Fruit Trees

2026 Apple Varieties Shared Characteristics: All apple varieties listed below from the Spring Tree Sale share some common characteristics. Apple trees are semi-dwarf and will reach a height of 12-15' and will spread approximately 12-15' wide. Each has a white bloom and has medium--large fruit size. Pollination is required (you will need to buy two varieties or plant near an existing apple tree of a different variety for cross pollination) and the trees require full sun. Loamy, well drained soils will yield highest success with a pH level between 6.0 and 7.0. It will take approximately 2-7 years for the trees to begin bearing fruit.

Apple Tree Descriptions

Golden Delicious (EMLA 111) A sweet, mild-flavored apple with a yellow-green skin. It is an all-purpose fruit that is good for both fresh eating and cooking. Its flesh resists browning so its great for salads. Pollination required.

GoldRush (EMLA 111) A late-season apple known for its complex, spicy sweet-tart flavor that improves in storage, and its golden-yellow skin with a red-orange blush. It is firm, crisp and juicy with a long shelf life. Great for fresh eating, cooking and drying. Pollination required.

Honeycrisp (EMLA 111) Outstanding fresh-eating qualities make this variety a favorite. Fruit is aromatic and sweet with a juicy, crisp texture. Calcium improves fruit quality and helps with growth. Pollination required.

Northern Spy (EMLA 7) A large, crisp and juicy heritage apple known for its balance of sweet and tart flavor. It has greenish-yellow skin with red stripes and is excellent for pies, cider, and fresh eating though its best for baking due to its tartness. It is also very cold hardy and stores well. Pollination required.

Pear Tree Descriptions

Flemish Beauty (OHxF 87, 3/4: diameter) (Pyrus communis) A hardy Belgian pear, it is a great choice for growers in cold climates. Fruit is medium to large and rounded in shape with yellow skin that has a beautiful red blush. Ripens mid-late season. Excellent for fresh eating as well as drying. Cold hardy, disease resistant. Cross-pollination required.

Jung Hardy Pear (OHxF 87, 3/4: diameter) A hardy Wisconsin pear is a medium sized, golden, slightly russeted and slightly blushed pear. Best used fresh or canned. Very hardy and crisp. Cross-pollination required.

Plum Tree Descriptions

Early Italian Prune (SEED. 5/8") A large purple freestone plum with yellow-green flesh. Great for drying and canning due to their sweet and firm flesh. These plums are "fresh from the tree" eating favorites. Ripening mid September. Self pollinating.

Tree & Shrub Descriptions

Black Spruce (*Picea mariana*) Black spruce is a small, narrow evergreen tree with a spire-like crown. It has descending branches, with dark, bluish-green needles, and upturned ends. Lower limbs sweep the ground. It is an excellent choice for cold northern climates and tolerant of wet sites. Thrives well in sun in these types of soils; Acid soil, Moist, well-drained soil, Wet soil. - *Native*

Colorado Blue Spruce (*Picea pungens*) A native of the Rocky Mountains, slow-growing, long-lived, medium-sized up to 50 feet. Grows well on almost any upland soil; drought resistant. Root system very shallow on heavy textured or wet soils, exposed trees subject to wind throw. - *Exotic*

Emerald Green Arborvitae (*Thuja occidentalis 'Smaragd'*) - A narrow, pyramidal evergreen with dense, emerald green foliage that holds its color throughout winter. Thrives in the heat and humidity of the south, and tolerates dry spells when established. One of the most popular and effective shrubs for screening or tall hedge use. An ideal specimen for topiary. Moderate growing; reaches 15 ft. tall, 3 to 4 ft. wide. Prefers deep, fertile, loamy, well-drained soil with consistent moisture. - *Native cultivar*

Jack Pine (*Pinus banksiana*) Small to medium sized tree reaching 55-65 feet. Great habitat for unique wildlife species including endangered Kirtland's warbler and excels in dry, acidic sandy soils or in loamy or thin soils over bedrock. - *Native*

Red Cedar (*Juniperus virginiana*) Small to medium sized reaching 10-40 feet. Occurs commonly on limestone derived soils. Does best on dry soils in full sun light. - *Native*

Red Pine (*Pinus resinosa*) Fast-growing, long-lived tree growing up to 80 feet. Shade-intolerant. Grows best on well-drained sandy loam soil. Intolerant of high water tables. Excellent tree for reforestation on poor sandy sites. Timber tree with distinctive reddish bark. - *Introduced*

White Pine (*Pinus strobus*) Long-lived, moderately fast-growing reaching 80-100 feet. Fairly shade-tolerant, seedlings grow best in partial shade. Prefers moist sandy loam soils but will grow on a variety of sites from swamp to dry sand. - *Native*

