

Claim 1: Cory Doctorow coined "enshittification" to describe platform decay. — TRUE

Claim 2: DSNP is built on the Polkadot public blockchain and is governed by a nonprofit, Project Liberty. — TRUE

DSNP's first production implementation, Frequency, runs in the Polkadot ecosystem, and the protocol is developed and governed through the nonprofit Project Liberty.

Claim 3: Bluesky is built on the AT Protocol. — TRUE

Bluesky runs on the AT Protocol. Source: General public record; guest appropriately hedged the ownership detail.

Claim 4: The Take It Down Act requires a platform to remove non-consensual content about a person when they report it. — TRUE

Signed into law May 19, 2025, it requires covered platforms to remove non-consensual intimate imagery, including AI deepfakes, within 48 hours of a valid request.

Google did shut Google Play Music down at the end of 2020. During the shutdown, Google provided a transfer tool to YouTube Music and a Google Takeout option to download uploads and purchases before access ended.
