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NOTE FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

It is hard to believe we have only been back one week! There is so much going on both with the children and behind the scenes that weeks seem to take months whilst time simultaneoulsy whizzes by at a million miles per hour.

During these moments, the importance of teamwork comes to the fore. I spoke to the children at the start of the week about my love of teams and we looked at famous teams, both sporting and from other fields. We also thought about what it meant to be part of a team.

Sylvia in Year 5 defined a team as "A group of people working towards a shared goal" and I couldn't have phrased it better myself.

So, we decided, the school is a big team but what is our goal? "To improve the lives of our Hamleteers, now and in the future" would be a good summary of suggestions from the floor.

I wanted to emphasise the role of the school staff in this, comparing us to the team coaches. We always have the goal in mind and we encourage and praise regularly. But it is also the job of a coach to point out when things aren't quite right, or could be better, but always with the children at the heart of what we do. Even if you don't want to hear the message, at least remember we are always on your side.

We want to be more inclusive of our parent community and value you as an important part of this team too. We already get so much from our parent community but our engagement project is beginning to think about how we can work even more actively together, how we can become more aligned and effective as a team. It

is early days but we are very excited about the potential of this project.

FRUIT AT PLAYTIME

Unfortunately we were forced to end our contract with our previous fruit supplier as the quality of fruit declined and inadequate deliveries meant that whole boxes had to be thrown. We no longer receive funding for this so it was effectively throwing school money onto the compost heap.

We are pleased to announce, however, that we have found a new solution to provide fruit at playtimes and we now have more control over numbers so we are having to throw less fruit away. Please remind your children that fruit is available at breaktimes.

SCHOOL LUNCHES

Thank you to everyone who responded to our school lunch survey. A few clear issues came through.

1. Children not liking certain meals.

This is something our brilliant Chef, BJ, has been working hard on. She has supported the school with a menu for the Summer term which we know will prove to be really popular with the children. In the interim, she is providing some 'off-menu' dishes as an additional choice on days where she knows children may not be as keen on the menu. This week, her special chicken dish went down a storm with an average rating of 9/10 from the children questioned.

2. Lack of quantity

This has to be balanced with the amount of waste food each day, but Chef is absolutely clear that the children can ask for more if they want at the point of service and she is committed to the staff at the pass getting to know the children well so they know our 'big eaters'. Please encourage your children to ask for more and let Mr Salomonson know if they are refused for any reason. Many children request half jackets, but full jackets are available too.

3. Gluten Free Options

Chef makes a special effort to buy Gluten Free verisons of the meals so there should be options

each day. Please speak to Mr Salomonson if you find this not to be the case.

SAFER INTERNET DAY


With so much leisure and social time now spent on the internet from a young age, online safety has become an increasingly key element of safeguarding. This year's Safer Internet Day focused on scams - what they are, what they do and how to spot them. Following a whole-school assembly, children completed a variety of follow-up tasks aimed at reinforcing the message of critical thinking when encountering online offers that tempt us into action.

Y3 and Y4 children created posters using the S.C.A.M. acronym to remind them to beware of online traps:

- Seems to good to be true
- Contact you did not expect
- Asking for personal information
- Money or trade asked for

Year 5 and 6 children completed a quiz all about how to respond when encountering an online scam, with the main message being to speak to a trusted adult if you are unsure.

With this work and consistent messaging through our PSHE and computing lessons, we aim to shape our pupils into responsible online citizens who know where to go for help and support should they need it.
