


A DAY WITH BRIAN MCLAREN - MARCH 2, 2025

Mark your calendars now for the very special events of Sunday, March 2, when SRVUMC will host Brian D. McLaren, acclaimed author, speaker, and activist, for Sunday worship and an afternoon community lecture. Brian is a former college English teacher and pastor, and Dean of Faculty for the Center for Action and Contemplation. As Pastor Sam wrote above, Brian will preach in church on Sunday morning, introducing our Lenten series focus. That afternoon, he will lecture for the larger area community on his most recent book about living our faith during these turbulent times, Life After Doom: Wisdom and Courage for a World Falling Apart.

Brian pulls no punches in addressing frightening realities of our time that center on climate change and consequent economic and civilizational upheaval. It is a

subject that weighs heavy on us, with the recent LA fires. He writes that "we humans have made a mess of our civilization and our planet, and not enough of us seem to care enough to change deeply enough or quickly enough to save ourselves."

While forms of denial might be our most common response to the current situation, McLaren opts for facing reality and embracing the complexity of hope, the necessity of grief, and the need for new ways of becoming and belonging in turbulent times. His lecture will be followed by ample time for a spirited audience engagement about a challenging subject. The afternoon will conclude in Wesley Center with Rakestraw books hosting a book-signing, and information displayed by local environmental action groups. (continued on next page)





AN EXTRAORDINARY EFFORT

On December 10 of last year, I received an e-mail and a voicemail from Patrick Ryan, President of RBS, our payroll services provider, that they were canceling our contract to provide payroll services for employees of the church. A review of the original contract signed 8 years ago verified that they could take this action. What this meant was the last payroll being provided by RBS for church employees would be December 16. Despite our pleas of a grace period due to the busy church holiday calendar and various year-end obligations, RBS was adamant that they no longer wished to provide payroll services to SRVUMC.

That left the church office with the responsibility to identify, interview and then select a payroll services provider that could take on church payroll responsibilities in a less than 2-week period. Our church effort was led by 3 extraordinary employees, Laura Roy, our Office Manager and head of HR for the church, Susan Madden, AP and Payroll clerk responsible for all payments to vendors, and accountant Priya Gupta who does all church related bookkeeping. Besides the incredibly tight timeline to get this done we had to find a payroll services provider familiar with church business and the nuances of how church accounting and record keeping are done.

Laura, Susan and Priya researched and interviewed a half dozen companies, narrowed the selection to 2 and then selected who they felt would be our best partner provider. Then we had to ensure the new provider, Gusto, could accept our employees' personal and banking information in a manner that made sure no employee missed a year-end paycheck.

Besides the office and payroll services work, Laura had to reach out to each employee to verify individual employment pay and PTO accuracy and employees understood how to access the new timekeeping format and payroll portal being implemented. All of this had to be done during the incredibly busy Christmas season when many employees of the church were away on vacation. The result was we made (continued on next page)

(continued from previous page) the successful transition to Gusto with few issues and avoided the repercussions of employees not receiving a timely or accurate final paycheck for 2024.

The business of running a church is not easy and should be mostly invisible to our members as we want the focus to be on our mission and goal objectives so well stated by Pastor Sam. But that doesn't mean extraordinary efforts and initiative should go unrecognized.

We are a church of many blessings. Today I'd like to recognize the work of 3 extraordinary women for the great work they do every day on our behalf. Thank you, Laura, Susan and Priya, for everything that you do for our church.

BOLD FAITH, COURAGEOUS ACTION: THE LIFE OF SOJOURNER TRUTH

February is Black History Month!
This is a time to be intentional about educating yourself about the history, culture, and achievements of the Black community. One Black woman whose experience as a slave, mother, and devout Christian fueled her activism as an

abolitionist and advocate of women's rights was Sojourner Truth. Emboldened by her own experiences of adversity, she dedicated herself to a life of activism, traveling the country to address large crowds and advocate for equal rights. Her legacy (continued on next page)

Born around 1797 in Swartekill, New York, Isabella Baumfree, who later became known as Sojourner Truth, grew up on a farm. Her first language was Dutch. Slavery played a deciding role her life; she had ten siblings who were sold into slavery and she herself was sold three times to different slave owners.