White Cedar (*Thuja occidentalis*) Small to medium-sized tree growing up to 60 ft. Very slow-growing. Shade tolerant but best in full or partial sun. Prefers moist deep rich organic soil, but will inhabit dry upland sites. Not found in upland acidic soils. Adapted to clay and sand soils. Wood commercially valuable due to its variety of uses. Favorite deer shelter and food. - *Native*

White Spruce (*Picea glauca*) Medium to large reaching 80 feet. Shade-tolerant but prefers sun. Clay, sand and loam soils with moisture conditions from moist to dry, best in well-drained sandy loams. Drought resistant. Straight stemmed, narrow crowned. - *Native*

Norway Spruce (*Picea abies*) Moderately fast-growing, long-lived tree reaching 85 feet. Prefers full sun, tolerates some shade. Thrives on rich, acid, moist well-drained soils but will grow on wide variety. Root system shallow on clay or poorly-drained soils. - *Introduced*

Tamarack (*Larix laricina*) Also know as American larch. Medium deciduous conifer tree reaching 60 ft. Straight, slender trunk and narrow, open pyramidal crown. Shade intolerant. Can withstand high soil moisture, high acidity, and low soil temperature. - *Native*

Balsam Fir (*Abies balsamea*) The balsam fir is a native evergreen well-adapted to the cold climates of the northern United States and Canada. Its symmetrical spire-like crown, shining dark green color, and spicy fragrance have made it a favorite Christmas tree for hundreds of years. The branches are also popular in holiday wreaths and other greenery. - *Native*

2026 Plug Stock

Plug Stock: Seeded in trays when the plug is extracted, soil is left on the roots for protection during handling and planting. Plug stock tend to have a higher survival rate than bare root stock.

Plug stock available: (size 6-12") Balsam Fir, Black Spruce, Norway Spruce, Jack Pine, White Pine, Cedar, Tamarack, Red Oak.

Red Oak (*Quercus rubra*) Moderately fast-growing large tree that thrives on rich moist soils but also grows on sandy sites. Long-lived, it reaches heights of 70 feet and does best in full sun or light shade. Desirable street and lawn tree as it is tolerant of salt. Acorns taken by grouse, squirrels, deer and other wildlife. - *Native*

Red Maple (*Acer rubrum*) Fast-growing and moderately long-lived tree reaching heights of 70 ft. Shade tolerant. Found in all sorts of woods, prefers wet to moist poorly-drained sandy or loam soil. Well named tree as the flowers, young fruit and autumn foliage are a brilliant red. Often planted as a shade tree. - *Native*

Sugar Maple (*Acer saccharum*) Hard maple. Valued for its wood and also as a shade and ornamental tree. Sap is a source for maple sugar. Grows best on rich moist upland soils but will adapt to poorer, drier sites. Slow-growing and long-lived. Reaches heights of 90 feet. - *Native*

Black Walnut (*Juglans nigra*) Quick growing tree in ideal conditions up to 70-100 ft. Self pollinating. Great wildlife tree for all types of animals. Roots produce toxin not suitable for sensitive species of plants. - *Native*

Common Lilac (*Syringa vulgaris*) The common lilac is an old-fashioned, long-lived, and well-loved lilac best known for its fragrant flowers. It is extremely hardy and thrives with little care which make it a lovely shrub for a specimen planting, in masses, screens, hedges, or mixed in shrub borders. The May blooming flowers are typically purple to lilac. - *Exotic*

Beaked Hazelnut (*Corylus cornuta*) Beaked hazelnut is easily recognized by its rounded oval, fuzzy leaves with doubly saw-toothed margins. They turn a bright yellow in fall. grows 3 to 15 ft. (1-5m); California Hazelnut may grow even bigger, to 45 ft (15m). It grows best in moist, well-drained sites; open forests and edges of forests. - *Native*

Winterberry, Holly (*Ilex verticillate*) also known as Michigan Holly, is primarily a wetland shrub. It can reach up to 12 feet in height. It prefers wet to moist soil with very poor to moderate drainage. It is salt sensitive. Winterberry transplants well and is fairly resistant to disease and insects. It is also resistant to compact soils. The berries have a high wildlife value for waterfowl and songbirds, but are poisonous to humans. Winterberry needs both male and female plants for berries. - *Native*

Chestnut, Chinese (*Castanea mollissima*) Zone 4-8 Typically grows 40-60 ft tall with a rounded crown. Under ideal conditions, it has a slow to medium growth rate of 12 to 24 inches per year in well drained loam soil and full sun. They tolerate hot and humid summers well and are highly drought tolerant. Showy fragrant flowers, after pollination nuts develop with spiky burrs, usually 2-3 inches wide. Nuts ripen from mid to late September. - *Exotic*

