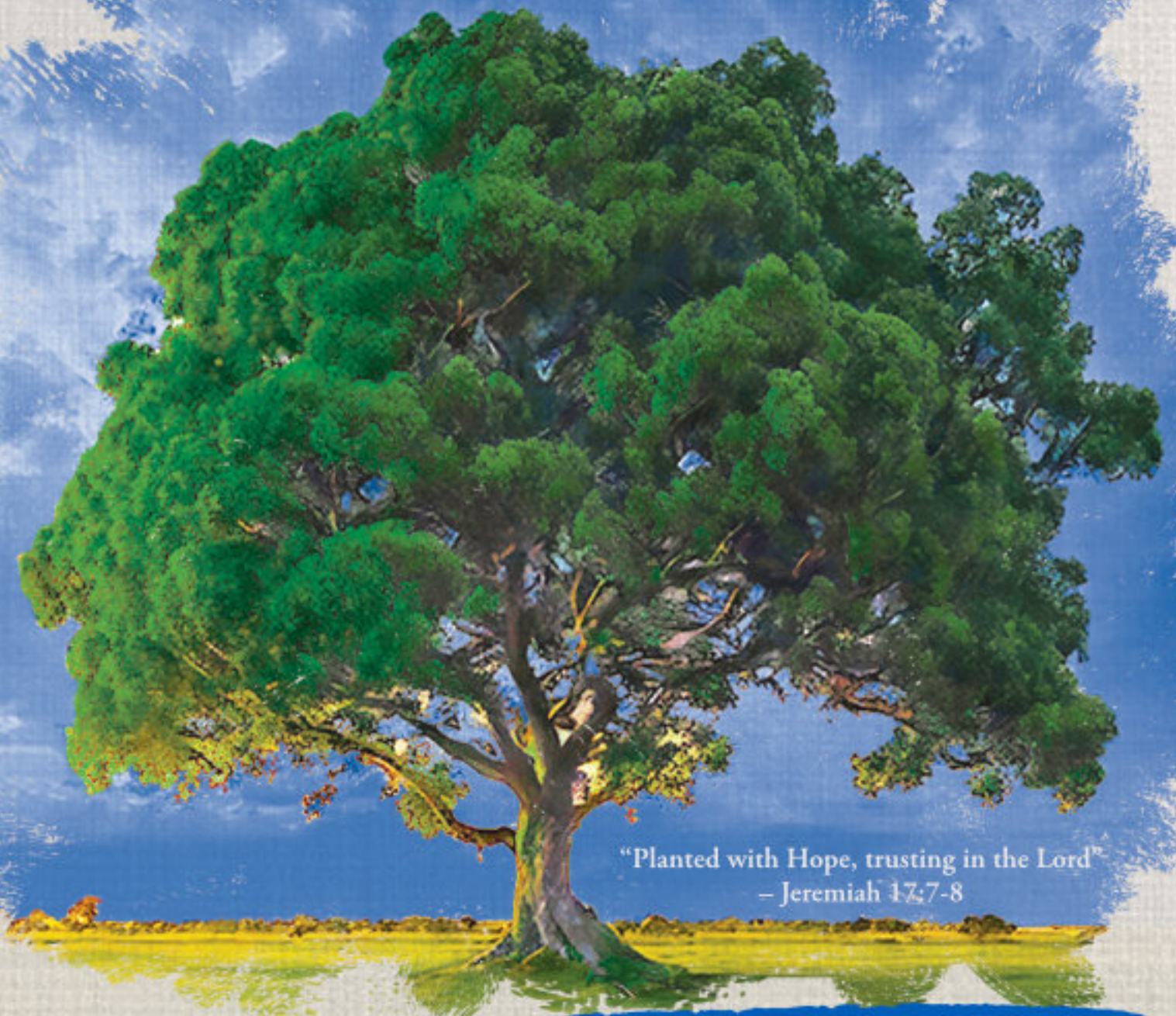

# Seventy Years of Service, One Year of Extraordinary Impact

As we reflect on our last year, we are reminded of the profound challenges facing our most vulnerable neighbors. Despite reductions in government assistance and a rise in requests for help, we witnessed something inspiring and extraordinary: the steadfast generosity, compassion, and faith-driven action of our Vincentian volunteers, staff, partners, and donors.

Your support has enabled the Society of St. Vincent de Paul of North Texas to continue to grow in both reach and impact—at a time when so many in our community feel isolated and alone.

