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A NEW SERIES FOR THE NEW YEAR.

Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me.

¹³ Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. ~ Philippians 3:1-14

As we step into a brand-new year, my heart is full of gratitude and anticipation. It is truly a joy and a privilege to serve as your pastor, and I want you to know how thankful I am for the trust you place in me to help lead San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church into another year of ministry, mission, and discipleship. Every new year feels like a gift from God—a fresh chapter filled with possibility—and I begin 2026 deeply grateful and genuinely excited for what lies ahead for our church.

A new year always brings new expectations. For me, it brings a renewed commitment to give my very best to lead our congregation toward greater growth and greater fruit.

Growth not just in numbers, but growth in faith. Fruit not just in activity, but fruit that reflects transformed lives, deeper love, courageous witness, and faithful obedience. My prayer is that 2026 would be a year in which we move forward together—more rooted in Christ, more devoted to one another, and more attentive to the work God longs to do in and through us.

That spirit of intention and commitment is what inspired the new sermon series that I will be launching on the first Sunday of January:

Choose This Day: Seven Daily Habits That Will Bless Your Life. The title comes from Joshua's challenge to the Israelites as they stood on the threshold of the Promised Land: "Choose this day whom you will serve." It is a reminder that spiritual growth does not happen accidentally. It happens through daily, faithful choices.

While many of us begin the year with resolutions or a focus word—and those can certainly be helpful—this series goes deeper. It invites us to choose daily spiritual habits that can truly **(continued on next page)**

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reshape our lives. The quality of our lives, after all, is often determined by the sum of the choices we make. These seven habits are not quick fixes; they are practices we can return to again and again in 2026 and beyond—habits that, by God’s grace, will bless and change us.

Here is a brief overview of the journey we will take together:

ABIDE (John 15:1–11)

We begin with the foundational habit of abiding in Christ. Jesus reminds us that He is the true Vine and we are the branches. When we choose daily to remain connected to Him—through prayer, Scripture, and intentional presence—we discover that fruitfulness is not something we manufacture; it flows naturally from staying connected to our life source. Rather than abiding in fear, distraction, or complacency, we choose to abide in Jesus.

BREAK (Romans 6:11–14; 7:14–25)

Spiritual growth also requires honest confrontation with the habits and patterns that hold us back. Paul names the inner struggle we all know so well: doing what we don’t want to do. The good news is that, in Christ, sin no longer has the final word. Each day we can choose to break free from destructive habits by surrendering them to God’s grace and power.

COVER (Ephesians 6:10–20)

Paul reminds us that our lives of faith are lived in the midst of spiritual battle. This habit calls us to intentionally “put on” the full armor of God each day—truth, righteousness, faith, salvation, the Word, and prayer. We do not face life unprotected; we face it clothed in God’s strength.

DARE (Genesis 12:1–5; Matthew 14:22–33)

Faith often requires risk. Abram stepping into the unknown and Peter stepping out of the boat both remind us that “playing it safe” can sometimes be the most dangerous choice of all. This habit invites us to dare to trust God, to take faithful steps of obedience, and to live with holy courage.

EXPECT (Matthew 7:7–11; Matthew 17:14–20)

What we expect from God shapes how we pray and how we live. Jesus teaches us to ask, seek, and knock with confidence in a loving Father. This habit challenges us to begin each day expecting God to act—to heal, to restore, to move mountains—and to pray bold prayers rooted in faith.

FIX (Philippians 3:12–14; Hebrews 12:1–3)

In a noisy and distracting world, focus is a spiritual discipline. This habit calls us to fix our eyes on Jesus—to pursue Him with **(continued on next page)**

intention and perseverance. What we look at shapes our souls, and keeping our focus on Christ strengthens us to keep running the race set before us.

GROW (Psalm 1:1–6; Ephesians 4:11–16)

We conclude by embracing a growth mindset rooted in Scripture and community. Like trees planted by streams of water, we are called to stay rooted in God’s Word, connected to one another, and actively serving. Growth is both personal and communal as we mature together into Christ’s likeness.

