

AUTISM SCREENING · AQ-10

A short questionnaire about your **child**

Your child's SENCO has shared this with you because a few things at school suggest it may be worth looking at autism more closely.

What the AQ-10 is

The AQ-10 is a ten-question screening tool recommended by NICE. It is not a diagnosis. It gives your GP a clear, quick picture of the traits people notice most often in autistic children, in your own words.

Which page to use

Use page 2 for children aged 4 to 11. Use page 3 for young people aged 12 to 15. Fill in one page only, and leave the other blank.

How to fill it in

You know your child best. Answer each of the ten statements with your first instinct, thinking about how your child usually is rather than one particular day. Tick one box per statement. It takes about five minutes.

What happens next

Bring the completed form to your NHS GP appointment. It helps guide the conversation and supports a request for an autism assessment referral. Your GP will explain the options from there.

SCORING

Each shaded box on the form scores **1 point**; unshaded boxes score 0. Add the ticks that fall in shaded boxes to get a total out of 10. **A score of 6 or above** means a referral for a full autism assessment is worth considering. A lower score does not rule autism out — if you or the school still have concerns, say so at the appointment.