This year, we joyfully welcomed three new conferences (Holy Spirit, Holy Cross, and St. Augustine), bringing our network to **41 parish-based conferences** and **829 Vincentian volunteers** across the nine-county region of the Diocese of Dallas. Together, working as One Society, we provided over **\$41 million** in services, direct assistance, and volunteer hours of service to over **85,000 brothers and sisters** in need.

Guided by the Vincentian belief that "**no act of charity is foreign to the Society,**" our mission extends far beyond financial aid. We believe that true service begins with the **Home Visit**, where we meet neighbors exactly where they are, where they are seen and heard. By truly **listening** to their stories, we move past surface-level symptoms to address the root causes of local hardship.

As we enter 2026—our **70th Anniversary year**—we are deeply grateful to the donors, volunteers, and partners for walking with us in compassion, hope, and collaboration. Everything we have accomplished, and everything still ahead, is only possible through the grace of God, working through people like you.

Whether you are a longtime Vincentian or new to our Society, we invite you to join us in celebrating this milestone year. Together, we will continue to transform hardship into hope for the next 70 years.

## Home Visit ~ Moments of Grace

**The heart** of The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is the home visit—a sacred moment of trust, friendship, and wonder, where neighbors meet and the Lord is present among them. This tradition began with young Frederic Ozanam and his friends, who knocked on the doors of the poor in Paris in the early nineteenth century, responding to the challenge that the Church was not doing enough to serve those in dire need. Over time, door-to-door visits evolved into home visits, inviting Vincentians into the lives of those in need.

Often, we stay connected with neighbors after the initial visit—not to meet new needs, but to share caring friendship. These visits are full of God winks: big smiles, warm embraces, and, sometimes, unexpected gifts from those we serve—clothes, coupons, food, or supplies that perfectly meet another neighbor's needs. Once, a tin of pecans given to us at one neighbor's home was brought to another neighbor that same morning—exactly what a woman needed to finish a German chocolate cake she had prayed to make. The Holy Spirit works in quietly miraculous ways.

Neighbors also speak to us in their gratitude, as when an 80-year-old, who spoke little English, closed a visit by slowly reading a note thanking God for St. Vincent de Paul, the church, donors, and volunteers. His words remind us that “where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them.”

At Sacred Heart Parish, a small seed of faith has matured into a sheltering tree of hope. Inspired by the life of St. Vincent de Paul, our conference serves as a living, breathing extension of the Gospel. We don't just see "cases" or "calls"; we see the face of Christ in our neighbors in Rowlett and Sachse.

### Growth through Grace in 2025

This year, the "mustard seed" of our small parish flourished. Our 35-member Conference rose to meet a historic surge in need. The number of calls for help has doubled in only a few years. In 2025, we responded to more than 400 friends in need. This growth was only possible because our parishioners focus on building an enduring culture

## Engaging Our Parish Community

Our parish has become Christ's hands on earth through a seasonal rhythm of sacrifice and service. These "opportunities of the heart" ensure that no neighbor is left behind:

Every Thanksgiving and Christmas Season our Holiday Food Fund Drives empower families with the opportunity to purchase their own traditional favorites.

Every September our Peanut Butter Sunday provides protein-rich staples to local food pantries.



Every February our "Soaper Bowl" provides essential hygiene products that are not covered by SNAP funds.

Every May our Cereal Sunday fills the breakfast bowls of local children as the school year ends.



### A Moment of Sacred Reflection

In October, over one hundred parishioners gathered for a Holy Hour of music and adoration that refueled our spirits for our ministry work ahead. We welcomed CEO Luis Gonzalez, who brought a relic of St. Vincent de Paul to our sanctuary. In the presence of our patron saint's relic, our members were reminded that our work is a sacred calling.

# Listening Deeply, Sharing the Burden: The Vincentian call



**Having just retired**, we were seeking a meaningful way to give back to our community as an expression of gratitude for the many blessings God has given us. We thought we were offering our time and resources to help others; instead, we quickly discovered that this ministry blesses us just as deeply and often more so.

Through Home Visits, we encounter Christ in a very real and personal way. Sitting face to face with our neighbors, listening to their stories, and sharing in their struggles is a powerful human-to-human experience. Many of the neighbors we visit are carrying enormous burdens—financial stress, health concerns, family challenges, or simple loneliness. In those moments, we are reminded that our role is not to “fix” everything, but to listen with compassion, offer encouragement, and help restore dignity and hope.

It is deeply moving to witness how a simple act of help, combined with genuine care and respect, can lift spirits and reaffirm a person’s sense of worth. These encounters make Christ’s commandment to “Love thy neighbor” tangible. We leave each visit aware that we have received far more than we have given.

