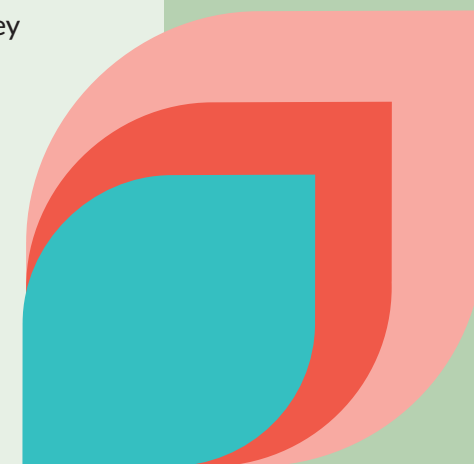

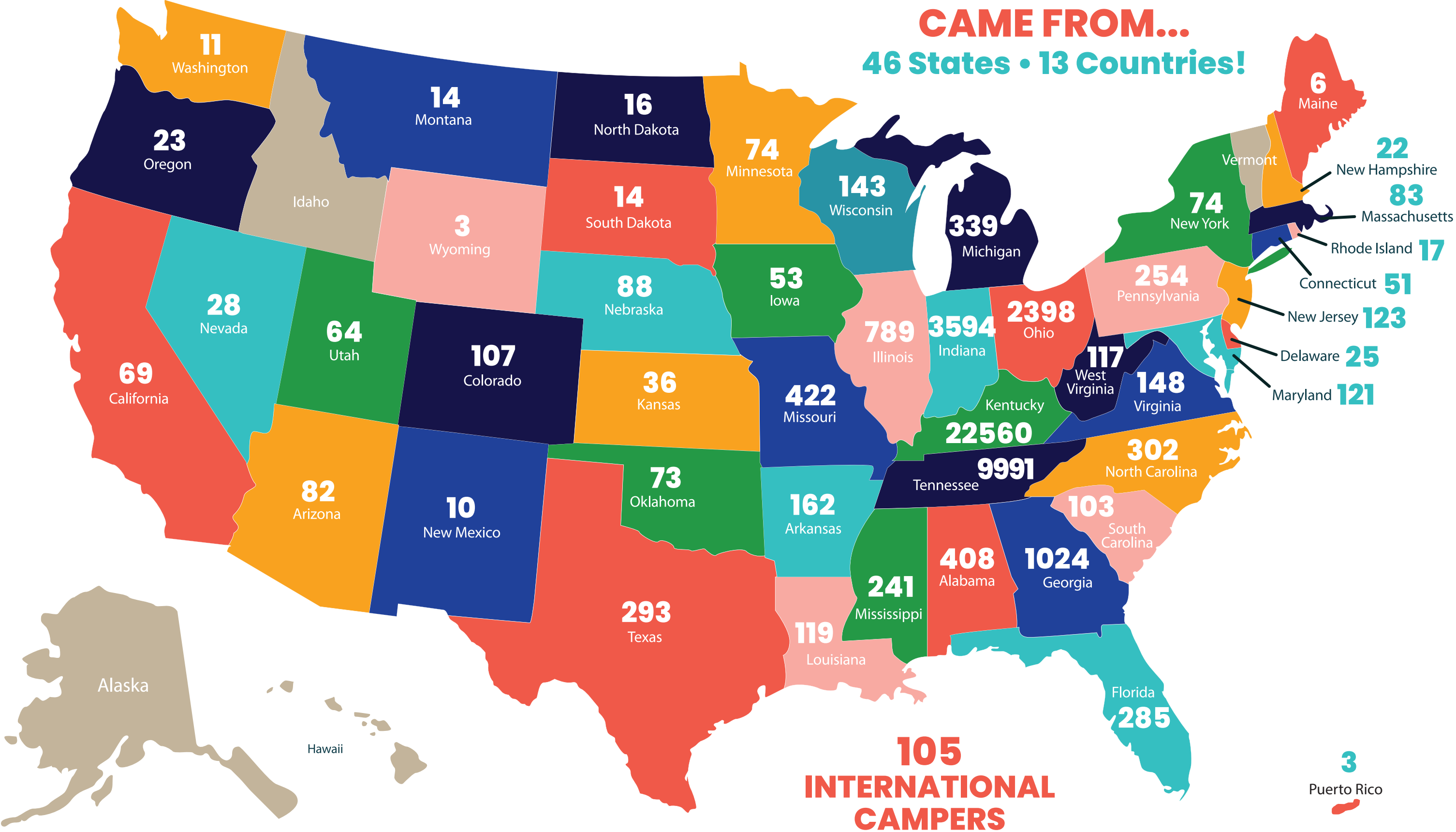

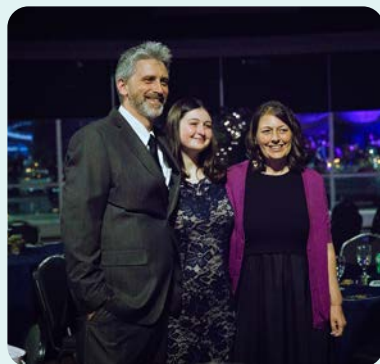

More Than Medicine

Each summer, medical volunteers from across the region step away from hospitals and clinics to serve at CCK. While they provide specialized nursing care, medication management, and oversight of camper health and wellness, they often leave camp with something even more meaningful: a renewed sense of purpose.

“In the hospital you see the kids pretty ‘alone’ in a sense, but at camp, seeing them make friends and become confident is a truly incredible thing,” shared Kylee, RN, who volunteered during Hematology/Oncology Week.

For Josh, a volunteer during Cardiology/Pulmonology Week, camp offered an unexpected reunion. He recognized one of the campers as a former patient he had cared for in the pediatric intensive care unit following heart surgery. At CCK, he witnessed that same child joyfully spending time with friends and embracing every part of the camp experience.

When asked whether they would recommend volunteering at CCK to other nurses, the answer is always the same: “Do it!”

As Erin, a volunteer during Physical Disabilities Week, put it, “It makes you realize why you became a nurse.”

At CCK, medical volunteers help create a safe environment where campers can thrive. In return, they are reminded that healing isn’t only found in hospitals. Sometimes, it looks like laughter around a campfire, confidence gained through new experiences, and friendships formed that last long after the week ends.

The stories that matter most are often shared in the quiet moments after camp ends. Through these letters, mothers reflect on the ways CCK has shaped their children, strengthened their families, and created a place where they truly belong.



