36 YEARS YOUNG (SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING).

Greetings from the great (and very hot and humid) state of Oklahoma! As I write this, I'm in the middle of preaching at a youth and college retreat, surrounded by the joy, energy, and spiritual curiosity of young people. There's something uniquely beautiful about a retreat setting—something about being away from normal life, surrounded by sleep deprived but energetic kids, endless snacks, and sweaty name tags—that opens hearts in powerful ways.

And every time I'm in this kind of setting, it brings me back.

Because August isn't just another month on the calendar for me—it's my spiritual birthday month. This August 8th marks 36 years since the night my life changed forever at the age of 21. And no, I'm not talking about the day I finally figured out how to do laundry properly in college (though that was a spiritual experience in its own way). I'm talking about the moment when I met Jesus—**really** met Him—for the first time.

Let me take you back to 1989. I was a psychology major at the Iowa State University, juggling full-time studies

and full-time work. Like many college students, I was trying to survive finals, work late-night shifts, and figure out how to make my parents proud—hopefully with a future white coat and the letters “M.D.” after my name. Medicine was the plan. Helping people was the dream. And I thought I knew the way forward.

But God, as God often does, had other plans.

That summer, after my sophomore year, I found myself at a youth retreat at Lake Geneva Conference Center in Wisconsin. I didn't know it then, but that retreat would change **everything**.

I showed up, less than half-enthused, more than half-exhausted, and maybe a little spiritually skeptical. I wasn't exactly the model disciple. (Let's just say the 1989 version of Sam Yun wasn't exactly on anyone's “Most Likely to Be a Pastor” list.)

But God is in the business of changing hearts—and God changed mine

shifted. Through worship, the message, the prayers, and yes, a few very patient retreat leaders, I encountered the living God. God took my stubborn, prideful, rebellious heart and softened it. That night, I surrendered my life to Jesus as my Lord and Savior.

But God didn't stop there. Because in the very same moment of surrender, God did something else: God **called** me into ministry. I remember thinking, "No, no, no, Lord—you've got the wrong guy. I'm on the pre-med track. I've got plans! I've already bought the MCAT study guide!"

I said **no** that night. Flat-out no.

But God is persistent. Two days later, during the closing campfire—through a series of supernatural moments I can't fully explain right now—I knew. I couldn't run from the call anymore. I said yes.

And that "yes" has led me on a journey I could never have scripted: from Iowa to seminary, to the pulpit, to hospital rooms, to counseling sessions, to baptisms and weddings and funerals, to churches across the country, and now here—at San Ramon Valley UMC. And now, as I preach once again to young people here in Oklahoma City—

the fifth time I've returned to this very location since that original call—I can't help but be overwhelmed with gratitude.

So, this August, would you celebrate with me?

No need for cake or candles or balloons (really—you already went all-out for my biological birthday in June – thank you!). But if you're up for it, celebrate with me by simply **thanking God**. Thank God for God's faithfulness. Thank God for the ways God continues to transform hearts. Thank God that even when we have our own plans, God gently redirects us toward something greater.

Also... a little side note: our youngest son Kevin is starting **medical school** this month at Touro University in Vallejo! (Yes, the med school dream lives on—in him!) We are so proud. He's going to be an amazing doctor. And let's be honest—he's also part of our retirement plan.

Church, I just want to remind you: this is what we're about. Lives changed. Hearts healed. Hope renewed. Following Jesus, Thriving in Community, and Healing the World. That's not just our mission statement—it's my story. And I know it's yours too. So, here's to **(continued on next page)**

(continued from previous page) 36 years of walking with Jesus. I pray we all keep walking forward—one step, one call, one changed life at a time.

One of Fred’s favorite Bible verses is John 3:16-17. “It’s the fact that Christianity is founded upon.”