Being a Vincentian has strengthened our faith and sharpened our awareness of God’s everyday presence in our lives. The shared experiences among Vincentians create a bond of friendship rooted in service, humility, and love. To gather with others who have walked into homes, listened deeply, and encountered Christ in the poor is inspiring. We are truly blessed by the neighbors we visit and by this Vincentian vocation we share.

# The Hope Fund: Help when It Matters Most



**Thousands of North Texans** are one unexpected expense away from poverty or even homelessness. Often, a single payment at the right time makes the difference between stability and homelessness. The Hope Fund provides direct emergency financial assistance to individuals and families facing urgent crises: rent to prevent eviction, utilities to avoid shut-off, critical car repairs to keep a job, or other essential bills that cannot wait.

Without long processes or red tape, the Hope Fund responds quickly and compassionately when a neighbor has nowhere else to turn. It preserves dignity. It keeps children in their homes. It stands with someone in their hardest hour and says, "You are not alone."

## Solidarity in Action

Throughout the Diocese of Dallas, Vincentian volunteers in each parish-based Conference raise funds locally to serve their neighbors. However, the needs they address are not evenly distributed. In some parishes, requests for help quickly exceed what local donations can cover.

This is where the Hope Fund becomes a powerful expression of Catholic solidarity.

If a Conference's resources run dry, the Council can step in and, through the Hope Fund, administer shared resources so that no neighbor is turned away due to exhausted local funds.

This is solidarity in action: parishes standing with parishes, local communities strengthening one another, the One Society responding in unity to growing need.

# A Lifeline in the Aisle: Bridging the Gap for Uninsured Texans

In Dallas County, almost 1 in 4 neighbors are uninsured. Most suffer from common, treatable complications such as asthma, hypertension, and diabetes. Without treatment, those complications often become a crisis that forces families into emergency rooms and puts strain on local healthcare systems.

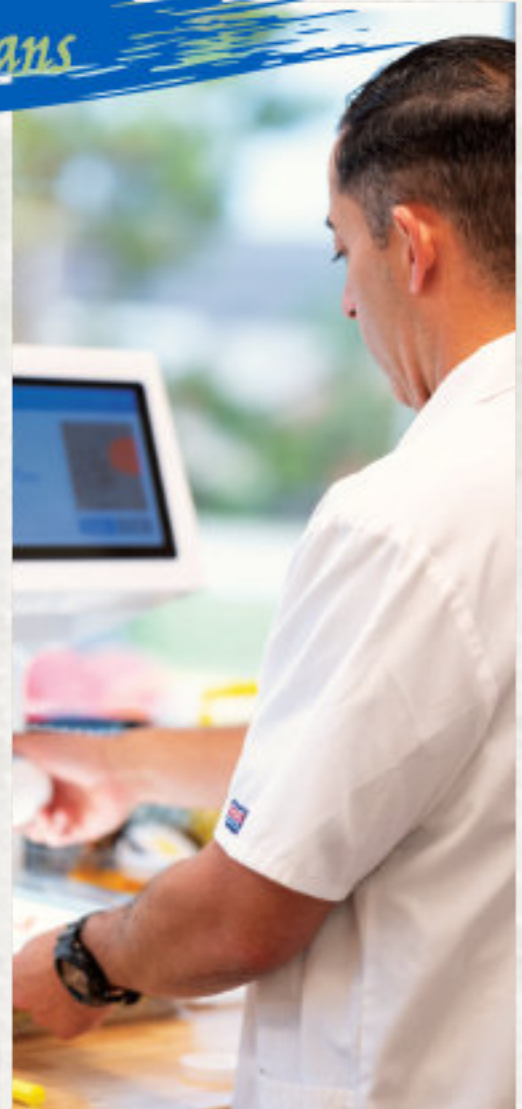
Our pharmacy model provides a smarter, more compassionate way forward. By providing common medications for chronic conditions at no cost to the patient, we preserve families, keep parents in the workforce, and provide the stability that only good health can offer.

We shattered milestones in 2025, thanks to the radical generosity of our donors. From regional media outlets to local clinics, the Pharmacy was recognized as a "free lifeline" for a community facing rising costs and shrinking options. We continued to receive industry awards for our innovative and compassionate mission.

## Cultivating the Next Generation of Care

The Pharmacy has become a training ground for the next generation of healthcare providers. Through our partnership with Texas Tech University, student interns gain firsthand experience working with the challenges that face our community. We also partner with Cristo Rey Dallas Work Study Program to host four students annually.

