Obtaining A Medicare Card For Your Newborn Baby

Overview

Services Australia advises that your newborn baby **cannot** be assigned a Medicare number prior to birth.¹



You will **need to enrol** your newborn baby into Medicare immediately following birth. To enrol your newborn baby into Medicare, the critical documentation required is the

Newborn Child Declaration

Form which can be found in the **Parent Pack** provided

to you by your midwife, doctor, or the hospital where your baby was born.¹



Connect with your midwife, doctor, or the hospital where your baby is due to be born to ensure the **Parent Pack** is ready and available at birth, so you have access to the **Newborn Child Declaration Form** immediately after your baby is born.



The back page of the Newborn Child Declaration Form will need to be completed and signed by the midwife



What if we do not have a Newborn Declaration Form?







If you do not have a Newborn
Declaration Form, the guidance
from Services Australia is to
use a Medicare Enrolment
Application Form.³



You can submit the Medicare Enrolment Form with your baby's Birth Certificate via email to the Medicare Enrolment Services (mes@servicesaustralia.gov.au) including Enrolment in the email subject line.4



Alternatively, you can also enroll your newborn using your baby's Birth Certificate via your Medicare online account, or the Express Plus Medicare mobile app.4



Once you have completed the form, you will see your updated digital card straight away by selecting the **My Card** option in the menu.⁵

A Family's Personal Experience

Our journey with Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) began with the birth of our first child, a daughter who lived for 8 months and 22 days. Both my husband and I discovered we were carriers of SMA after our daughter's diagnosis. In the years following our loss, advancements in research and the availability of treatments led us to try for more children. Genetic testing during pregnancy revealed that our third child would also have SMA Type 1.

With the support from our healthcare team, we decided on treatment, which at that time would be administered in Sydney. As early treatment was crucial for our baby's well-being, we made a plan. What we didn't know was that to access treatments reimbursed by the Government or to even make a treatment order, our baby needed a Medicare number.

Despite the urgency of our situation, a Medicare number can only be generated following birth. Initially we were told we could go into a Medicare service centre with the appropriate documents, and one could be created on the spot. However, the service centres are only open Monday to Friday. Our baby was due on a Saturday, and we simply did not have the time to wait until Monday.

Through persistence, we eventually found a faster way – we were told as soon as our baby was born, we needed our doctor to complete the back page of the Newborn Declaration Form and upload it to our account via the Medicare app. Our baby was born 8 days early and on a Friday at 1:20 am. The Newborn

Declaration Form was filled out by our doctor. We took a photo of the back page and uploaded it to our account on the Medicare app. Fifteen minutes later we called Medicare (132 011), answered a few questions and by the end of the call, we had a Medicare number. By 4am, his number and the digital version of our card were with our neurologist and treatment was organized – this was critical as the treatment needed to come from overseas. Twenty-four hours later we were on the way to Sydney and our baby was treated at 5 days old. Our baby boy is now a thriving toddler.

We appreciate every child and circumstance will be different. This was our experience. What we learned from this experience is the importance of the Newborn Declaration Form for enrolling a newborn into Medicare. It also helped to notify Medicare as soon as we had our son's diagnosis so it could be flagged on our account that our newborn would require life-changing treatment following birth and the urgency of creating a Medicare number. While physical submission at a Medicare service centre is an option, the app provided a quicker solution for us.