Highbush Cranberry (*Viburnum trilobum*) Attractive shrub up to 15 feet that will tolerate a high degree of shade once established. Tolerates a broad range of soils, including wet clay. Prefers moist site in the open or partial shade. Produces handsome clusters of white flowers. Bright scarlet berries are winter food for ruffed grouse. - *Native*

Ninebark (*Physocarpus opulifolius*) Shade intolerant, spreading shrub up to 10 feet. Pink to white flowers appear in June & July. Fruit attracts wildlife, remains on branches throughout winter. Along stream banks, the branches provide high quality aquatic cover. Great for borders and screens, transplants easily. - *Native*

Tree and Shrub Descriptions

American Mountain Ash (*Sorbus americana*) Zone 3-7, Mature height 30 ft. American Mtn. Ash is native to northern North America and Eastern Canada. Grows in dry rocky areas, to moist rich woods. Prefers full sun. Grayish, yellow-brown smooth bark. Long, compound leaves with sharp toothed edges. Leaves turn orange-red in autumn. Flowers are white or pink. Berries are orange-red and 1/4 inch in diameter. Buds are shiny, in contrast with the European version's pubescent buds. The fruit ripens in October and remains on the tree all winter. - *Native*

Eastern Sand Cherry (*Prunus pumila*) a creeping, low-growing small shrub naturally found in sandy locations, such as dunes, where it acts an important stabilizer. The cherry fruits are too bitter to eat fresh, but can be used in jams and jellies. The flowers are white and bloom in the April-June time with a black round, glossy purplish-black fruits; attract birds. - **Native**

Weeping Willow (*Salix babylonica*) Graceful and refined, easily recognized by its open crown of ground-sweeping branches. Leaves are light green above, grayish-green beneath. This willow grows especially well near water, reaches 30' - 40' tall, 35' spread. This tree grows at a fast rate, with height increases of more than 24" per year. Full sun and partial shade are best for this tree and it grows well in acidic, alkaline, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well-drained and clay soils. It grows well near water but has some drought tolerance. - *Exotic*

Blue Hydrangea (*Hydrangea paniculate*) Blue hydrangeas can grow to be 2–6 feet tall and wide. With large, showy blooms that can be deep-blue in acidic soils and pink in alkaline soils. They have large, lush leaves that are forest green and bloom typically from late spring to early fall. They can grow in a variety of soils, including acidic, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, silty loam, and well drained. Preferring full sun or partial sun and shade. Very easy to take care of and maintain making it a perfect hedge or accent plant. - *Exotic*

Eastern Redbud (*Cercis Canadensis*) Beautiful tree reaching 15-30 feet tall and spreading 15-25 feet. Deer enjoy browsing twigs during spring and summer and its flowers provide nectar for hummingbirds and pollen for honeybees. Other wildlife also take advantage of the buds, bark, and seed. - *Native*

Siberian Crabapple (*Malus Baccata*) A very hardy tree that adapts to a variety of soils but prefers a heavy loam soil. Like its name Siberian it tolerates a zone 2 climate well. Grows best in full sun, well drained and moist soils. Great wildlife tree. - *Exotic*

Red Osier Dogwood (*Cornus sericea*) Multi-stemmed spreading shrub up to 9 feet. Dark green foliage turns purple in the fall. Twigs turn red in winter. Thrives in wet soils. White flowers in June provide berries in fall. Wildlife food and habitat.- *Native*

Swamp White Oak (*Quercus bicolor*) Slow-growing large tree that reaches 90 feet. Tolerates most soils except very wet sites. Acorns a favorite of both birds and animals. Valuable timber/wildlife tree. - *Native*

Yellow Birch (*Betula alleghaniensis*) The name "yellow birch" reflects the color of the tree's bark. The wood is extensively used for flooring, cabinetry and toothpicks. Most wood sold as birch in North America is from this tree. Broken twigs have a wintergreen smell. The bark is amber to silvery with a smooth texture and exfoliating in thin rolls. - *Native*

Black Cherry (*Prunus serotina*) A large, native tree found in the Midwest and throughout the eastern United States. The showy white flowers appear as pendulous clusters in early spring, followed by dark, pea-sized fruits in late summer. The mature bark is dark and scaly, often flipping up on the edges. - *Native*

American Plum (*Prunus americana*) American Plum has white flowers in spring. The roots are shallow, widely spread, and send up suckers. Development of suckers from the root system makes American plum effective in stabilizing stream banks and gullies. It will tolerate several days of flooding. The branches are thorny. The fruits are about 1 inch in diameter. The American plum is used for both ornamental and culinary purposes. The sour and sweet fruit is eaten fresh and is made into jellies, jam and wine. - *Native*

