8 ready-to-use team-building activities designed to foster meaningful staff connections and help new hires bond with veteran colleagues—perfect for school leaders looking to build a strong, connected team!

#### When to Use It:

Kick off the school year, energize professional development days, or strengthen connections during staff meetings throughout the year.

#### **Positive Outcomes:**

- Stronger relationships and belonging
- Better communication and informal mentorship
- Boosted engagement and improved staff retention



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# STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTION FOR THE SCHOOL LEADER

### **Preparation**

- Prior to the start of the school year, partner new teachers with veteran staff
- Schedule mentor/mentee meetings for the entire school year and present to staff at the beginning of the school during professional development days.

#### **Timeframe:**

 About 15 minutes during staff meetings scheduled throughout the school year.



## 8 TEAM-BUILDING ACTIVITIES TO WELCOME NEW STAFF

### 1. Partner Interviews + Staff Showcase

What to Do: Have your staff line up from most to least years in the education field. Find the middle of the line, then pair up newer staff with veteran staff for a fun partner interview (guided questions included!). Each person will introduce their partner to the group using a few of their responses—it's a great way for everyone to connect and learn something new about one another!

- Why: Builds personal connections quickly and reduces anxiety. New staff feel seen, while veteran staff model belonging and school culture.
- Items Needed: partner question printable

## 2. "This or That" Walk

What to Do: Read fun or school-related "this or that" questions (e.g., early bird or night owl, Google or paper planner). Staff move to sides of the room to show their choice.

- Why: A low-pressure, movement-based activity that shows how people are similar or different. It encourages laughter and light connections.
- Items Needed: "This or that questions" <u>projected</u> or printed off for you to read or share with paired staff.



## 3. Shared Experience Map

What to Do: Create a large wall chart where staff place sticky notes marking where they started teaching, where they were born, how many siblings they have, first job, where they went to High School, or favorite teaching memories.

- Why: Highlights shared backgrounds and interesting paths into education. Encourages storytelling and finding common ground.
- Items Needed: chart paper, sticky notes, sharpies, and tape.

## 4. "Ask Me About" Name Tags

What to Do: Alongside names, staff write something they love (e.g., "Ask me about classroom transformations" or "Ask me about coaching volleyball")

- Why: Creates natural conversation starters, helping new staff discover mutual interests and strengths in the group!
- Items Needed: Name tags (note cards, labels) and Sharpies



## 5. Collaborative Puzzle or Art Mural

What to Do: Give each team a blank puzzle piece or canvas square to write name and decorate with something meaningful to them. Assemble the final piece and put puzzle together to display it. Check out our ready to go resource!

- Why: It creates a visual reminder that everyone contributes to the school community. New staff see their place in the "big picture."
- Items needed: poster board cut into pieces, scissors, and sharpies.





## **6. School Survival Tips Wall**

What to Do: Veteran staff anonymously post one practical tip for new staff on sticky notes (e.g., best copier to use, how to schedule a tech request).

- Why: Offers real, helpful insight while showing new staff that their colleagues have their backs.
- Items needed: Bulletin board, wall, or poster board in teacher's lounge, sticky notes, and Sharpies.

## 7. The "Appreciation Circle"

What to Do: Veteran staff write one thing they appreciate about joining new colleagues ("I appreciate your energy," "Loved your questions at PD").

- Why: Positive affirmations increases morale, creates a sense of value, and models a supportive school culture.
- Items needed: Notecard and sticky notes

## 8. Team Challenge: "Design the Dream Classroom"

What to Do: Mixed teams of new and veteran staff design a dream classroom setup on poster paper or digitally, then present.

- Why: Encourages collaboration, creativity, and discussion of teaching philosophies in a fun, low-stakes way.
- Items Needed: Poster boards and markers







## **Buddy Match-Up:** Yearlong Connection Quest



**August/September:** Take a tour of the building and share your top "survival tip" or favorite spot on campus.

**October:** Decorate a door, classroom space, or pumpkin together with a fall theme—collaborative creativity builds camaraderie.

**November:** Share one strategy that's made a positive impact on your students this year (behavior, motivation, or organization).

**December:** Swap a small winter care package (think: tea bag, sticky notes, favorite quote, or a candy cane)—small acts of kindness go far.

**January:** Kick off the new semester with a 15-minute walk-and-talk break or plan goals for the new year together.

**February:** Write a short note of appreciation for your buddy and sneak it into their mailbox—modeling gratitude spreads joy.

**March:** Observe each other's classrooms or routines for 10 minutes and leave a positive note with one thing you admired.

**April:** Take a spring "brain break" together—lunch outside, a walk, or sharing your favorite energizer activity with each other.

**May:** Take a selfie or buddy photo together and write down your biggest lesson learned from each other this year.




## **All About My Buddy**
