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### A SEASON OF LOOKING BACK, LEANING FORWARD.

I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.

By the time you read this, we will be well into the season of Advent—those sacred weeks of waiting, preparing, and leaning forward toward the joy of Christmas. You all know how much I love this season. I love everything about it: the music that fills our homes and sanctuaries, the decorations that transform ordinary spaces into places of wonder, even the way the malls suddenly feel like cathedrals of twinkling lights, reminding us—often unexpectedly—of the miracle of Christ's birth.

I am grateful for every anthem, every greeting, every slide advance, every shared moment of praise.

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beyond our walls to bless our community and world. This year, we supported Monument Crisis Center, Hope Solutions, Trinity Center. We partnered across faith lines to host Red Cross blood drives. We served at White Pony Express and the Contra Costa Food Bank. We packed 14,000 meals through Rise Against Hunger. We collected diapers, food, backpacks, winter essentials—and every collection represented hope made tangible. Our outreach and missions never skipped a beat. Not once.

And then there are the everyday moments of ministry—the ones that rarely make a newsletter but make all the difference. The committee meetings where faithful work gets done. The small groups and Bible studies where we learn and grow together. The collaboration and camaraderie of our amazing staff. The hallway conversations, the prayers shared, the quiet acts of kindness offered without fanfare. These pieces, woven together, make up the tapestry of our life together.

A lot has happened in 2025. It may feel like a blip in time, but it took every day of every week of every month—and every heart and every person in our community—to make it all happen. I remember all of it. And from the bottom of my heart, all I can say is: thank you.

At Christmas, we celebrate the breathtaking truth that "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son." This year, I also celebrate a humbler but very personal truth: For God so loves me that He gave me the faithful people of SRVUMC to be my partners and colaborers in ministry.

As I move deeper into Advent, this will continue to fill me with joy, gratitude, and renewed hope.



# SRVUMC STRENGTHENS BRAND IN 2025.

With God's help, the year 2025 saw SRVUMC take significant steps towards strengthening its new brand. Slam Media Lab, the Bay Area marketing design agency hired to develop a complete branding package and revamp the church website, concluded their work in March. The newly branded website showcasing our new logo, color palette, and crucially, our core values, launched in March as well. The new brand is important because it sets SRVUMC apart from other faith communities and demonstrates that SRVUMC aspires to live up to its core values of inclusion, inspiration, and impact.

Once the website launched, all other channels of church communication required rebranding as well, including the Friday Memo, newsletter, social media, and slides shown during worship. This was accomplished in early April. Since that date, all church communications have sought to embody the church's core values. For example, photography of church events strives to portray inclusion and diversity, especially in terms of race and age. In the first half of the year, feature articles in the newsletter highlighted inspirational life lessons from Nelson Mendela's antiapartheid work, a biography of Sojourner Truth, and the history of the LGBTQ rights movement. These articles generated positive comments from members of the congregation. Additionally, words used to promote church events on social media and in the Friday Memo often reference our core values or words related to those values.

As church communications began to emphasize our core values, it became clear that guidelines were needed to streamline promotion of church events and clarify expectations between the communications staff and the congregation (and vice versa). Approved by Church Council in October, the guidelines authorize communications staff to produce all promotional material on behalf of the church. This ensures that the brand's unique properties, including its font and color palette are employed in church communications and that church materials stay within the bounds of copyright.

SRVUMC hosted renowned Christian author Brian McLaren for a special event in March. He lectured on his new book Life After Doom. Because his book tackles faith and the timely topic of climate change, this bridge event drew 202 attendees from SRVUMC as well as the surrounding community. 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### (continued from previous page) stem from using Eventbrite.

During the summer months, this writer and SPRC developed a job description and searched for a Communications Intern who could provide much needed backup for myself in case of a brief absence. Alex Maddux was hired in this role in September. Since then, this writer has trained him and delegated many key time-sensitive communications tasks to him. This writer has also written documentation of several communications tasks. This is the first time this writer has been in the role of supervisor.