“It is so special for us to spend time with other families like ours. To be in a place where our daughter’s differences were so well considered that they were never a ‘problem’ is an incredible blessing. At CCK, she is just another camper here to enjoy a weekend with her family. To see her welcomed and loved as a whole person truly sets my heart at ease.

Honestly, my favorite part is being able to say, ‘Yes!’ to everything my kids want to do. There are many times at home that we have to split the family into who ‘can’ and who ‘cannot,’ meaning someone is always left out. At CCK, we were able to do the activities together. It was a change from the usual ‘we can’t do that because of Carmen’ to ‘we get to go on an amazing weekend adventure because of Carmen’s autism!’

The peace of camp always follows us home.

At camp, I feel very seen. CCK demonstrated that they know how hard it is to be a parent and quietly provided a beautiful environment for us to relax in. So many child-focused programs miss the opportunity to care for the parents as well. It was a blessing to not be overlooked at CCK, but to be nurtured as well. It was incredibly life-giving.”

Building a Better Path, Together

When CCK first opened in 2008, creating access to every corner of camp was a priority. The original pathway to the lakefront, installed in 2009, was a significant improvement. But over time, we recognized opportunities to make the experience even better for the children and families we serve.

Thanks to the partnership and expertise of Fisher Contracting Co., campers can now access boating and fishing activities along a redesigned pathway featuring a gentler grade, fewer turns, and increased width. What was once a route navigated one wheelchair at a time has become a shared experience where two campers can travel side by side, continuing conversations, building friendships, and arriving at the lake together.

