Dr Margaret Bradshaw MBE

Upper Teesdale is one of the most important botanical sites in the British Isles. A group of extremely rare plants, with very limited distribution elsewhere in the country, have been present here since the last ice age. Changes in climate, traditional farming practices and other factors have begun to threaten the long term survival of these plants.

Efforts to arrest the steady decline of these plants for over 50 years have been the work of one woman, Dr Margaret Bradshaw MBE. Margaret was born in 1926 to a farming family in the Wolds of the East Riding of Yorkshire. Upper Teesdale and its special plants captured her imagination. After completing her teacher training she moved to Bishop Auckland in order to be within reach of the area. For the best part of twenty years, she was a part-time tutor in botany and environmental science in the Department of Extra-Mural Studies at Durham University.

Margaret's work gained national significance in the late 1960s with her involvement in the campaign to save populations of rare plants from destruction due to the proposed construction of Cow Green Reservoir. In 1977 she was made MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours List for her services to conservation in Durham.

In 1982 Margaret moved to Devon and became a farmer of Gotland sheep. Here, while doing botanical work as a volunteer, she discovered a species of whitebeam, new to science, which was subsequently named 'Margaret's Whitebeam' in her honour.

After returning to Upper Teesdale in 1998, Margaret resumed ongoing plant population studies on Widdybank and Cronkley Fells that she began in the 1970s. After founding the Upper Teesdale Botany Group (UTBG) in 2001, Margaret worked to educate local people about the special nature of Teesdale and has built a strong base of friends and supporters. She still attends weekly meetings.

After a heart attack in 2008, Margaret entered the Great North Run half marathon. In 2015, nearing her ninetieth birthday, Margaret completed the race for a fourth time; raising over £6,000 for the Teesdale and Weardale Search & Mountain Rescue Team and UTASS.

In 2010 she was awarded honorary membership of the Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland. In 2012 Margaret was awarded the Marsh Botany Award in recognition of her lifetime contribution to the understanding and conservation of the Teesdale flora. In 2013, she was the recipient of the inaugural Pendlebury Award for her significant contribution to looking after the North Pennines Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

In 2017, eager to take more direct action, Margaret set up and financed the Teesdale Special Flora Trust. Its first task was a survey to establish the present status and distribution of the rare plants and to determine the requirements for their conservation. When the Trust gained charitable status in 2020, as part of the launch, Margaret sought permission from Lord Barnard to abseil down the tower of Raby Castle. Unfortunately, or perhaps fortunately, Covid intervened and the launch had to be put on hold. Later, as a fund-raiser for the Trust, she carried out a sponsored horse ride of 88 miles. In September 2021 the Trust secured a grant of £222,400 from the National Lottery's Green Recovery Challenge Fund for its Plants On The Edge project to conduct a base line survey, produce a 5-year monitoring and species recovery plan, build volunteer skills and capacity and secure the awareness, support of local communities via arts outreach with local schools and the general public.

Margaret is still a frequent visitor to Widdybank Fell, but as she has aged, she has found it more difficult to tackle the steep climb onto Cronkley Fell, which she now tackles it on horseback. In March 2023, and to add to her many other honours and distinctions, Margaret was awarded the prestigious H H Bloomer Medal of the Linnean Society of London.

Towards the end of March 2023, at the age of 97, Margaret published her first book 'Teesdale's Special Flora: places plants and people'. Continued on next page