Allegheny Serviceberry (*Amelanchier arborea*) Also known as Juneberry, 15-25 feet. White flowers appear before leaves. Young leaves are covered with soft, woolly hairs that disappear as leaf matures. Small, edible berries are reddish purple and the leaves may turn wine-red in fall. Prefers moist, well-drained, acid soils and is shade tolerant. - *Native*

Bur Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*) is a large, sturdy North American deciduous tree known for its distinctive deeply lobed leaves, massive trunk with thick, furrowed bark, and large acorns with fringed, mossy caps, making it a fire-resistant pioneer species of prairies and savannas, capable of reaching over 80 feet with a broad, spreading crown and exceptional drought tolerance. - *Native*

Button Bush (*Cephalanthus occidentalis*) is a native North American shrub or small tree that thrives in wet areas and features distinctive, globe-shaped clusters of white, fragrant flowers that resemble pincushions. It is a valuable plant for wildlife, attracting pollinators like butterflies and bees, and providing seeds for birds. The plant is adaptable to a wide range of soils as long as they are moist, making it a good choice for rain gardens or stream bank stabilization. - *Native*

New Jersey Tea (*Ceanothus americanus*) is a compact, mounding native North American shrub known for its masses of tiny, fragrant white flowers in early summer that attract pollinators, glossy green leaves turning reddish in fall, and a deep, woody root system that makes it drought-tolerant and great for erosion control but hard to transplant. Plant offers a sturdy, attractive, low-growing plant for sunny, well-drained sites. - *Native*

Pussy Willow (*Salix discolor*) is a fast-growing, deciduous shrub or small tree that is known for its soft, silvery-gray, fuzzy catkins (flowers) that appear in late winter before the leaves emerge. The "fur" on the buds protects the developing flowers and provides a crucial early food source for pollinators like bees. - *Native*

River Birch (*Betula nigra*) are characterized by their attractive, peeling, papery bark that ranges from cinnamon to dark brown or black, and their triangular, doubly serrated leaves that flutter in the wind. They typically grow to a height of 40–70 feet and thrive in full sun and moist, acidic soils. They are known for being heat-tolerant and resistant to the bronze birch borer, making them a popular ornamental tree. - *Introduced*

Shagbark Hickory (*Carya ovata*) is a large, deciduous tree distinguished by its "shaggy" gray bark that peels away in long, vertical strips. It is also known for its large, edible nuts, which have a thick husk that splits open, and its compound leaves with 3 to 5 (sometimes 7) leaflets. The tree can grow up to 100 feet tall and is native to the eastern United States, thriving in well-drained soils. - *Native*

Small Fruit Descriptions

Patriot Blueberry (*Vaccinium corymbosum*) Quarter-size berries, big and bountiful—the largest early-season blueberry. An outstanding flavor fresh, baked, and in preserves and freezes well. Tolerates moisture, including clay type soils. Disease-resistant to root rot. Cold-hardy. Ripens in June and is self-pollinating, but will yield larger crops if you plant two or more. - *Native Cultivar*

Encore Raspberry (*Rubus idaeus var.*) Is the latest summer bearing raspberry, it begins to ripen mid-July, and extends into mid-August. The large fruit grows on top of strong, nearly spineless canes, making them easy to pick. The plants do not need to be supported by any trellis. Extend your raspberry season with Encore. Hardiness Zones 4-9. Self-pollinating. - *Native Cultivar*

Ranch Elderberry (*Sambucus canadensis*) Is very forgiving if you have non-fertile soils and grows 5-6 feet tall which makes it great for picking berries. The Ranch Elderberry is able to handle a zone 3 winter easily but does requires cross pollination. - *Native Cultivar*

Johns Elderberry (*Sambucus canadensis*) Produces larger berries on more vigorous plants. It's green foliage has an appealing gloss to add landscape interest to this bush. Giant clusters of white flowers bloom in spring, becoming soft, nearly black berries in late summer. Both the elderflowers and the ripe elderberries are edible. Cold-hardy. Ripens in mid-August. Hardiness Zones 3-9 - *Native Cultivar*

Strawberries, Fraises Des Bois (Berries of the Woods) (*Fragaria*) The plants grow a pyramidal mound in shape and produce no runners. The plants flower and fruit continuously during the summer months until the temperature becomes colder in the early autumn. The deep red fruits are conical and small and are a little over 1 inch long. The highly aromatic fruits are sweet without acidity when ripe. This is an excellent choice for container gardens. Hardiness Zones 4-8. - *Native Cultivar*



