THE THREE PILLARS OF THE FIRST NATIONS CLEAN ENERGY NETWORK



Community: Focus on removing barriers to our people having access to secure, cheaper, cleaner energy. Develop guides for land councils and community organisations to be equipped and ready to engage and benefit. Build capacity and advocate for opportunities for our people to be at the table, influencing and shaping the energy transformation.

Policy reform: Policy reform and changes to the way renewables are delivered to First Nations households. Demonstrate projects to highlight State, Territory and Federal policy barriers and work to overcome them. Governments at all levels to invest in these reforms and lift the barriers.

Industry partnerships: Best practice principles for companies to implement and investors to require, that ensure First Nations engagement and consent in the development, design and implementation – including benefit sharing – of any clean energy projects.



FIRST NATIONS CLEAN ENERGY NETWORK — WE AIM TO SECURE:



Energy Security / Energy Access - First Nations individuals, groups and communities have equitable and easy access to affordable, clean (renewable) energy solutions that support First Nations lives and livelihoods

Rights - Free, Prior and Informed Consent governs all interactions between First Nations lands, waters and cultural heritage and renewable energy projects and activities (including for the financing of projects, transmission infrastructure and supply chain materials)

Power / Capacity / Knowledge - First Nations benefit from and participate in the renewable energy sector as key and prominent stakeholders and participants through ownership of projects, employment outcomes, business (goods and services supply) outcomes

Benefits and Participation - First Nations have the power (capability, capacity, knowledge) to engage confidently and authoritatively with all risks, opportunities and benefits associated with the renewable energy sector (including to own, manage and operate utility scale generation, community energy projects, and to appreciate the benefits of renewable energy at a household level)



EARLY DAYS, BUT THINGS ARE STARTING TO IMPROVE A FIRST NATIONS CLEAN ENERGY STRATEGY



- On 12 August 2022, Australian Energy Ministers committed to the co-design of a First Nations Clean Energy Strategy (Strategy) as part of the National Energy Transformation Partnership
- This Strategy is about ensuring First Nations Australians shape and drive the clean energy transformation







Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Best Practice Principles for Clean Energy Projects









The Principles

- Engage respectfully
- Prioritise clear, accessible and accurate information
- Ensure cultural heritage is preserved and protected
- Protect country and environment
- Be a good neighbour
- Ensure economic benefits are shared
- Provide social benefits for community
- Embed land stewardship
- 9. Ensure cultural competency

1. Actions you can take if a company wants to establish a project on your country

Unity is Power - Your Representation is Important

- 2. How do you work out who you are represented by?
- 3. Unity is Power How to act as a collective
- Assess and map what capacity you have to act collectively. Consider whether
 you need further resources from the representative body, the Government or
 the company to be better organised
- Set out how you want the company to deal with your representatives. Develop and agree on a protocol before negotiations commence
- Make sure there is sufficient understanding of what is happening and what is being said
- Access external, expert advice to help you understand the project or proposal so you can engage confidently in the negotiations
- 8. What to do if your protocol isn't being followed or you aren't being properly consulted by the company, your representatives or your negotiators