At CCK, we believe accessibility means continually listening, learning, and improving. We are grateful to Fisher Contracting Co. for the staff, equipment, labor, and guidance they have generously provided over the years. Whether lending their expertise, offering advice, or stepping in to tackle projects as their schedule allows, their team has helped ensure that camp remains a place where every camper can fully participate in the adventure.

Because of partners like Fisher Contracting Co., pathways do more than connect places. They help create connections between people.



A Place to Belong

Growing up as one of five siblings, Lindsey Kinsman often watched her brothers and sisters head off to camp experiences that weren't designed with her needs in mind.

"I was born with spina bifida," Lindsey shared. "I am fully paralyzed from the waist down. I have four other siblings. I always witnessed them going to camp and me never being able to."

When Lindsey's family discovered The Center for Courageous Kids, everything changed. What began as Family Weekend Retreats soon grew into summer camp experiences where Lindsey could explore her independence, build friendships, and simply be a camper.

"I remember crying tears of joy the first time we dropped her off," said her mother, Leslie. "CCK offered Lindsey the opportunity to experience independence, much like her siblings."

Now 16 years old, Lindsey has her driver's permit with hand controls, works as a cashier, and cheers on her high school team. Yet camp continues to hold a special place in her heart.

"What pulled me in was the friendly faces I get to see all the time," Lindsey said. "It all just becomes a big family."

Among her favorite camp experiences is horseback riding. "I think it's one of the most exhilarating, magical feelings ever, being able to ride the horses," she said. "I've always been a huge animal person."

In 2025, Lindsey returned to CCK for her final summer as a camper during Physical Disabilities Week. Having experienced the independence, friendships, and sense of belonging that camp provides, she made sure not to miss her last opportunity to attend.

For Lindsey and her family, CCK has always been more than a camp. It is a place where children with disabilities can experience community, discover confidence, and know they belong.

Ten Years of Compassion in Action

For ten years, nursing students and faculty from Elizabethtown Community and Technical College (ECTC) have helped create meaningful experiences for CCK campers and families. Since first volunteering during a Cardiac Conditions Family Weekend in 2015, ECTC has become a valued partner in our Family Weekend Retreat program.

Through overnight volunteer experiences, students earn clinical hours while being fully immersed in camp life. Paired with families and program areas, they gain hands-on experience while building relationships with children with disabilities and lifelong illnesses and their families. Accompanied by faculty members who serve alongside them, these volunteers have supported weekends for

campers with a variety of diagnoses, including autism, narcolepsy, cardiac conditions, and more.

Over the past decade, more than 250 ECTC students and instructors have contributed over 10,000 hours of service at CCK. For some, the experience sparks an even deeper connection. Georgina Leigh, ECTC's current Program Director, has been part of the partnership since 2016, while former student Katie Devore returned after her 2025 Family Weekend experience to spend the entire summer serving at camp.

As we celebrate this ten-year partnership, we are grateful for the compassion, dedication, and care ECTC volunteers bring to camp, helping create a place where campers and families can thrive.

In 2025, The Center for Courageous Kids began an intentional planning process to help guide the future of camp through 2028. Through surveys, historical data review, and collaboration among leadership and year-round staff, we identified the areas that matter most to our mission and long-term impact.

From that work, five key focus areas emerged, along with measurable three-year targets and one-year milestones designed to strengthen camp experiences, support organizational growth, and prepare CCK for the future.

Following Board approval, the 2026-2028 Strategic Plan will officially launch on January 1, 2026, providing a clear roadmap for the next chapter of camp.