At the tender age of nine, Baumfree was sold into slavery for the first time. Her enslaver abused her. In 1817, her slave owner forced her to marry a fellow slave named Thomas. They eventually had four children together. Now a mother, she endured the constant fear that her children would be sold into slavery. That same year, New York state passed a law declaring that all slaves born before 1799 would be free in the year 1827. Baumfree's slave owner promised to free her in a decade in accordance with state law. However, when the time came to free his slaves, he changed his mind.

Taking her freedom into her own hands, Baumfree ran away with her youngest daughter. They found

refuge with an abolitionist Quaker family who bought her and then freed her. Baumfree was now free!

Meanwhile her former slave owner in New York sold her five-year-old son Peter to enslavers in Alabama. When she learned that selling a slave across state lines was illegal, Baumfree went to court and won her son's freedom.

In 1828 Baumfree moved to New York City where she worked as a housekeeper. It was during this time that she began speaking out against the sin of slavery. She also became a Methodist, for a time. In 1843 she changed her name to Sojourner Truth. True to her name, Sojourner would go on to live an itinerant lifestyle speaking the truth of her lived experience of slavery and advocating equal rights for slaves and women. She understood herself as preaching the gospel. People listened. Her speeches helped spread awareness of the cruelty and dehumanization of slavery. She highlighted the hypocrisy of those (continued on next page)

(continued from previous page) who called themselves Christians and yet owned slaves. She became a key figure in the abolitionist movement.

Truth met many people when she joined the abolitionist speaking circuit, including Frederick Douglass. During this time, she saw potential allies in the women's suffrage movement: Both slaves and women were marginalized and in need of liberation. At a women's convention in Akron. Ohio, Truth gave her famous extemporaneous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech that challenged the stereotype that women should not participate in public discourse and emphasized that she was not only Black but also a woman worthy of equal rights. Her Black feminist perspective and powerful stage presence rocketed her to national prominence.

Inspired by the challenges she had overcome, her friends encouraged her to write an autobiography. Because she was illiterate, Truth narrated her life story to Olive Gilbert, a

friend who published *The*Narrative of Sojourner Truth,
her autobiography. Truth
supported herself by selling her
book. In 1864, President Lincoln
invited her to the White House
to thank her for her abolitionist
work. He signed a copy of her
autobiography. (continued on
next page)

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After Lincoln's Emancipation
Proclamation, Truth turned her
attention towards combating
discrimination in public
transportation. In segregated
Washington D.C., only whites were
allowed to ride in streetcars. One
day, Truth attempted to ride in a
streetcar but the driver refused.
Refusing to accept this
discrimination, Truth stayed inside
the car. Eventually the driver
reluctantly gave her a ride. Truth's
defiant act inspired others to stand
up to societal oppression.

Truth continued to give speeches and fight for women's suffrage into her twilight years. When she passed away on November 26, 1883, she had lived to see the 13th Amendment that outlawed slavery ratified as well as the 15th Amendment that gave all men

regardless of race the right to vote.

Her legacy continues to this day. In addition to her powerful "Ain't I a Woman?" speech, Truth is remembered in many ways. Schools and streets bear her name, her picture has graced a U.S. postage stamp, and a statue of her stands in the U.S. Capitol. Even the 1997 Mars *Pathfinder* rover was named in her honor.

Sojourner Truth continues to inspire people today because she never gave up on her convictions, nor her belief that society could change. Her unique ability to organize and inspire people made an impact for Black people and women. Her strength and courage are a beacon to those who still hope for a joyous day where justice will roll like a river and righteousness will flow like a never-ending stream, as in Amos' prophetic vision.




