INTRODUCE AN OBJECT



TO A DEAFBLIND KID?



Begin at the shoulder, making contact with the object at their shoulder...



...and slowly slide the object under your child's arm...



...until it reaches their hand.



Engaging in physical co-presence allows your child to know that you are present.

Over time, they will begin to associate this movement with you offering them an object, and their hand will clasp what you are offering.

Sighted people receive information by looking, seeing what others are doing and how they are doing it.





A DeafBlind child needs to get this information through touch.





To interact with a DeafBlind child. use your hand or body to communicate by touching their hand, body or arm.





Gentle tops on their arm, chest or leg inform them that you are cheering them on.

This hand movement on your child's body indicates that he is sucking on his bottle.
