



Composting & Recycling is the Law

Properly sorting your food scraps and other compostable materials not only helps fight climate change, it is now the law. **Effective January 1, 2022, State law (SB 1383) requires residents to keep compostable and recyclable materials out of California's landfills.**

When compostable materials like food scraps, plant trimmings, and paper break down in a landfill they produce methane, a potent greenhouse gas that contributes to climate change.

By composting and recycling these materials, you are helping to reduce methane emissions and create a healthier planet.



Textile Recycling

AVI will collect textiles curbside from Dublin single family residents during **the first full weeks of July, October, January and April.**

How To Participate: Residents must call at least seven (7) days in advance to notify AVI that they will have textiles to be collected. Place acceptable

textiles in a clear plastic bag at the curb.

There is no fee for this service.

There will be no collection service on the holidays listed below. When a holiday falls on a weekday, collection will be delayed by one day for the remainder of that week. Friday customers will receive service on Saturday.

Billing Information

All customers are billed for the basic level of service — a 32-gallon cart — on their property tax bill. Customers who choose a larger garbage cart will receive an additional bill each quarter directly from AVI. RECYCLE

Recycle carts are gray with black lids or gray with blue lids. Place recyclables loose in the cart.



Glass Bottles & Jars



Plastic Bottles & Containers



Metal & Aluminum



Clean Paper Products

KEEP THESE ITEMS OUT OF THE RECYCLE CART.

- batteries
- broken ceramic dishware
- diapers
- dirty or waxy paper
- electronics
- food
- hangers

- plastic bags & flimsy plastic
- rubber gloves
- sharps
- waxed cardboard



Used Household Batteries

Place used household batteries in a clear sealed bag on top of your black or blue recycling cart.

Batteries don't belong inside the carts — they're flammable and can cause fires during collection and processing.

COMPOST

Compost carts are green with green lids. Place compost or organics loose, wrapped in newspaper, or in a paper bag in the cart.

Kitchen Pails

Residents are provided kitchen pails at no charge to make food scrap composting easier. Simply line it with a paper bag or newspaper to collect food scraps and food-soiled paper. When full, empty the contents into your compost cart.

GARBAGE

Garbage carts are gray with gray lids. Bag items to avoid litter and stormwater pollution.

Motor Oil & Filters

Call AVI at **(925) 479-9545** to request a special oil jug and filter bag.

Set the filled jug and bag at the curb next to your carts on your collection day. Make sure the jug and/or bag is sealed properly and clearly visible from the street.

LARGE ITEM COLLECTION



Limit Seven (7) Cubic Yards • Small Items Must Be Bagged or Boxed • Three (3) Free Collections Per Year

ACCEPTED ITEMS	Furniture, Carpets, Mattresses, Tires Sofas, tables, chairs etc. Up to four (4) car tires (without rims).	White Goods Refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, or other similar household appliances.
	Brown Goods Electronics such as stereos, VCR's, personal digital assistants (PDAs), telephones.	E-Waste Electronic equipment such as cell phones, computers, monitors, televisions, & other items containing cathode ray tubes (CRTs).

- ✓ Single-family residential households are eligible to schedule and receive three (3) free on-call large item collection services per contract year (July 1-June 30).
- ✓ To schedule a large item collection, call **(925) 479-9545**.
- ✓ Set material at the curb no more than 24 hours in advance.
- ✓ Large item set out must not block the sidewalk or impede traffic. Small items must be boxed or bagged in disposable containers.
- ✓ Yard clippings or wood must be bundled, boxed, or bagged, and no longer than four (4) feet.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARADOUS WASTE

It is prohibited to put Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) in the garbage, recycling or organics carts.

AVI will host an annual, one-day Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Event in the spring for all Dublin residents. Please watch your mailbox and our website for more information on event location and date.

If you need to dispose of HHW at other times of the year, contact the Alameda County Household Hazardous Waste Program at **(800) 606-6606** or visit stopwaste.org/HHW for a list of disposal options and locations.



CART SET-OUT INSTRUCTIONS

- Roll out carts by 5:30 a.m.
- Place carts three (3) feet apart
- Place carts in the street with wheels against the curb
- Close lids completely to prevent litter and stormwater pollution