My hope and prayer for 2026 is that these habits will not simply be sermon topics, but real daily practices that draw us closer to Jesus and to one another. I am excited for this new year, grateful for each of you, and honored to walk this journey of faith together. May we truly choose this day—and every day—to follow where God leads.

COMMUNICATIONS GUIDELINES.

At SRVUMC, our Communications Department and Staff are dedicated to supporting the life and mission of our church. We want every ministry, program, and special event to receive the visibility it deserves so that people are informed, engaged, and inspired to participate. To achieve this, we depend on the partnership of ministry leaders to follow these guidelines. Doing so ensures consistency, excellence, and strong brand recognition across all church communications.

1. Promotion of Church Events

Our primary communication platforms (Friday Memo, monthly newsletter, social media, website, and campus signage) are designed to promote SRVUMC events and programs. Outside organizations, including nonprofits, will not be promoted unless explicitly approved by the Pastor and the Director of Communications.

2. Event Scheduling

To avoid conflicts and double-bookings, all events must first be approved by the Facilities Manager before they can be added to the church calendar. Only SRVUMC-specific events that are officially scheduled will be promoted by the Communications Department. Because campus scheduling is complex, please ensure you begin this process early.

3. Information Required for Promotion

For accurate and effective promotion, please email the following details to media@srvumc.org:

- Event title
- Day, time, and location
- Contact person (name & email/phone)
- Cost (if applicable)

Incomplete submissions will be referred back to the event contact for clarification.

4. Editorial Oversight

Event contacts are expected to draft blurbs or articles for their respective events. However, the Communications Staff has final editorial authority over all church communications. This includes text, titles, logos, images, photos, and multimedia. Edits may be made to ensure clarity, consistency, and alignment with church branding. **(continued on next page)**

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5. Authorized Design & Promotion

The Communications Staff is authorized to determine what, when, where, and through which platforms events are promoted. To maintain consistent branding, members and ministry leaders should not produce their own logos, flyers, postcards, or social media posts for official church communication. Digital and physical promotional materials will be created by the Communications Department as appropriate.

6. Image Use & Copyright

All images used in church communications must either be:

- Original photos taken at church events and submitted to media@srvumc.org, or
- Public domain/copyright-free images.

This ensures SRVUMC remains in compliance with copyright laws.

7. Balanced Promotion

Event promotion will be scheduled in the broader context of all upcoming church activities. The Communications Department will work to balance visibility among multiple events happening within the same time frame.

8. Flyers & Campus Placement

The Communications Staff is authorized to decide whether a flyer will be created for an event, and where (if at all) it will be placed on the church campus.

9. Communication Contact Person

When a group (such as a small group, class, or committee) wishes to promote an event, one designated person should serve as the contact with the Communications Department. This helps streamline communication and ensures accuracy.

10. Submission Deadlines

- Friday Memo: Submissions due each Wednesday by 4:00 PM.
- Monthly Newsletter: Submissions due on the 15th of each month.

Late submissions may not be included unless approved by the Senior Pastor.

By following these guidelines, we work together to ensure that SRVUMC events and ministries are communicated with clarity, professionalism, and consistency—so that the life of our church continues to shine brightly in our community.

IN THE PEW: RICK MCGUIRE.

Sports and church have played an integral role in Rick McGuire's life. Born on a dairy farm in the small town of Salem, New York, basketball played a salient role in Rick's rural hometown. Basketball brought the community together. "The gym was packed every game," Rick remarks.

During his high school and college years, Rick noted the different coaching styles' impact on a team's ability to win. Incensed with his high school basketball coach's bullying, Rick resolved to become the best coach he possibly could.

His first year as a high school math teacher, Rick began a cross-country team. Starting with nine kids, the program blossomed into a 35-strong coed team. Taking inspiration from his previous coaches, his coaching philosophy focused on gradual improvement rather than winning or losing. An expert in the coaching field, Rick went on to earn a doctorate in sports psychology from University of Virginia. One of his proudest achievements is coaching two of his track athletes in the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.

Growing up, "Sundays meant church," Rick notes. Rick attended a weekly Presbyterian youth fellowship. After moving to the Bay Area in 2020 to be closer to his adult children, he attended Sunday worship at SRVUMC. He remembers Bill Rust welcoming him. Rick and his wife Jane joined the church the following year.

