- systemic social risks in their portfolios.
- 60 countries and territories, according to Heartlands index, fall into Conflict Affected High Risk Areas (CAHRA).
- Challenges to managing human rights are escalating as conflicts increase globally (i.e. 40% increase in conflicts globally since 2020).
- In a survey, 497 investors identify conflict risk as their second leading ESG criteria, second only to climate change. 85% of another survey identify geopolitical confrontation as a top three risk. The Saliency and Materiality Nexus is a tool to manage these risks.
- Material risks include increasing exposure to regulatory regimes, strategic litigation on behalf of impacted rights holders, disruption of company operations due to conflict, expropriation of assets, and loss of social license to operate, and divestment based on ESG considerations.
- Ericsson, Hewlett Packard, Investos, Match Group and Cisco Systems were shared as examples of organisations responding well to conflict risks, but there are limited examples of best practice responses to conflict risks.
- Heartland have had limited success engaging research advisors and ESG ratings agencies.
- Companies are reluctant to talk about risks in markets to not inhibit access to that market.
- Human rights can sometimes be treated as the subject for a glossy report, so a lot of work with companies is focused on education about future risks from these issues so it is taken more seriously.

### Kate Turner (Global Head of Responsible Investment, First Sentier Investors)

- FSI's more formal journey on human rights in conflict affected high risk areas started at the escalation of Russia / Ukraine war. But that was not a good time to engage with companies. That taught them to take a more proactive approach, but that turned out to be difficult due to limited data availability on this topic.
- FSI had to do a lot of manual research themselves due to the limited information already in the market. They then worked with Heartland to do a full assessment of holdings across FSI.
- The data received from Heartland was extensive, looking at both geographic, relational and operational proximity. Data is also categorised from low risk to high risk.
- It has helped FSI get significantly greater oversight of CAHRA risks across the portfolio.
- Would love to see mainstream research providers providing this level of data.

- BHP Group Limited: BHP and Vale have reached a US\$31.7 billion (AUD 45 billion) settlement with Brazilian authorities over the 2015 Mariana dam disaster, which caused severe environmental and social harm. The tailings dam, operated by their joint venture Samarco, collapsed, leading to extensive damages. Both companies will contribute equally to cover the liabilities.

- Rio Tinto: Communities in Bougainville affected by Rio Tinto's former Panguna mine are urging the company to fund remediation after an independent assessment allegedly confirmed significant ongoing risks and environmental damage.
- BHP & Rio Tinto: Apache Stronghold, a Native American group from Arizona's San Carlos Apache tribe, has appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court to block Rio Tinto and BHP's Resolution Copper mine, arguing it would violate their First Amendment rights by destroying Oak Flat, a sacred Apache worship site. Their argument is that the planned mine would create a vast crater, threatening the religious and cultural significance of the federally owned land.
- Regis Resources: Regis Resources has filed a Federal Court challenge against Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek's decision to grant an Aboriginal protection order for part of its McPhillamys Gold Project site in NSW. Regis claims this restriction makes the project unviable and that alternative plans would take up to ten years to develop. The company seeks to have the minister's decision declared "legally invalid" and reassessed by a different official. A court date has not yet been scheduled.
- New Federal Anti-Slavery Commissioner appointed: Former Labor minister Chris Evans has been appointed as Australia's first antislavery commissioner. Starting in December, Evans will serve a fiveyear term, focusing on combatting modern slavery practices, including forced marriage, forced labour, deceptive recruiting, and debt bondage.

### 5. RIAA's Policy and Advocacy Work (5 min)

#### Nayanisha Samarakoon (Head of Policy and Advocacy, RIAA)

- Primary work in policy and advocacy in human rights has been within other initiatives, including Future Made in Australia and Investor Front Door consultations. We are looking to mitigate the risk that the influx in funding for climate related projects ignores non-climate sustainability factors, including human rights. We are encouraging that RIAA Working Group members are involved in developing assessments for these risks.
- The NZ Sustainable Finance Strategy is currently being developed by the Centre for Sustainable Finance and the NZ Government. RIAA are supporting this.

#### 6. Subgroup Updates (10 min)

#### Modern Slavery (Måns Carlsson, Ausbil)

- The Australian Federal Labor government announced the appointment of Chris Evans as the first Federal Anti-Slavery Commissioner, starting his term in the first week in December.
- This means Australia will have two anti-slavery commissioners; one at the Federal Level and one in NSW.

- Establishing a commissioner was one of many asks in response to the statutory review of the Modern Slavery Act in 2022-23, but it also requires adequate funding, and current allocations may be too low.
- Anecdotally, the expectation is the federal commissioner will recommend most of the changes from Professor John McMillan's review of the Modern Slavery Act are implemented.
- NSW Modern Slavery commissioner published his annual report recently, available <u>here</u>.
  - Over 300 referrals for modern slavery
  - o Establishment of the assistance and support hotline
- There is also an inquiry in NSW currently: <u>Modern Slavery risks faced</u> <u>by temporary migrant workers in rural and regional NSW</u>, open for submissions until January 2025.
- On behalf of RIAA, recently attended meetings in Canberra to meet with key people before the government responds to the McMillan review. Met with Senators, MPs and their advisors to discuss and encourage politicians to implement more effective regulation, and find out more about what they were thinking. The three main asks were:
  - 1) Consider mandatory human rights due diligence
  - 2) Increase the funding for the Federal Anti-Slavery Commissioner
  - o 3) Discuss an import ban on goods made by forced labour
- Broad support for these issues across conversations, although mandatory human rights due diligence is not a consideration before the next Federal election.
- UN Special Rapporteur on contemporary forms of slavery is in Australia now, and will write a report on Australia's response to modern slavery.