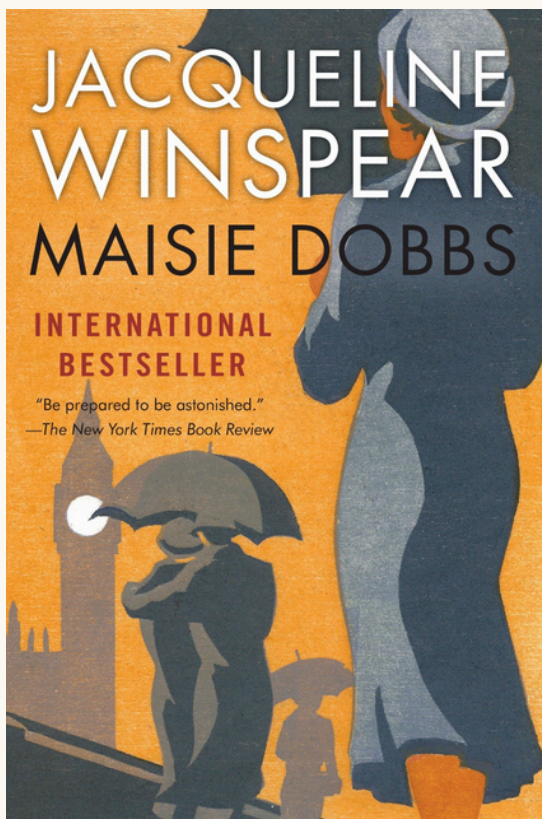


BETWEEN THE BOOKENDS.

5. An Incomplete Revenge

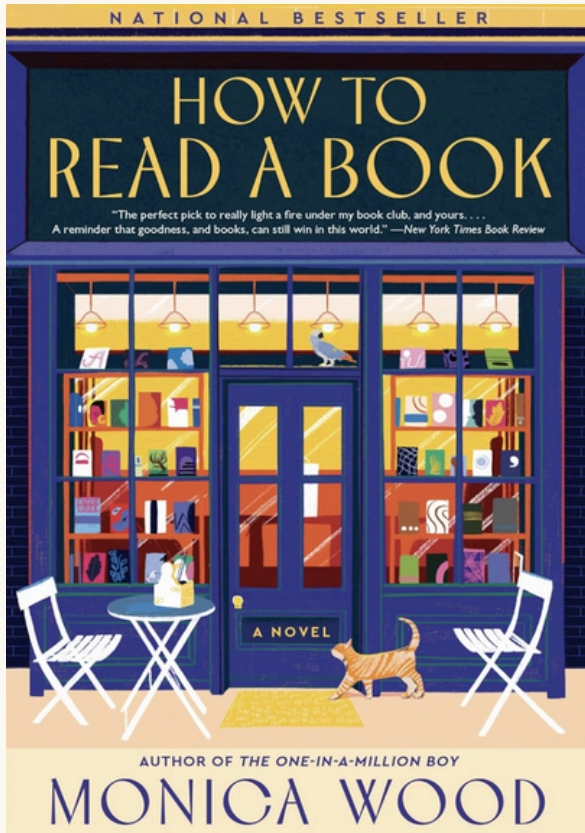
6. Among the Mad

VOLUNTEER AT WHITE PONY EXPRESS.

Now at their new location in Concord, White Pony Express was started by Dr. Carol Weyland Connor in 2013 to address the terrible disconnect between food waste in the United States and hunger and poor nutrition.

She began a “food rescue” program, delivering surplus high-quality food to local organizations serving those in need. White Pony Express grew as volunteers offered time and equipment and other organizations and individuals raised money for equipment like refrigerated trucks. As of 2024, the food rescue program has saved over four million pounds of high-quality and largely perishable food from grocers, retailers, restaurants and wholesalers and served 130,000 people in Contra Costa County. Volunteers and staff sort and deliver nutritious foodstuffs

to receiving organizations in refrigerated vehicles the same day. Recipients of the deliveries are never charged a fee for these deliveries.

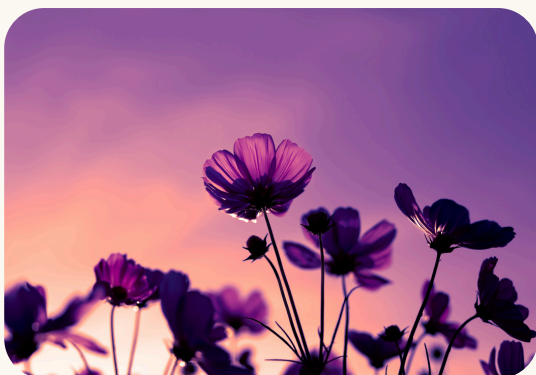