The number of social media followers continues to increase. As of November, the SRVUMC Instagram account has 74 followers, up from 55 last year. Our YouTube channel has gained 80 subscribers this year, for a total of 415 subscribers total. Of the 44 YouTube Shorts that have been posted in 2025, 8 (18%) received over 400 views, 6 (14%) received over 500 views, and 3 (7%) received over 1,000 views.

## COMMUNICATIONS GUIDELINES.

At SRVUMC, our Communications Department and Staff are dedicated to supporting the life and mission of our church. We want every ministry, program, and special event to receive the visibility it deserves so that people are informed, engaged, and inspired to participate. To achieve this, we depend on the partnership of ministry leaders to follow these guidelines. Doing so ensures consistency, excellence, and strong brand recognition across all church communications.

### 1. Promotion of Church Events

Our primary communication platforms (Friday Memo, monthly newsletter, social media, website, and campus signage) are designed to promote SRVUMC events and programs. Outside organizations, including nonprofits, will not be promoted unless explicitly approved by the Pastor and the Director of Communications.

### 2. Event Scheduling

To avoid conflicts and double-bookings, all events must first be approved by the Facilities Manager before they can be added to the church calendar. Only SRVUMC-specific events that are officially scheduled will be promoted by the Communications Department. Because campus scheduling is complex, please ensure you begin this process early.

### 3. Information Required for Promotion

For accurate and effective promotion, please email the following details to media@srvumc.org:

- Event title
- Day, time, and location
- Contact person (name & email/phone)
- Cost (if applicable)

Incomplete submissions will be referred back to the event contact for clarification.

### 4. Editorial Oversight

Event contacts are expected to draft blurbs or articles for their respective events. However, the Communications Staff has final editorial authority over all church communications. This includes text, titles, logos, images, photos, and multimedia. Edits may be made to ensure clarity, consistency, and alignment with church branding. (continued on next page)

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### 5. Authorized Design & Promotion

The Communications Staff is authorized to determine what, when, where, and through which platforms events are promoted. To maintain consistent branding, members and ministry leaders should not produce their own logos, flyers, postcards, or social media posts for official church communication. Digital and physical promotional materials will be created by the Communications Department as appropriate.

### 6. Image Use & Copyright

All images used in church communications must either be:

- Original photos taken at church events and submitted to media@srvumc.org, or
- Public domain/copyright-free images.

This ensures SRVUMC remains in compliance with copyright laws.

### 7. Balanced Promotion

Event promotion will be scheduled in the broader context of all upcoming church activities. The Communications Department will work to balance visibility among multiple events happening within the same time frame.

### 8. Flyers & Campus Placement

The Communications Staff is authorized to decide whether a flyer will be created for an event, and where (if at all) it will be placed on the church campus.

### 9. Communication Contact Person

When a group (such as a small group, class, or committee) wishes to promote an event, one designated person should serve as the contact with the Communications Department. This helps streamline communication and ensures accuracy.

### 10. Submission Deadlines

- Friday Memo: Submissions due each Wednesday by 4:00 PM.
- Monthly Newsletter: Submissions due on the 15th of each month.

Late submissions may not be included unless approved by the Senior Pastor.

By following these guidelines, we work together to ensure that SRVUMC events and ministries are communicated with clarity, professionalism, and consistency—so that the life of our church continues to shine brightly in our community.

# A CULTURE OF CARE STARTS WITH PRAYER.

How amazing is it that Almighty God wants us to spend time with Him?
There's something about being in God's presence and taking time.
Prayer holds you up in God's presence and you come out of it stronger.

Matthew 18:20 states "When two or three are gathered in my name, there I am among them." It emphasizes that the power and validity of a gathering are not determined by its size but by the focus on Christ and the unity of believers. Praying faithfully on an ongoing basis is a part of everything we do as your Prayer Team. We are encouraged by the number of prayer requests we have received from October 2023 (73) to date. The increase from 2024 (443) to 2025 (673) is 52%. It is important to share the statistics with you for the following reasons:

- The increase indicates a culture of care. Our congregants and those streaming our service from YouTube feel heard and valued.
- A high volume of prayer requests can signal an active and engaged prayer life within the church. It fosters a stronger sense of

community and dependence on faith. It shows a strengthened prayer culture.

