall ISA WJSC

- i. The top three (3) placing athletes per gender, per division will be nominated in hierarchical order from the USA Surfing ISA Trials June 23-29, 2026 performance finishes

4.3.3. The Timeline Contingency stated in section 4.2.3 will safeguard in the event ISA announcement occurs in a shorter timeframe during March 20-June 15.

SECTION 6: MANDATORY TRAINING AND/OR COMPETITION

SECTION 7: DATE OF TEAM NOMINATION

USA Surfing will nominate the Team, including any replacements/alternates on or before the following dates.

Nomination Route 1 Date – April 30, 2026

Nomination Route 2 Date – June 30, 2026

SECTION 8: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM NGB JURISDICTION

- a. An athlete who is nominated to the Team may be removed for any of the following reasons, as

determined by NGB:

- i. Voluntary withdrawal. Athlete submits a written letter to the USA Surfing CEO and High Performance Director requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team.
 - ii. Injury or illness. A physician (or medical staff) approved by USA Surfing provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.
 - iii. Failure to participate. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
 - iv. Code of Conduct Violation. Athlete violates the USA Surfing Code of Conduct: [Link](#)
 - v. Athlete Agreement. Athlete violates a term in their signed USA Surfing Athlete Agreement.
 - vi. Non-compliance. Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 2 of these selection procedures.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated WADA, ISA, USADA and/or, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code and the NGB SafeSport Policy, as applicable.

SECTION 9: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS PRIOR TO SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE LOCAL ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

9.1 Should a vacancy occur prior to submission of Entries by Name to the Local Organizing Committee,

- i. In following the Nomination route 1 or 2 implemented in section 4.2.1 and 4.2.2 the next highest ranked athlete from the USA Surfing ISA Trials will be the replacement athlete.
- ii. If that athlete does not accept quota, replacement athlete will be in hierarchical order from the next highest ranked athlete from Round 1 of USA Surfing ISA Trials until the quota is fulfilled.
- iii. If there is a tie in Round 1 USA Surfing ISA Trials the single highest wave score from that heat will break the tie, followed by third best, fourth best, fifth best, etc until the tie is broken.
- iv. If the quota is not replaced from the USA Surfing ISA Trials contingency of surfers, the next highest ranked surfer from the implemented Nomination Route at ISA Trials, the next highest ranked surfer will be the replacement athlete until the quota is fulfilled.
- v. If there is a tie in points, the tie break will be the surfer's third highest Prime result.
- vi. If there is still a tie in points, breaking the tie will be done in the following order:

- the athlete's finishing heat score from their top event finish, will break the tie.
- If there is still a tie in final heat score, the single highest wave score from that heat will break the tie, followed by the third best, fourth best, fifth best, etc until the tie is broken.

9.2 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Section 2.

- i. Athlete must sign the Athlete Agreement and Parent/Guardian Agreement (if under 18) within 48 hours of selection notice.

SECTION 10: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS AFTER SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE LOCAL ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

10.1 Should a vacancy occur after submission of Entries by Name to the Local Organizing Committee, if allowed

- i. The athlete replacement will follow Section 9.1 and 9.2 in compliance with ISA's Late Athlete Replacement policy and process.

10.2 Any replacement of athletes must comply with these selection procedures in addition to ISA regulations including applicable Late Athlete Replacement (LAR) policies.

10.3 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Section 2.

SECTION 11: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the USA Surfing's complaint procedures [link here](#) and the USOPC Bylaws (applies only for a Protected Competition), Section 9 (<https://www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution>).

SECTION 12: REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

The following documents are required to be signed by an athlete as a condition of nomination to the Event:

SECTION 13: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on ISA rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in ISA rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to USA Surfing.

However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically

may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions.

SECTION 14: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

All members of the Selection Committee (Section 5.3) and all individuals who developed these selection procedures (Section 19) must comply with the NGB Conflict of Interest Policy ([link here](#)), to include completing and submitting a disclosure form consistent with the USA Surfing Conflict of Interest Policy before convening the committee.

