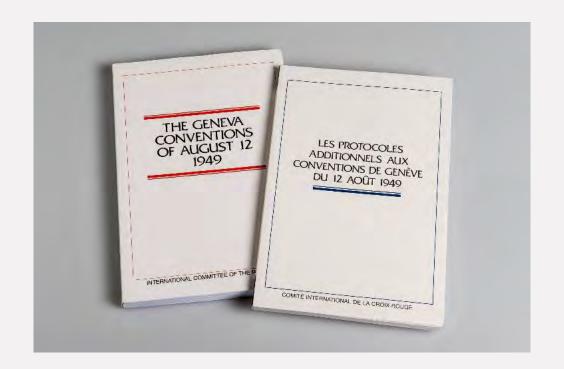

What is international humanitarian law (IHL)?

IHL is the *specialist* legal framework applicable in wartime. These laws regulate actions and behaviour in situations of armed conflict by protecting persons who are not or who are no longer participating in hostilities, and by limiting the methods and means of warfare.

The relevance of IHL to businesses and investors

Risks, rights and responsibilities

Risks

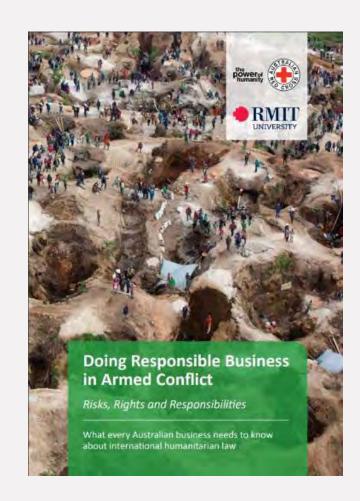
- Legal, operational, financial and reputational risks.
- Increased risk to local civilian populations.

Rights / Protections

- Civilians, including business personnel.
- Civilian property, including business assets.
- Prohibits targeting / confiscation of private property, including business premises and investments.

Responsibilities

• IHL is binding on any individual whose activities are *closely linked to an armed conflict*.







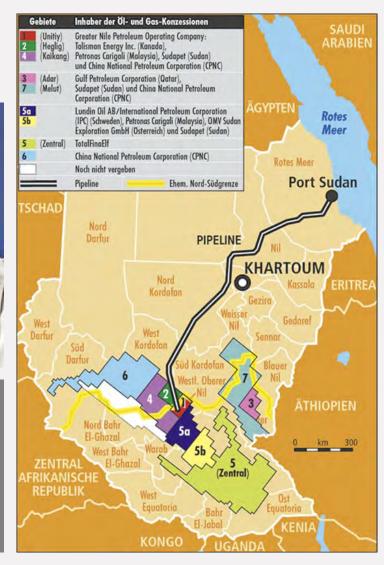
War crimes in the business world

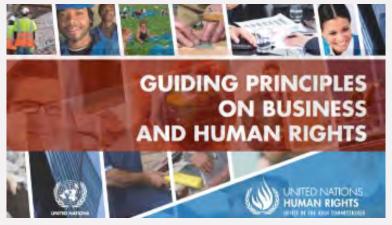

"...in situations of armed conflict enterprises should respect the standards of international humanitarian law."



"Understanding that governments have the primary responsibility to promote and protect human rights and that all parties to a conflict are obliged to observe applicable international humanitarian law, we recognize that we share the common goal of promoting respect for human rights ... and international humanitarian law."







'Heightened human rights due diligence'

Having business operations or relationships in conflict-affected areas may increase the risk of being complicit in gross human rights or IHL violations. The UNGPs imply that extra care should be taken in these contexts, in the form of "enhanced" or "heightened" human rights due diligence.

Through an IHL lens, this means:

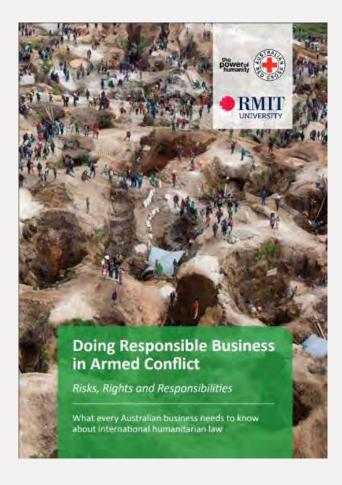
- Taking a conflict-sensitive approach
- Including meaningful references to IHL in relevant statements and company policies
- Providing / undertaking IHL training
- Being aware of how operations can be closely linked to an armed conflict
- Establishing processes for reporting and investigating violations of IHL

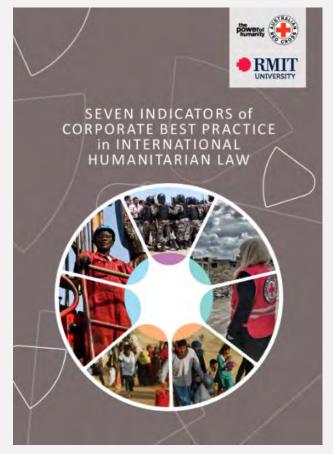

Forthcoming research

Context

- Events such as the conflict in Ukraine have led to heightened awareness of human rights and ESG considerations in commercial activities.
- Businesses have a limited understanding of IHL and don't include IHL considerations in their investments and operations.
- Financial institutions have considerable exposure overseas and need to be aware of how IHL applies to investment decisionmaking.