#### Digital Tech (Janelle Morrison, Ausbil)

- In September, the Australian Government released two major updates relating to AI in Australia: a proposals paper and a voluntary standard. They highlight the Government's intended direction in relation to AI, and generally seem promising.
- Emphasis on terms including responsible and ethical AI, which are more accepted now.
- The proposals include a guardrail in relation to human rights.
- Ausbil recently engaged with Telstra on their Al practices, informed by these proposal documents, which provide tangible things to ask companies within engagements.
- The Australian Human Rights Commission recently submitted on the Privacy Act and Guardrails for High Risk settings publication, and indicated support for introducing a Children Online Privacy Code.





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#### Recent human rights controversies - Update

#### **BHP Group Limited**

BHP and Vale have reached a US\$31.7 billion (AUD 45 billion) settlement with Brazilian authorities over the 2015 Mariana dam disaster, which caused severe environmental and social harm. The tailings dam, operated by their joint venture Samarco, collapsed, leading to extensive damages. Both companies will contribute equally to cover the liabilities. This agreement fulfills all framework obligations and public authority claims related to the disaster and builds on US\$7.9 billion already spent on remediation. Samarco will begin payments 30 days after court approval, with annual payments for 20 years. This deal may resolve over a hundred lawsuits in Brazil, though BHP still faces a \$70 billion liability case in London's High Court. #### **Rio Tinto Limited**

Communities in Bougainville affected by Rio Tinto's former Panguna mine are urging the company to fund remediation after an independent assessment confirmed significant ongoing risks and environmental damage. Conducted by Tetra Tech Coffey, the study follows a 2021 complaint by 170 community members, supported by the Human Rights Law Centre. The assessment, which highlighted contamination of rivers, mine-related flooding, and safety hazards from collapsing infrastructure, has sparked demands for Rio Tinto to address these issues. Although Rio Tinto has acknowledged the findings and expressed intent to partner on a remediation framework, no concrete commitment has been made. Bougainville leaders emphasize that the assessment provides essential data for understanding the mine's impacts on health, water, and food security. They now seek action to restore safe living conditions. The study is the largest of its kind in Bougainville and is managed by an Oversight Committee with stakeholders from the community and regional governments. [Human Rights Law Centre, 15/10/2024]

#### **BHP Group Limited and Rio Tinto Limited**

Apache Stronghold, a Native American group from Arizona's San Carlos Apache tribe, has appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court to block Rio Tinto and BHP's Resolution Copper mine, arguing it would violate their First Amendment rights by destroying Oak Flat, a sacred Apache worship site. The planned mine would create a vast crater, threatening the religious and cultural significance of the federally owned land. The appeal follows a federal decision in March allowing a land swap for the project, which Apache Stronghold argues disregards religious freedom. The U.S. government contends it has authority over federal land management, but Apache Stronghold, represented by the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, argues this undermines religious rights. Rio Tinto, which has spent over \$2 billion on the project with BHP, maintains that the case is settled law and opposes Supreme



Court review. The project is a joint venture owned by Rio Tinto (55%) and BHP (45%). [The Guardian, 12/09/2024]

#### **Regis Resources Limited**

Elders from the Wiradyuri Traditional Owners Central West Aboriginal Corporation (WTOCWAC) defended their opposition to a proposed dam at the McPhillamys gold mine site in NSW, citing cultural and spiritual connections to the Belubula River. In August, Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek granted protection for the river's headwaters, halting the mine's plans, which sparked political and public backlash. WTOCWAC members report harassment following the decision and emphasize the site's cultural significance, including artefacts linked to Wiradyuri heritage. The case highlights criticism of NSW heritage laws, which experts say inadequately protect Aboriginal spiritual values and rely heavily on archaeological perspectives. Calls for reform suggest more inclusive consultation processes are needed for projects impacting Indigenous sites, as current laws fail to address diverse Aboriginal perspectives and often lead to division among Indigenous groups.

Regis Resources has filed a Federal Court challenge against Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek's decision to grant an Aboriginal protection order for part of its McPhillamys Gold Project site in NSW. Regis claims this restriction makes the project unviable and that alternative plans would take up to ten years to develop. The company seeks to have the minister's decision declared "legally invalid" and reassessed by a different official. A court date has not yet been scheduled. #### Australia's first anti-slavery commissioner

Former Labor minister Chris Evans has been appointed as Australia's first anti-slavery commissioner. Starting in December, Evans will serve a five-year term, focusing on combatting modern slavery practices, including forced marriage, forced labour, deceptive recruiting, and debt bondage. Evans previously served as immigration and workplace relations minister and led the Global Freedom Network, an anti-slavery organization. Attorney General Mark Dreyfus emphasized that modern slavery strips victims of dignity and fundamental rights, underscoring the significance of Evans's new role. [The Guardian, 11/11/2024]