A conflict of interest exists when a personal, family, financial, professional, club, team or business relationship or interferes with, or maybe perceived to interfere with a committee member's ability to be impartial and participate in the selection process in a fair and impartial manner. Any member of the Selection Committee who has an actual, possible, or perceived conflict of interest must disclose it to the NGB's Ethics Committee prior to the start of the selection process and may be required to recuse themselves from the Selection Committee discussions and/or voting.

If a conflict exists, the NGB's Ethics Committee shall review the conflict and determine the committee member's level of involvement (e.g., whether that committee member must recuse themselves from participating in discussions and/or voting).

During its review, the NGB's Ethics Committee may ask a Selection Committee member or an affected person for more information at its discretion. For example, if a Selection Committee member is required to recuse themselves from voting, the NGB's Ethics Committee may still determine that a Selection Committee member who has relevant and necessary information related to athlete performance, such as a national team coach or high performance director, may, if requested by the Selection Committee, provide that information to the Selection Committee if the information is provided in a fair and unbiased manner and if the Selection Committee member with the conflict of interest does not vote toward the final decision.

Additionally, any person with a good faith belief that a committee member has a conflict of interest may report the alleged conflict of interest to the NGB's Ethics Committee. Reports may also be made anonymously through the [USOPC's Integrity Portal](#). No committee member shall retaliate in any way against a person who, in good faith, reports an alleged conflict of interest. In addition, the USOPC maintains a strict no retaliation policy that prohibits any employee, contractor, agent, volunteer, or member of the USOPC to take or threaten to take any action against an athlete for reporting information to or seeking assistance from the Office of the Athlete Ombuds.

Any recused individual shall be replaced in accordance with the NGB's Selection Committee appointment process.

SECTION 17: NON-RETALIATION

The USOPC and USA Surfing have zero tolerance for retaliation against people who make good faith reports of potential ethical, policy, or legal violations, or who cooperate with investigations of those reports. That means no USOPC or NGB staff, Board or Committee member, or volunteer may threaten, harass, discriminate against, or take any negative employment or related action (e.g., discharge, demotion, suspension, negative review) on that basis.

APPENDIX B- USA SURFING ISA TRIALS FORMAT

- i. A one (1) day trials event will consist of two (2) Rounds with three (3) heats, 20 minutes.
- ii. Round 1- the second and third place qualifiers from the Prime division per gender will compete in three (3) 20 minute heats. The top two (2) athletes will advance to Round 2 Trials Final based upon on their combined heat placing results from Round 1.
- iii. The top ranked surfer U16 & U18 East and West coast, per gender will be the number one seed in Round 2 final of round robin heats.
- iv. Round 2 Finals will be three (3) heats, 20 minutes, and the top three (3) highest placed athletes of combined heat placing results in rank order will be nominated to the team.
- v. Alternates will be in the following order:
 - 4th place = 1st alternate
 - 5th = 2nd alternate
 - 6th = 3rd alternate

APPENDIX C – GLOSSARY

Contingency means a future event or circumstance which is possible but cannot be predicted with

certainty.

Delegation Event means the Olympic Games, the Olympic Winter Games, the Paralympic Games, the Paralympic Winter Games, the Pan American Games, and the Parapan American Games.

Force Majeure means an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (e.g., hurricane, tornado, etc.).

Grievance Procedures means the process that enables an athlete to file a complaint with the NGB or USOPC.

Jurisdiction means the power or authority to make decisions and judgments.

Nominated means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the Selection Committee to the NGB.

Protected Competition means a Delegation Event or a Qualifying Competition.

Qualifying Competition means either of the following:

- iv. **NGB Qualifying Competition:** Any competition or activity organized or approved by the NGB where the athlete's performance or results are considered in the published selection criteria to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.
- v. **International Qualifying Competition:** Any international sport competition where (i) athletes represent the United States against athletes representing other nations, (ii) the NGB officially designates entrants, as required by the competition organizers, and (iii) athlete results or performance are included in the published criteria to qualify, or be selected, to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.

Selected means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the NGB to the LOC at the final submission date, as determined by the LOC.