Outcomes

- Understand the extent to which investors and financial institutions in Australia incorporate IHLrelated matters into investment decision making.
- Develop guidance on embedding IHL in heightened human rights due diligence.
- Develop guidance on IHL implementation vis-à-vis responsible investment practices, and disclosures and reporting.

Modern Slavery Policy and Advocacy Matrix - Work in progress, pros and cons not listed

Scope Lower threshold for mandatory reporting Alter the definition of 'modern slavery' to include other similar human rights issues Compliance Penalties for non-compliance Incentives for compliance, e.g. tax incentives Increased powers for government to publicly name and shame companies that fail to comply (e.g. after one or two initial warnings) Expand reporting to the entire value chain (not just suppliers but also customers) Governance Anti-slavery commissioner, independent from government or any other government body like the Australian Human Rights Commission Mandatory reviews every three years from now Implementation and effectiveness Dedicated national hotline on modern slavery Publication of a list of companies that should report Increased public awareness through education



Fundamental changes to the MSA

• Encompass mandatory human rights due diligence - (This approach goes beyond the requirements of the current MSA and requires companies to assess actual and potential human rights impacts, integrate and act on findings, track responses and communicate how these impacts have been addressed)

Definitions / clarifications / enhanced guidance

- Review and updated guidance
- Clearer definition of what it means to be 'addressing' modern slavery.
- Clearer definition of what the Act means about 'effectiveness'.

Adjacent legislation

- National labour hire certification scheme
- National compensation scheme for victims of modern slavery in Australia, modelled on existing victim compensation schemes administered by the government
- Make directors liable when a company is not doing enough
- Expand reporting to cover specific high-risk products/regions, in line with proposed import restrictions

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Ukraine-Russia War: Increased risks of modern slavery and human trafficking

The displacement of people and disruptions to law enforcement and support services during conflict heightens the risks of trafficking and labour exploitation, particularly for refugee populations.

Since the beginning of the Russia-Ukraine war in February 2022, an estimated <u>6 million</u> people have fled Ukraine and <u>7.7 million</u> have been internally displaced. While it is too early to assess the scale of trafficking and labour exploitation risks, the <u>International Organization for Migration</u> and <u>Europol</u> have received early reports of possible traffickers targeting refugees, under the pretext of offering transport or accommodation services, in countries bordering Ukraine.

Refugees fleeing Ukraine may face particular circumstances that leave them vulnerable to exploitation:

- Unable to speak the language and lack understanding of the labour rights in their arrival country.
- Undocumented refugees or those with non-Ukrainian nationality, who may not have access to or register for the EU's visa-free scheme
- Lack of financial security and livelihood options
- Women and children, particularly unaccompanied minors, who are disproportionately impacted by modern slavery. It is estimate approximately <u>90%</u> of refugees fleeing Ukraine are women and children.

Corporate involvement in Ukraine and bordering countries

Poland has received the majority of Ukrainian refugees, followed by Romania, Russia, Hungary, the Republic of Moldova, Slovakia and Belarus. An estimated <u>1.8 million</u> have moved from these countries to other countries in Europe.

ISS ESG's Modern Slavery Scorecard assesses Ukraine, Russia and Belarus as high risk for modern slavery, while Romania, Hungary, Moldova and Slovakia are considered medium risk. The risk assessment considers a country's vulnerability to modern slavery, based on key risk indicators, including basic labour rights and working conditions, inequality, political stability, corruption, safeguarding of civil and political rights, discrimination and gender equality.

Best practice for companies that have operations in, or are sourcing goods or engaging in other business arrangements, in the conflict affected region is heightened due diligence to address the following key risks.



- 1. Risks of labour exploitation in countries bordering Ukraine
 - Previous conflict situations suggest refugees are particularly vulnerable to
 exploitation in labour intensive, base skill sectors, such as hospitality, agriculture,
 courier/transportation and services (e.g. cleaning, car washes). Where third-party
 recruitment agents are used workers may be made to pay a fee to secure their job,
 which can expose them to debt-based coercion.
 - Due diligence priorities: Recruitment agent screening and monitoring, supporting employees in Ukraine/Russia (continuation of wages, safety), engagement with suppliers employing refugees.
- 2. Use of social media platforms for the recruitment and exploitation of victims
 - Several civil society organisations have <u>noted</u> increased risks in social media being used for the recruitment and exploitation of victims, notably for sex trafficking, forced marriage or for labour exploitation.
 - Due diligence priorities: Coordination with law enforcement to monitor content (screen job advertisements or 'help' groups, where refugees might be providing details about their location and difficult situation which may be used by traffickers to contact them under the pretext of providing assistance) and awareness-raising campaigns on trafficking risks.
- 3. Lack of access to basic financial services, which can push refugees into debt or force them to accept exploitative conditions
 - Ukrainian government through the Ukraine Central Bank has so far kept banking system running, however, there have been <u>reports</u> of challenges accessing bank accounts and exchanging Ukrainian currency into local currencies in arrival countries. There have also been <u>reports</u> of difficulty accessing accounts in Russian banks operating in Ukraine due to EU sanctions.
 - The financial sector, particularly banking services, can help refugees establish in new countries and avoid debt-based coercion through access to basic banking services and stable lines of credit.
