Using This Leader Plan Sheet

MAKING THE COPIES

The plan sheet is designed as a double-sided sheet, with page 1 being printed on the reverse side of page 2. The idea is for you to record your study notes on one side (page 2) and the teaching actions you intend to take on the other (page 1). Fold the photocopied sheet in half so that the group plans are on the outside and the study notes are on the inside. If you can only print one side, then print page 1 and use page 2 as a guide for recording your thoughts on the blank side of the paper.

WHY A PLAN SHEET

While it may be tempting to carry your Leader Guide, it is a better practice to carry notes. While subtle, teaching from notes communicates that you took time to prepare and that you take your responsibility as leader seriously.

HOW TO USE

- 1. Make the two-sided copies (as explained above).
- 2. Record the passage on the top of the "My Personal Study Notes" side.
- 3. Read the passage, recording key words, phrases, people, places, and actions.
- 4. Use the commentary in the Leader Guide and other Bible study tools (commentary, Bible dictionaries, Bible handbooks, study Bibles), and define the words, phrases, people and places you recorded in step 3.
- 5. Write a summary of the main point of the passage. Record your summary statement under "The Main Point."
- 6. Describe how this session relates to you (record your thoughts under "Getting Personal").
- 7. Describe how this lesson may relate to the people in your class (review the introduction to the lesson in the Leader Guide and Learner Guide for insight. Record your thoughts under "The Next Step."
- 8. Develop a goal for the group time. Seek to describe what you hope will happen in the lives of those who will be attending the Bible study group. Record your direction under "Lesson Goal" on the front page of the Leader Plan Sheet.
- 9. Develop your group plan. Record how you will focus their attention, how you will help the group discover the truths, and how you will challenge them. Record your plans on the plan sheet.
- 10. Identify "teaching rabbits" that may come up during this session. Determine how you will address these rabbits if they arise during the group study time. Record your ideas under "Rabbits" on the My Personal Study Notes side of the plan sheet.
- 11. Record reminders about announcements on the plan sheet.
- 12. As guests arrive and prayer requests are shared during the Bible study time, record names and requests under the appropriate heading on the Leading the Group Study Time side of the plan sheet.