# Rooted in Support, Reaching for Dreams

For first-generation students in North Texas, the transition to middle school can often be a "breaking point." Currently, regional averages show that only 56% of 3rd-8th graders meet grade-level standards in reading. Without targeted intervention, the gap between a student's potential and the realization of their potential can become nearly insurmountable.

At St. Vincent de Paul, we realize that for so many of the families we serve education is the ultimate tool for systemic change. Since 2008, the StudyTime program has provided the rigorous academic scaffolding children need to beat the odds. While nearly half of the students in our region fall behind, StudyTime students consistently shatter local proficiency averages, as 95% successfully transition to college-prep environments in our community.

## The Vincentian Difference: More Than a Grade

- We believe in breaking the cycle of poverty by addressing both immediate academic gaps and long-term systemic barriers.
- Our mentors don't just teach; they walk in solidarity with families. Students find a community where they are known by name and encouraged in their unique God-given talents.
- We create a "home away from home" where students feel safe to take risks, try new things, and step out of their comfort zones.



## The Multiplier Effect: One Family, Three Scholars

Our approach has had tremendous impact on the Lopez family. StudyTime created a "success pipeline" that transformed the trajectory of three siblings through walking alongside them for over a decade:

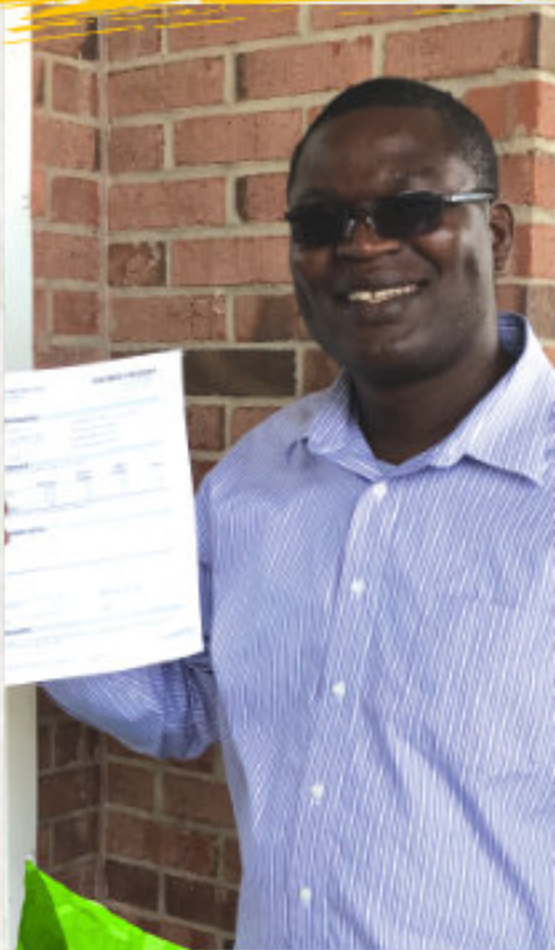
- Zayda, the oldest, attended Ursuline Academy after graduating StudyTime and then earned her BBA from UT Austin. Today, she is a Marketing and MIS professional.
- Luis graduated from StudyTime to attend Jesuit Dallas and then Texas A&M, where he is pursuing a graduate degree.
- Miguel, the youngest, graduated StudyTime and currently attends Bishop Lynch High School, where he plans to attend college just like his brother and sister.

# Beyond the Loan: Building a Foundation for Financial Freedom



## The Debt Trap

For many North Texans, a sudden \$400 emergency—a transmission failure or an unexpected move—is the beginning of a downward spiral. Without savings, families often turn to predatory payday and auto title lenders in a moment of panic. These lenders offer immediate cash but charge interest rates of 300% to 800%, ensuring that their victims stay in debt for years as they struggle to pay interest while the principal remains untouched.

## Our Integrated Solution: Capital & Coaching

The St. Vincent de Paul Mini Loan Program (MLP) and Financial Freedom Workshops work in tandem to break this cycle. We don't just provide a low-interest alternative to predatory debt; we provide the behavioral tools and one-on-one mentorship needed to ensure our neighbors never have to return to a payday lender again.

### 1. The Mini Loan Program (MLP)

Since 2015, the MLP has provided 12-month, low-interest loans with zero fees. This allows families to pay off high-interest predatory debt or cover emergencies immediately. The MLP has provided nearly 500 loans, saving North Texas families approximately \$3 million in predatory payments.

### 2. Financial Freedom Workshops

A loan solves a crisis, but education addresses the cause. Our program offers personalized financial coaching and group literacy classes across nine counties. We teach the "language of money"—budgeting, building sustainable savings, and developing new financial habits, all facilitated by a certified financial coach. The measure of our success is in the milestones our neighbors reach once the weight of debt is lifted. In 2025, 48 neighbors completed intensive financial coaching or classes.