Rick is currently a member of the Men's Faith Sharing group while Jane shepherds a Life Group that focuses on intentional discipleship. "I'm a coach. I'm proud to be a coach," Rick adds. "[The philosophy of] positive coaching is a product of what would Jesus do."

GRATITUDE FOR GOOD BOOKS!

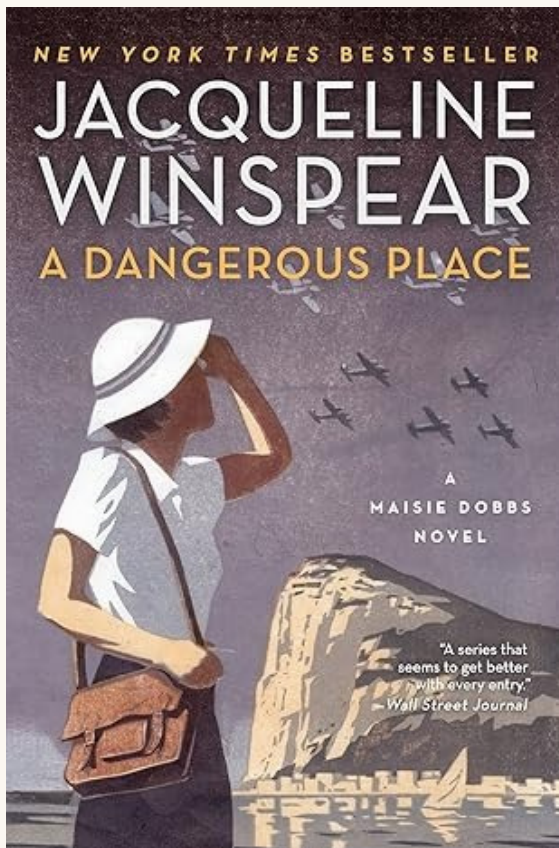

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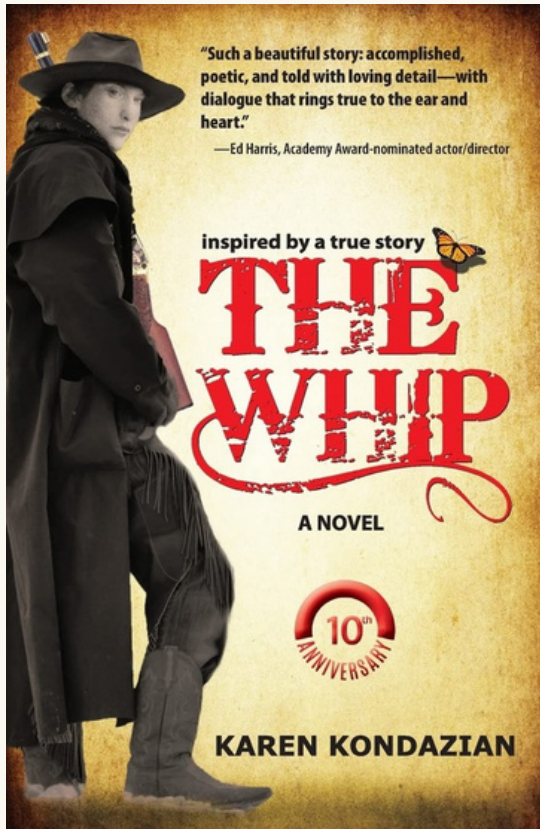

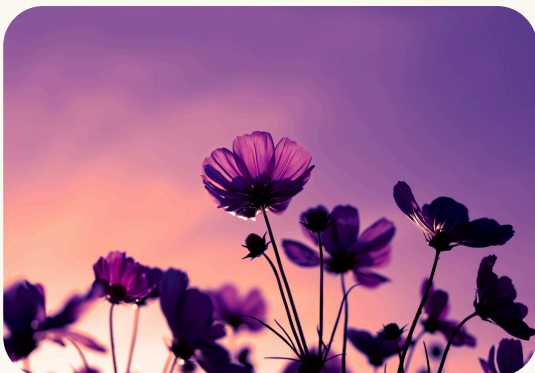