 Tracking and following up on requests allows the church to acknowledge God's faithfulness and celebrate when prayers are answered.

The team's goal remains the same: To help lead church members to an active prayer life. Some of you have asked for ways to show appreciation for the team. Here are a few ideas:

- Write a note or a card. This is a personal and direct mail to express your thanks.
- Be specific. Mention how their prayers specifically helped you.
- Mention their impact. Let them know that their prayers have helped your spiritual growth.
- If you can, follow up with them to let them know the positive outcome you experienced thanks to their prayers.

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Light of the World, may we begin to see the world in the light of (continued on next page)

# NURTURING OUR FAITH.

This has been an active year for our adult faith development ministries at SRVUMC. Adult ministry groups have been generally under the umbrella of the Faith Development Committee. Key areas of focus include Adult Education, Disciple Bible Study and other Bible studies, and the Life Group Ministry.

Our classes, study groups and events are designed to give practical meaning to SRVUMC's guiding vision: PURSUING A LIFE WITH GOD AND A LIFE WITH EACH OTHER BY FOLLOWING JESUS, THRIVING IN COMMUNITY, AND HEALING THE WORLD.

These classes are for busy people.
Several are short (only six sessions),
making participation easier. Longer
classes may be "drop-in" or for a set
group. People mix and match classes
that fit their schedules. Classes have
included Taking the Sermon Into the
World, "The Historical Jesus"
discussion group, Tuesday morning
Bible study with Pastor Sam, Disciple
Fast Track, the Friday Morning Coffee
Group, and a congregation-wide
Advent study, among others.

In addition to these classes and studies, many of our ongoing groups also present complementary book and video studies and other faith growing experiences. These studies have included Discovery Dinners for prospective new members, "shepherd" training classes for facilitators of Life Groups, LIFT (Living, Loving, Learning in Faith Together), a women's study group, the Men's Faith Sharing group, the Friday Morning Men's Group, the Earth Care Meditation & Movement Group, retreats, and more.

In addition to the faith-related classes, we have about 40 active groups with a variety of interests, from faith formation to fellowship. These have included The Kindness Korps, UMeUs (You, Me, Us), and Stephen Ministry, Highlights also include renowned author Brian McLaren's visit to SRVUMC in March to teach an overflow crowd of church members and interested people from the surrounding community. There were also two Ministry Fairs that showed people how they can get involved in our church community and equipped for outreach.

# MOBILITY CLASS HELPS SENIORS STAY STRONG.

I attended the first mobility class hosted by PEACE (Providing Easier Access to Care Everywhere) today during my lunch break. I was surprised how tight my muscles were when we started, all the hours sitting at my desk take a toll that I hadn't noticed or probably just ignored.

The instructor was Teri
DeLaMontanya, a registered nurse,
and cofounder of PEACE. She said
during her 22 years in Emergency
Services at John Muir Health the most
common source of injuries was falls
and how important it is to retain
strength and balance as we age. She
led us through some no-nonsense
basic stretches and exercises with
simple equipment and easy to follow
instructions. Spoiler Alert – a small
movement can create a huge benefit.
And we had a free form dance session
too; it was quite fun.

Teri tailored her coaching to accommodate the varying levels of abilities, and I felt the class was inclusive, not the usual 'gym approach'. I particularly liked that she was engaged and watching each of us, and if someone needed help, Nurse Teri would have our backs...literally. I was wondering if I'd be tired returning to work but was surprised by how energized I felt when we were done and how loose and warm my muscles were when we finished.

Registration in advance is required because there are a few pieces of equipment she brings to class for each registrant. I recommend that people try it, if not once a week, then whenever they can fit it into their schedules. It is worth it.


