



# REMEMBERING JON

Sometimes, if you get lucky enough in life, you will come across a person that embodies the spirit of a place. Someone that you think of every time your memory wanders back to a time in your life they were there. A person that commands the energy in the room and uses it to do good things. The kind of things that make a lasting difference in your community. That person to us is Jon Parker.

Born and raised in Hoquiam, Jon is what we like to call around here a "die hard grizzly". He came by that naturally as his parents were community staples also known for their giving nature and community leadership. After graduating from Hoquiam High School in 1967, Jon attended the University of Washington followed by Gonzaga where he received his Juris Doctorate. From there, the hometown Hoquiam boy came back to town to apply his newfound skill set where he would then spend decades serving our community.

Jon was a family man. A devoted husband, father and grandfather. You could always get a smile out of Jon when talking about his family and even though he was stoic in nature, his quick wit and humor could bring a smile to your face as well. He was instrumental in so many things at the Foundation, serving on our board since 2005. During his time on the board, he served as chairman and also on our finance committee. Along with his brother, they created the Dorothea Parker Memorial Scholarship in memory of their late mother. Year after year, the scholarship has made the dream of college a reality for so many Hoquiam graduates.

When Jon spoke, we all listened. Not because he demanded it, but because we believed in him. We knew Jon would lead us in the right direction as he did time and time again. Wes Peterson, current Foundation Chairman and longtime friend, remembers Jon as someone that had great respect amongst his peers and also a great sense of humor: "Jon made us all better just by being around him. He expected the best and he wanted things to be done right. He looked toward the future and put the Foundation into a place where we are able to have a wide reach in the community along with a breadth of ways we can serve. Jon was a respected community leader and also a great friend. Grays Harbor is better for having Jon Parker dedicate his life to it and I am grateful to call him a friend."

To say that we will miss Jon is an understatement. Jon's presence was undeniably felt and met with a great embrace from us all at the Foundation every time we came together. Thank you, Jon, for being someone we all look up to and admire and for dedicating your life to Grays Harbor. We will miss you, but we will never, ever forget you.

# GRANT SPOTLIGHT



In 2023, the Foundation awarded a \$30,000 grant to the Grays Harbor Habitat for Humanity store to repair a leaky roof. They wrote in their application:

"The roof for the store has gotten so bad that it was literally dripping into the store when it would rain. We have had to put buckets in place to catch the rain to prevent the floor getting wet, and keep accidents from happening.

We heavily depend on the store for several things, it provides funds to help with our building funds and cover operational costs. The store is also implementing a new "Way Maker" Program. This program will be a way maker for those who are trying to get a hand up to get into their own place, by giving them household goods and furniture they desperately need."

The Foundation was happy to award these funds and with the roof now leak free, we received this great update from Executive Director, Darlene Triggs:

"Your generous support has enabled us to fix the leaks in the roof, which were causing us to keep the product away from that part of the store. Now that the roof has been repaired, we are delighted to have furniture in that area without worrying about it getting wet. Our customers are thrilled with the new space, and I believe it has brought an increase in traffic to the store as they can see the beautiful items on display through the windows.

# GRANT SPOTLIGHT



The City of Aberdeen provides the only publicly accessible basketball hoops and courts in Aberdeen. These basketball courts are used daily during the spring, summer, and fall by an average of 147 kids during the summer months.

The existing hoops/backboards/poles had outlived their lives and were in need of replacement, so when the Aberdeen Parks Department requested funds last year to replace basketball hoops throughout the city, the Foundation was happy to help.

Our funding helped the following parks: Peterson Playfield, Garley Park and Sam Benn Park.

Eric Potts, Executive Director of the Foundation commented: Providing funding that gives an entire community access to activities they might not have access to otherwise is something we enjoy doing at the Foundation.

Our community parks are important to the health and wellness of residents in the harbor and we are grateful to the city of Aberdeen for identifying a need that we could assist with and that our community can enjoy.”

## **A HOMETOWN LOVE STORY THAT KEEPS ON GIVING: PETE AND SALLY HEGG**

Pete and Sally Hegg met as sophomores at a dance during their time at Hoquiam High School in 1951 and just like the saying goes, the rest is history.

After graduation, Pete attended Western Washington University and Sally went to Grays Harbor College. Before Pete's senior year of college, they were married on August 31, 1957.

After college, they moved back to Hoquiam to start their family. Pete began his teaching career at Hoquiam High School and served as vice-principal and athletic director. Sally enjoyed being involved in her kids' activities and became a Cub Scout and Blue Bird leader. She was also the room mom and volunteered to help in school and community activities. After the children were in school, Sally also began working for the Hoquiam School District.

In 1976, Pete took the position of principal at Eatonville High School and served there until 1982, when he returned to Hoquiam to become the principal of his alma mater, Hoquiam High School, retiring in 1994.

Pete and Sally loved their family and had many fun adventures together through the years. Through traveling and hosting events for family and friends, their love for each other continued to shine throughout their 64-year marriage. When Sally developed Alzheimer's later in life, Pete continued to be devoted to her. When the pandemic came along, Sally was living at Pacific Care Center and while Pete was not allowed into the facility, he still visited her twice daily by looking through the window to give her a smile and a wave and make sure she was eating breakfast and dinner.

Sally lost her battle in 2021 and Pete passed shortly after in 2022. Because of their devotion to each other, our community and education, their kids created the Pete and Sally Hegg Memorial Scholarship to honor their beloved parents. Their son, Mark said, "Education was important to them. They cared about diversity and supporting the kids that may struggle in school by giving them opportunities and a fair shot. This was important to them and it is now important to us to carry that on for Hoquiam High School students."

The Pete and Sally Hegg Memorial Scholarship is for Hoquiam High School graduates who are involved in activities and have a desire to continue their education but may need a little extra help. Thank you to Mark and family for creating this great opportunity for our local students!

Call us at (360) 532-1600 and we will meet with you to discuss the best fund type for your intentions and then prepare a fund agreement for you to review.


Share the fund agreement with your family and your professional advisors, then once comfortable, sign and return to our office.