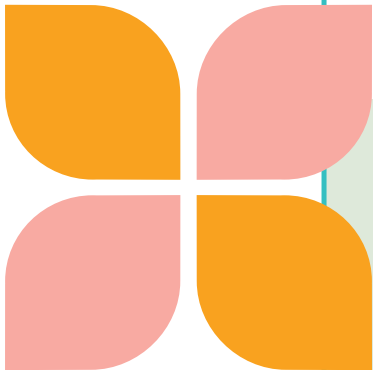

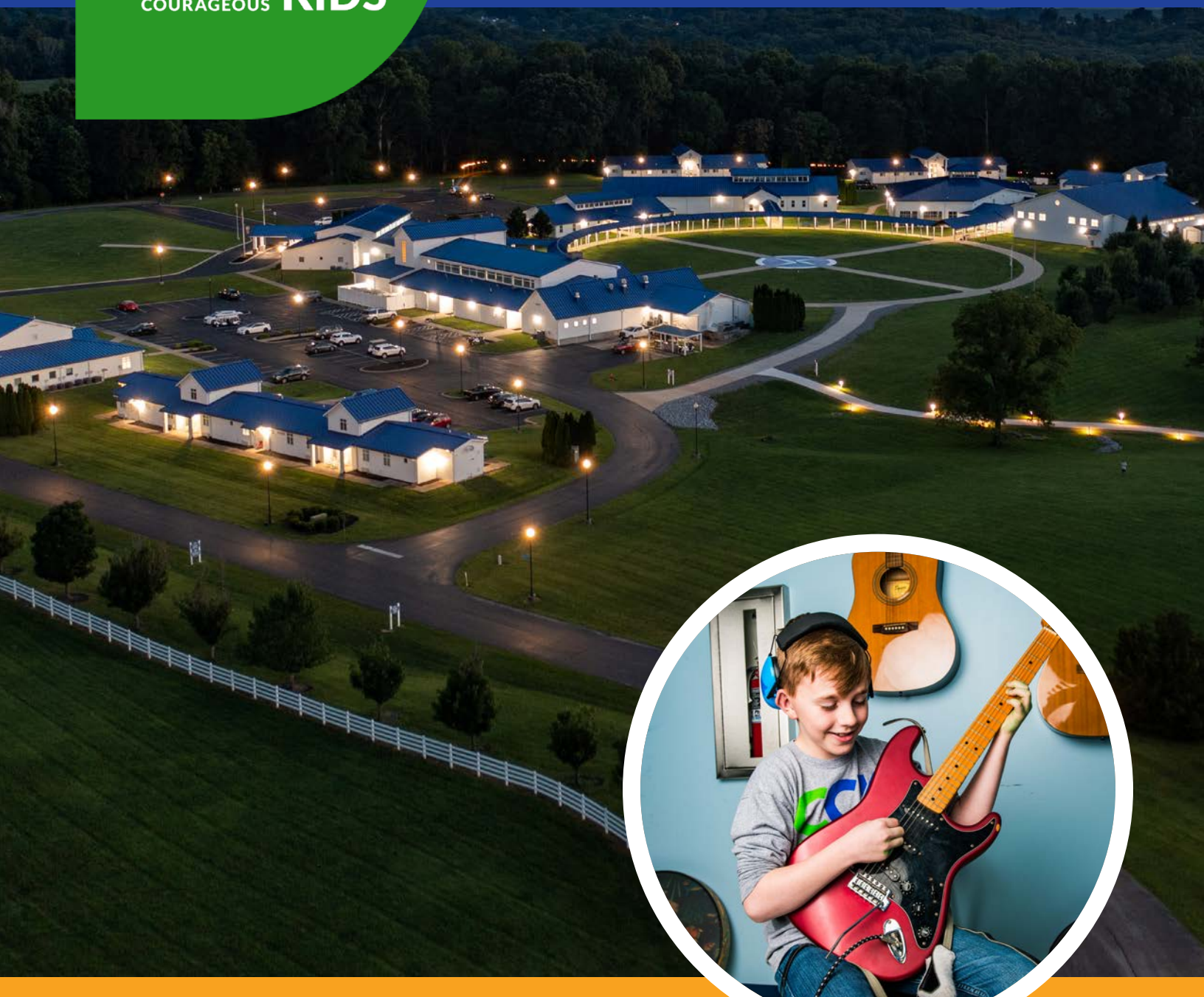