## Your Investment in Independence

Your generosity has led to home ownership and \$3 million in savings for the people who need it most. Today, thanks to your support, hundreds of families have learned to break the deadly cycle of debt and now live with financial stability.

# Dignity in Every Decade: Supporting Our Seniors in Southern Dallas County

In Southern Dallas County—from Lancaster and DeSoto to Cedar Hill and Wilmer—many seniors face the reality of “hidden hunger”: fixed incomes that haven’t kept pace with the cost of living. For a senior, “moving beyond survival” means more than just a meal—it means preserving independence, managing chronic health conditions, and finding a community that treats them like family.

## 2025: A Lifeline for Our Elders

This past year, the SVC became a critical anchor for older adults navigating the challenges of aging on the margins. Through strategic partnerships, we ensure our seniors don’t have to choose between their medicine and their next meal.

## A Collaborative Response to Senior Needs

Our “Hub” model leverages specialized partners to address the unique vulnerabilities of the senior community in Southern Dallas:

**Nutrition:** 35 lbs. of groceries monthly per senior through the People and Nutrition (PAN) program in partnership with North Texas Food Bank.

**Healthcare:** On-site, low-cost chronic care through St. Paul Medical Clinic.

**Dignity & Hygiene:** Hygiene supplies not covered by SNAP.

**Connection:** Utility assistance and digital access to combat isolation.

# Fueling Mission, Funding Mercy: The St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store

Since opening in October 2007, the St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store has played a vital role in inviting our North Texas community to join in the Society's mission. Every donated item becomes an opportunity to join in compassion, transforming gently-used goods into support dollars that return to our neighbors and strengthen their families.



## 2025 Highlights

### Voucher Program

The Thrift Store offers one of the few in-store Voucher Programs in North Texas, giving clothing, furniture, and household essentials at no cost to families in need. In 2025, more than \$75,000 in merchandise provided immediate support to neighbors facing hardship.

### Financial Contributions

Profits generated at the store strengthen the work of the Society, funding programs that address poverty, homelessness, and crisis intervention. Last year, the Thrift Store contributed \$200,000 to support the Diocese's Conferences and initiatives.

### Employment & Community Strength

With 68 employees, the Thrift Store not only creates stable jobs with benefits but also builds economic opportunity and community resilience.

### Collaborating for our Community

In the coming year, the Thrift Store aims to extend the Society's work by expanding community outreach, increasing voucher assistance for families in need, and generating financial support and in-kind donations to sustain our mission. ## Relic Tour Reflection: Renewing Our Call to Mission

Last year, when the Good Lord gifted a first-class relic of St. Vincent de Paul to us through a dear friend, He made it clear that I should bring the relic to all corners of the Diocese of Dallas to serve as a source of inspiration for the work we do in serving the poor.

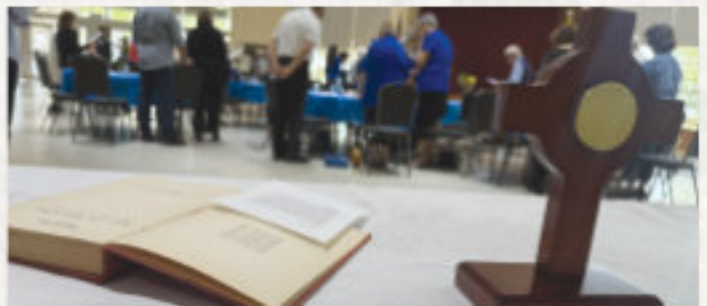


The providential manner by which the relic came to us was an affirmation of the good work we have been doing for the past 70 years and seemed like the perfect opportunity to infuse renewed hope, vigor, intensity, and compassion in our Vincentian Conferences. When the original copy of the *Manual of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul* from our first Conference in 1956 was given to me a few months later, the seeds of the “Relic

& Manual Tour” were planted. Little did I realize how powerful the “Relic & Manual Tour” would become, yielding such abundant graces for all.

Each visit with the relic literally became a new blossoming of our charism: Vincentians listened to the story of how the relic came to North Texas, and I listened to the impact we were having in the community, the challenges we were facing, the struggles and hardships of our neighbors. The relic of St. Vincent de Paul sowed anew our desire and mission to encounter Christ in the poor and marginalized, and each Conference became connected to the next, a strong network of roots digging deeper into the North Texas community.

Throughout the course of the year, relic visits sprouted new life, branching out into the parish communities in unique ways, just like our Conferences.
